Bill introductions

Chairperson Barker called for bill introductions. Representative Blaine Finch stated that he has three bills to introduce. The first one relates to public benefit corporations. Hearing no objection, the bill was accepted.

Representative Blaine Finch introduced a bill which prevents fee sweeps. The bill was accepted by Chairperson Barker after seeing that there were no objections.

The third bill introduced by Representative Blaine Finch is a companion bill to the fee sweeps bill. It requires that when a person has paid a fee for one purpose and then that fee is swept into the general fund, the State must provide notice to that person that their fee has been turned into a general tax. Hearing no objection, Chairperson Barker accepted the bill.

There were no further bill introductions.

Briefing by staff on: SB159 — Enacting the safe families act; power of attorney for care and custody of a child; also requiring a law enforcement officer to take a child into custody when there is a drug crime occurring in the child's residence and such crime threatens the safety of the child.

At Chairperson Barker's request, Jason Thompson, Revisor, provided an overview. Last year <u>SB159</u>, which would enact the Safe Families Act, came over from the Senate. It was added onto a bill concerning when law enforcement officers would be required to take a child into custody, which led to a lot of discussion and conference committee reports. It then went to the Judicial Council who provided a report and recommended legislation, the <u>Proposed House Substitute for SB 159</u> (<u>Attachment 1</u>). This would enact the Host Families Act. It still relates to temporary care for children.

Chairperson Barker stated that this bill did not pass the House last year. It was sent to the Judicial Council who drafted this proposed legislation. He wants to replace the original bill with this proposed substitute. There may be some additional amendments. He will allow the Committee to ask Jason questions, but then he will hold the hearings on the other bills scheduled on today's agenda, and if there is any time left the Committee will work this bill.

Questions were asked of the Revisor by Representatives Steve Becker, Dennis Highberger, Janice Pauls, John Carmichael, Jim Ward, John Whitmer, and Leslie Osterman.

The briefing was closed by Chairperson Barker.

<u>Hearing on: SB18 — Substitute for SB 18 by Committee on Corrections and Juvenile Justice - Making certain law enforcement audio and video recordings confidential and exempt from the open records act.</u>

Chairperson Barker opened the hearing on <u>Sub SB18</u>. This is another bill that came over from the Senate and then was sent to the Judicial Council, who prepared a report (<u>Attachment 2</u>).

An overview was given by Jason Thompson, Revisor. He drafted the <u>Proposed House Substitute for SB18</u> from the legislation proposed by the Judicial Council in their report (<u>Attachment 3</u>), and he noted the changes made in it. Questions were asked by Representatives John Whitmer and Jim Ward.

Chairperson Barker called upon Professor Mike Kautsch who testified as a proponent of **Proposed House Substitute for Sub SB 18** (Attachment 4). Questions were asked by Representative John Carmichael.

Chairperson Barker recognized Kent Cornish of the Kansas Association of Broadcasters as a proponent on the bill (Attachment 5).

Doug Anstaett testified on behalf of the Kansas Press Association, as a proponent of the proposed substitute (Attachment 6).

Richard Gannon then testified in place of Doug Anstaett, Kansas Press Association, as an opponent of **HB2550** (Attachment 15).
