technology in his classroom. He also recognized the importance of helping low-income students develop the skills needed to be successful.

Shelly Jennings commented on the importance of Kindergarten preparedness and its effect on her second-grade classroom.

Nona Mason shared experiences from her Kindergarten classroom which includes a large percentage of students who are learning English as a second language.

Anna Sahadeo spoke of the research done by her second grade class and the learning that took place during their student-selected project on how toilets work. She seeks to individualize her instruction to facilitate student learning.

Jolene Pennington spoke with enthusiasm about the new Department of Education vision for KansansCan and provided information about learning projects used for instruction in her elementary classroom.

Lucinda Crenshaw gave personal background and spoke of ways she encourages her students to be engaged in their learning process and of ways she provides support to those students who learn English as a second language.

Shiela Koup expressed her desire to help students who have experienced little success in their educational process. She works to develop relationships with these students that can free them from past failures and open the opportunity for them to experience academic success.

Kristoffer Barikmo seeks to make government and history relevant to his students and to prepare them for adulthood.
