Kansas Electric Cooperatives Information January 16, 2015

**KEC, Inc.**, is the statewide service organization providing services for the rural electric cooperatives in Kansas. Formed in 1941 and headquartered in Topeka, KEC represents the interests of and provides services and programs to the electric co-ops that serve in Kansas. Services include lobbying for cooperative interests, rate and tax expertise, safety programming, communications and some engineering services.



Kansas has been served by electric cooperatives for over 75 years. In 1935 FDR created REA— The goal of REC's remains the same-supply power to rural America. By 1935, FDR saw a problem growing in America. Electricity had been available in urban areas since the late 1800s. But by the 1930s less than 10% of farms in rural America received electricity. Kansas farmers relied on kerosene lamps for light, and wood or coal for cooking and heat. Existing power companies couldn't see the profit in providing rural electricity— thus, the electric cooperative was born. by1937, Kansas formed it's first cooperative— Brown Atchison REC.

The mission of the electric cooperative is unchanged since services began in the 1930's;

To provide our members with reliable electric service at the best possible cost in areas others would not serve.

**Kansas electric cooperatives are vital to Kansas.** Kansas' 29 distribution electric cooperatives averaging 8000 members per cooperative.. Kansas is also home to 2 generation and transmission (G&T) cooperatives that acquire power for the distribution cooperatives. Kansas electric cooperative provide electricity to approximately 340,000 meters. We serve 103 of the 105 counties in Kansas. Cooperatives average 3.3 members per mile of line compared to 45 customers per mile of larger utilities.

## **Cooperatives Are Unique:**

- Not-for profit;
- Autonomous;
- Self-governed by their members;
- Owned by the members, and each member has a voice in cooperative governance. The cooperative board and management make decisions as elected by the members:
- Not rate regulated by the KCC.
