



## Testimony to Senate Committee on Public Health and Welfare on Senate Bill 402

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Madam Chairwoman and members of the Committee, my name is Colin Thomasset. I am the Associate Director for the Association of Community Mental Health Centers of Kansas, Inc. The Association appreciates the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill 402.

The Association represents the 26 licensed Community Mental Health Centers (CMHCs) in Kansas that provide behavioral health services in all 105 counties, 24-hours a day, seven days a week. In Kansas, CMHCs are the local Mental Health Authorities coordinating the delivery of publicly funded community-based mental health services. As part of licensing regulations, CMHCs are required to provide services to all Kansans needing them, regardless of their ability to pay. This makes the community mental health system the “safety net” for Kansans with mental health needs, collectively serving over 127,000 Kansans.

The Association likes the concept of what is suggested in SB 402 which would allow for one hour of continuing education credit by the performance of one hour of gratuitous services to eligible low income patients up to a maximum of eight continuing education credits per licensure period. This is the kind of innovative incentive that could help produce meaningful benefits to low-income patients and simultaneously benefit providers. As behavioral health care becomes a more significant partner in mainstream healthcare, this contributes to whole person, patient centered care.

Furthermore, we appreciate the liability protections provided to other provider systems in KSA 75-6115. At the appropriate time, we would request amendment of this bill to include Community Mental Health Centers as defined in current statute under KSA 75-6115.
