<u>Hearing on: HB2542 — Providing post-retirement benefit increase (COLA) for certain retirants of KPERS.</u>

Chairman Johnson recognized David Wiese, Assistant Revisor who provided an overview on <u>HB2542</u> (<u>Attachment 1</u>). The bill provides a cost-of-living adjustment to each KPERS retirant who has been retired for at least five years as of July 01, 2016. Mr. Wiese answered questions from the Committee.

Chairman Johnson recognized Alan Conroy, Executive Director, KPERS who provided background information on <u>HB2542</u> (<u>Attachment 2</u>). The COLA is paid out on a sliding scale and the retiree would have to be retired for five years as of July 2, 2016 before there would be an adjustment. Based on the last valuation, there are 64,256 retirees and beneficiaries who would be eligible to receive a cost of living adjustment under <u>HB2542</u>. Mr. Conroy answered questions from the Committee.

Faith Loretto, Planning and Research Officer, KPERS provided a cost study on <u>HB2542</u> (<u>Attachment</u> 3).

Ms. Loretto and Mr. Conroy addressed questions from the Committee regarding the impact or amount on the UAL, actual returns on assumed rate of 8% and death and disability funds.

David Wiese, Assistant Revisor provided an overview of the following three bills that are currently in Committee regarding Working after Retirement:

- 1. <u>HB2653</u> amends provisions relating to working after retirement for KPERS retirants.
- 2. <u>HB2654</u> provides an exception from the \$25,000 earnings limitation for retirees that are licensed public health retirees.
- 3. <u>HB2656</u> provides an exception from the \$25,000 earnings limitation for KPERs licensed school professionals who retire at age 62 or later.

Mr. Wiese stood for questions from the Committee.

<u>Representative Billinger moved, seconded by Representative Davis to approve minutes for February</u> 03, 2016. The motion carried.

Chairman Johnson advised the Working after Retirement issue is the largest topic the Committee needs to address at this time. Three key measures to be addressed are cost, liability and flexibility.
