## **House Taxation Committee HB 2367 Testimony**

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee,

Thank you very much for the opportunity to be here today on behalf of the Miami County Commissioners to voice support for HB 2367. This bill would allow Miami County to be designated as a Rural Opportunity Zone.

Our county shares many characteristics with the counties already authorized for this program.

We are primarily a county of bedroom communities with about 70 percent of our civilian workforce travelling outside of Miami County for employment. According to the Kansas Budget Office, the county's population growth has been relatively flat with actual population decreases recorded in four of the last six years.

New housing starts have dramatically declined with few signs of a rebound. During 2014, 55 new single family building permits were issued in the entire county. That is a 75 percent decrease from 2006. Perhaps more telling, only 12 of those 2014 permits were issued by a city - a 93% decrease from 2006.

Statewide ROZ numbers have shown particular success in recruiting healthcare workers. In Miami County, this industry sector represents about 1300 jobs or 12% of available jobs. These employers are struggling to fill their open positions – as readily demonstrated by some of the difficulties being seen at Osawatomie State Hospital.

Members of the Miami County Commission believe the ROZ program offers tools that will help the county attract new residents and broaden our laborpool. We would appreciate your support of HB 2367.

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## **Overview of Counties**

Of the state's 105 counties, 77 currently are designated as ROZ counties. With five metro counties designated by the Kansas Department of Commerce, fewer than two dozen counties are excluded from the program.

## **Comparison to Sumner County**

Sumner County was added to the ROZ program in 2014. They are located adjacent to a metro area and near a state border. They share several other similarities to Miami County.
