
Why Does Kansas Need a Comprehensive Plan?

National Headwinds

- GDP growth remains sluggish at the national level
- Monetary policy set by Fed helpful but limited
- Federal government slow to reform fiscal policies impacting businesses
- National changes shifted base of U.S. economy toward innovation and professional services and away from manufacturing
- China slowdown
- Stock market uncertainty
- Value of dollar

- Many states in the Kansas region also making significant efforts to enhance and build a strong business environment
- Oil and gas prices have declined significantly
- Agricultural sector challenged by low commodity prices
- Diverse characteristics of surrounding states




Population Loss

- In 1890, Kansas had 2.27% of the U.S. population
- Since then, population growth has been sluggish and has decreased in every decade
- In most Kansas counties, population peaked years ago
- Now Kansas has less than 1% of the US population

Census Year of Maximum Population by Kansas County 1890-2010



Recession and Recovery

In Kansas

- Private sector jobs lost in the recession:
 - More than 76,000
- Private sector jobs recovered since the recession:
 - More than 88,000

Manufacturing Challenges

- Manufacturing has been declining nationwide for years – in 2015, only 30,000 workers were added nationally
- Technological innovations and efficiencies in manufacturing have had a permanent effect on staffing levels
- Slow recovery has impacted all industries in the manufacturing sector
- These global market forces impact the entire country, but are especially felt in Kansas because of our concentration of manufacturers



Impact on Manufacturing Jobs

- Kansas is highly dependent upon manufacturing –
 11.5% of Kansans work in this sector
- More than 30,000 manufacturing jobs lost in the recession; only 4,000 recovered
- In contrast, most of our surrounding states have lower levels of manufacturing employment:
 - Colorado 5.7% Missouri 9.3%
 - Oklahoma 8.5% Nebraska 9.8%



Manufacturing's Share of GSP

- Manufacturing's role in Kansas is significantly greater than in some neighboring states, and accounts for 15.9% of the state's gross product
- Most of our surrounding states' contribution to state GSP are much lower by comparison:

- Colorado 7.3% Missouri 13.1%
- Oklahoma 10.1% Nebraska 12.7%

- Kansas Department of Revenue
 - Zero tax on non-wage business income for small business
 - 71% of tax savings to individuals/families; 20% to small business
 - Personal income tax rate reduced from 6:45% to 4.6%
 - 388,000 low income Kansans moved to zero tax liability
 - 8,666 new business filers
- Kansas Department of Agriculture
 - 50 year water vision
 - Focus on value added agriculture carbs to protein and decreasing reliance on water resources
 - Increase research related to agriculture growth industries, including pet food, ag technology and ag manufacturing



- Kansas Department of Labor
 - Increased trust fund balance from -\$84M to +\$450M
 - Decreased length of unemployment from average 33.9 weeks to 16 week low/26 week high
 - Implemented work requirement for claimants receiving benefits/collaborative agency efforts to assist with employment
 - Recouped \$31M in fraudulent unemployment activity
- Kansas Department of Transportation
 - New intermodal facility in Edgerton
 - New transload facilities in Great Bend and Garden City



- Kansas Department for Children & Families
 - Reduction in average months on TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families) assistance
 - Increased JAG (Jobs for America's Graduates) programs at public high schools
 - Increased students at benchmark in 4th Grade Reading/Kansas
 Reading Roadmap program
- Office of the Repealer
 - Business survey netted 3700/6000 responses
 - Support for 181 suggested repeals or modifications; 70+ signed into law



A Comprehensive Plan for Kansas

- Kansas' economic growth plan is comprehensive with many different components
- Flexible, responsive to business needs, efficient, responsible with taxpayer dollars, to meet continually changing demands
- Early results show we are creating opportunities and moving in the right direction
