9 AN ACT relating to the office of the state bank commissioner; concern-
10 ing the regulation of consumer and mortgage lending; K.S.A. 9-2203,
11 9-2205, 9-2208, 9-2209, 9-2211, 9-2216, 9-2218, 16a-3-205, 16a-5-103,
12 16a-5-111 and 16a-6-201 and K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 16a-2-103, 16a-2-302,
13 16a-2-303, 16a-2-304, 16a-2-404, 16a-3-304, 16a-3-308a, 16a-6-104,
14 16a-6-108 and 16a-6-203 and repealing the existing sections.

16 *Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:*

17 Section 1. K.S.A. 9-2203 is hereby amended to read as follows: 9-
18 2203. (a) Mortgage business shall only be conducted in this state at or
19 from a mortgage company licensed by the commissioner as required by
20 this act. A licensee shall be responsible for all mortgage business con-
21 ducted on their behalf by loan originators or other employees.

22 (b) Mortgage business involving loan origination shall only be con-
23 ducted in this state by an individual who has first been registered with
24 the commissioner as a loan originator as required by this act. Loan ori-
25 gination shall only be conducted at or from a mortgage company and a
26 registrant shall only engage in mortgage business on behalf of one mort-
27 gage company.

28 (c) ~~Any person violating this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and~~
29 ~~upon conviction shall be punished by a definite term of confinement in~~
30 ~~the county jail which shall be fixed by the court and shall not exceed one~~
31 ~~year, or a fine not exceeding \$5,000 or both~~ *who willfully or knowingly*
32 *violates any of the provisions of this act, any rule and regulation adopted*
33 *or order issued under this act commits a severity level 7 nonperson felony.*
34 *A second or subsequent conviction of this act, regardless of its location on*
35 *the sentencing grid block, shall have a presumptive sentence of*
36 *imprisonment.*

37 (d) *No prosecution for any crime under this act may be commenced*
38 *more than five years after the alleged violation. A prosecution is com-*
39 *menced when a complaint or information is filed, or an indictment re-*
40 *turned, and a warrant thereon is delivered to the sheriff or other officer*
41 *for execution, except that no prosecution shall be deemed to have been*
42 *commenced if the warrant so issued is not executed without unreasonable*
43 *delay.*

- 1 (e) *Nothing in this act limits the power of the state to punish any*
2 *person for any conduct which constitutes a crime by statute.*
- 3 Sec. 2. K.S.A. 9-2205 is hereby amended to read as follows: 9-2205.
- 4 (a) A license or registration shall become effective as of the date specified
5 on the face of the certificate.
- 6 (b) A license shall be renewed in each odd-numbered year by filing
7 with the commissioner, at least 30 days prior to the expiration of the
8 license, a renewal application, containing information the commissioner
9 requires to determine the existence of material changes from the infor-
10 mation contained in the applicant's original license application or prior
11 renewal applications.
- 12 (c) A registration shall be renewed annually by filing with the com-
13 missioner, at least 30 days prior to the expiration of the registration, a
14 renewal application, containing information the ~~commissioner~~ *commis-*
15 *sioner* requires to determine the existence of material changes from the
16 information contained in the applicant's original registration application
17 or prior renewal applications, including the completion of any continuing
18 education requirements.
- 19 (d) Each renewal application shall be accompanied by a nonrefund-
20 able fee which shall be established by rules and regulations pursuant to
21 K.S.A. 9-2209, and amendments thereto.
- 22 (e) Any renewal application received by the commissioner after the
23 expiration date of the current license or registration shall be treated as
24 an original application and be subject to all reporting and fee require-
25 ments contained in K.S.A. 9-2204, and amendments thereto.
- 26 Sec. 3. K.S.A. 9-2208 is hereby amended to read as follows: 9-2208.
- 27 (a) Each licensee shall prominently display the license of any principal
28 place of business and any branch office in a way that reasonably assures
29 recognition by customers and members of the general public who enter
30 the licensee's place of business.
- 31 (b) Prior to entering into any contract for the provision of services or
32 prior to the licensee receiving any compensation or promise of compen-
33 sation for a mortgage loan the licensee shall acquire from the customer
34 a signed acknowledgment containing such information as the commis-
35 sioner may prescribe by rule and regulation. The signed acknowledgment
36 shall be retained by the licensee and a copy shall be provided to the
37 customer.
- 38 (c) All solicitations and published advertisements concerning mort-
39 gage business directed at Kansas residents, including those on the internet
40 or by other electronic means, shall contain the words "Kansas licensed
41 mortgage company," and must also contain the name, ~~address~~ and license
42 number of the licensee, which shall be the same as the name, ~~address~~
43 and number on record with the commissioner. Each licensee shall main-

1 tain a record of all solicitations or advertisements for a period of 25
2 months. For the purpose of this subsection, “advertising” does not include
3 business cards or promotional items.

4 (d) No solicitation or advertisement shall contain false, misleading or
5 deceptive information, or indicate or imply that the interest rates or
6 charges stated are “recommended,” “approved,” “set” or “established”
7 by the state of Kansas.

8 (e) No licensee or registrant shall conduct mortgage business in this
9 state using any name other than the name or names stated on their license
10 or registration.

11 Sec. 4. K.S.A. 9-2209 is hereby amended to read as follows: 9-2209.

12 (a) The commissioner may exercise the following powers:

13 ~~(a)~~ (1) Adopt rules and regulations as necessary to carry out the intent
14 and purpose of this act;

15 ~~(b)~~ (2) make investigations and examinations of the licensee’s oper-
16 ations, books and records as the commissioner deems necessary for the
17 protection of the public;

18 ~~(c)~~ (3) charge reasonable costs of investigation, administration or ex-
19 amination to be paid by the applicant, licensee or registrant under inves-
20 tigation, examination or requiring administrative action;

21 ~~(d)~~ (4) order any licensee or registrant to cease any activity or practice
22 which the commissioner deems to be deceptive, dishonest, violative of
23 state or federal law or unduly harmful to the interests of the public;

24 ~~(e)~~ (5) exchange any information regarding the administration of this
25 act with any agency of the United States or any state which regulates the
26 licensee or registrant or administers statutes, rules and regulations or
27 programs related to mortgage loans;

28 ~~(f)~~ (6) disclose to any person or entity that an applicant’s, licensee’s
29 or registrant’s application, license or registration has been denied, sus-
30 pended, revoked or refused renewal;

31 ~~(g)~~ (7) require or permit any person to file a written statement, under
32 oath or otherwise as the commissioner may direct, setting forth all the
33 facts and circumstances concerning any apparent violation of this act, or
34 any rule and regulation promulgated thereunder or any order issued pur-
35 suant to this act;

36 ~~(h)~~ (8) receive, as a condition in settlement of any investigation or
37 examination, a payment designated for consumer education to be ex-
38 pended for such purpose as directed by the commissioner;

39 ~~(i)~~ (9) require that any applicant, registrant, licensee or other person
40 successfully passes a standardized examination designed to establish such
41 person’s knowledge of mortgage business transactions and all applicable
42 state and federal law. Such examinations shall be created and adminis-
43 tered by the commissioner, or the commissioner’s designee, and may be

1 made a condition of application approval or application renewal; and
2 ~~(j)~~ (10) require that any licensee, registrant or other person complete
3 a minimum number of continuing education hours on an annual or bi-
4 annual basis. Continuing education courses shall be approved by the com-
5 missioner, or the commissioner's designee, and may be made a condition
6 of application renewal.

7 (11) *require fingerprinting of any applicant, registrant, licensee,*
8 *members thereof if a copartnership or association, or officers and directors*
9 *thereof if a corporation, or any agent acting on their behalf, or other*
10 *person as deemed appropriate by the commissioner. The commissioner,*
11 *or the commissioner's designee, may submit such fingerprints to the Kan-*
12 *sas bureau of investigation, federal bureau of investigation or other law*
13 *enforcement agency for the purposes of verifying the identity of such*
14 *persons and obtaining records of their criminal arrests and convictions;*

15 (12) *refer such evidence as may be available concerning any violation*
16 *of this act or of any rule and regulation or order hereunder to the attorney*
17 *general or the proper county or district attorney, who may in the prose-*
18 *cutor's discretion, with or without such a referral, institute the appropri-*
19 *ate criminal proceedings under this act. Upon receipt of such referral, the*
20 *attorney general or the county attorney or district attorney may request*
21 *that a duly employed attorney of the commissioner prosecute or assist in*
22 *the prosecution of such violation or violations on behalf of the state. Upon*
23 *approval of the commissioner, such employee shall be appointed a special*
24 *prosecutor for the attorney general or the county attorney or district at-*
25 *torney to serve without compensation from the attorney general or the*
26 *county attorney or district attorney. Such special prosecutor shall have*
27 *all the powers and duties prescribed by law for assistant attorneys general*
28 *or assistant county or district attorneys and such other powers and duties*
29 *as are lawfully delegated to such special prosecutor by the attorney gen-*
30 *eral or the county attorney or district attorney; and*

31 (13) *issue and apply to enforce subpoenas in this state at the request*
32 *of a comparable official of another state if the activities constituting an*
33 *alleged violation for which the information is sought would be a violation*
34 *of the Kansas mortgage business act if the activities had occurred in this*
35 *state.*

36 (b) *For the purpose of any examination, investigation or proceeding*
37 *under this act, the commissioner or any officer designated by the com-*
38 *missioner may administer oaths and affirmations, subpoena witnesses,*
39 *compel such witnesses' attendance, adduce evidence and require the pro-*
40 *duction of any matter which is relevant to the examination or investiga-*
41 *tion, including the existence, description, nature, custody, condition and*
42 *location of any books, documents or other tangible things and the identity*
43 *and location of persons having knowledge of relevant facts, or any other*

1 *matter reasonably calculated to lead to the discovery of relevant infor-*
2 *mation or items.*

3 (c) *In case of contumacy by, or refusal to obey a subpoena issued to*
4 *any person, any court of competent jurisdiction, upon application by the*
5 *commissioner, may issue to that person an order requiring the person to*
6 *appear before the commissioner, or the officer designated by the com-*
7 *missioner, there, to produce documentary evidence if so ordered or to give*
8 *evidence touching the matter under investigation or in question. Any fail-*
9 *ure to obey the order of the court may be punished by the court as a*
10 *contempt of court; and*

11 (d) *No person is excused from attending and testifying or from pro-*
12 *ducing any document or record before the commissioner or in obedience*
13 *to the subpoena of the commissioner or any officer designated by the*
14 *commissioner or in any proceeding instituted by the commissioner, on the*
15 *ground that the testimony or evidence (documentary or otherwise) re-*
16 *quired of the person may tend to incriminate the person or subject the*
17 *person to a penalty or forfeiture. No individual may be prosecuted or*
18 *subjected to any penalty or forfeiture for or on account of any transaction,*
19 *matter or thing concerning which such person is compelled, after claiming*
20 *privilege against self-incrimination, to testify or produce evidence (doc-*
21 *umentary or otherwise), except that the individual so testifying shall not*
22 *be exempt from prosecution and punishment for perjury committed in so*
23 *testifying.*

24 Sec. 5. K.S.A. 9-2211 is hereby amended to read as follows: 9-2211.

25 (a) Each applicant or licensee who maintains a bona fide office shall file
26 with the commissioner a surety bond in the amount of \$50,000, in a form
27 acceptable to the commissioner, issued by an insurance company author-
28 ized to conduct business in this state, securing the applicant's or licensee's
29 faithful performance of all duties and obligations of a licensee meeting
30 the following requirements:

31 (1) The bond shall be payable to the office of the state bank
32 commissioner;

33 (2) the terms of the bond shall provide that it may not be terminated
34 without 30 days prior written notice to the commissioner; and

35 (3) the bond shall be available for the recovery of expenses, fines and
36 fees levied by the commissioner under this act, and for losses or damages
37 which are *determined by the commissioner to have been* incurred by any
38 borrower or consumer as a result of the applicant's or licensee's failure
39 to comply with the requirements of this act.

40 (b) Each applicant or licensee who does not maintain a bona fide
41 office shall comply with both of the following:

42 (1) File with the commissioner a surety bond in the amount of
43 \$100,000, in a form acceptable to the commissioner, issued by an insur-

1 ance company authorized to conduct business in this state, securing the
2 applicant's or licensee's faithful performance of all duties and obligations
3 of a licensee meeting the following requirements:

4 (A) The bond shall be payable to the office of the state bank
5 commissioner;

6 (B) the terms of the bond shall provide that it may not be terminated
7 without 30 days prior written notice to the commissioner; and

8 (C) the bond shall be available for the recovery of expenses, fines and
9 fees levied by the commissioner under this act, and for losses or damages
10 which are *determined by the commissioner to have been* incurred by any
11 borrower or consumer as a result of the applicant's or licensee's failure
12 to comply with the requirements of this act;

13 (2) Submit evidence that establishes, to the commissioner's satisfac-
14 tion, that the applicant or licensee shall at all times maintain a minimum
15 net worth of \$50,000. Evidence of net worth shall include the submission
16 of a balance sheet accompanied by a written statement by an independent
17 certified public accountant attesting that the balance sheet has been re-
18 viewed in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

19 Sec. 6. K.S.A. 9-2216 is hereby amended to read as follows: 9-2216.

20 (a) A licensee shall keep for at least 25 months copies of all documents
21 or correspondence received or prepared by the licensee or registrant in
22 connection with a loan or loan application and those records and docu-
23 ments required by the commissioner by rules and regulations adopted
24 pursuant to K.S.A. 9-2209, and amendments thereto. If the loan is not
25 serviced by a licensee, the retention period commences on the date the
26 loan is closed or, if the loan is not closed, the date of the loan application.
27 If the loan is serviced by a licensee, the retention period commences on
28 the date the loan is paid in full or the date the licensee ceases to service
29 the loan.

30 (b) All books, records and any other documents held by the licensee
31 shall be made available for examination and inspection by the commis-
32 sioner or the commissioner's designee. Certified copies of all records not
33 kept within this state shall be delivered to the commissioner within three
34 business days of the date such documents are requested.

35 (c) *No person required to be licensed or registered under this act shall:*

36 (1) *Alter, destroy, shred, mutilate, conceal, cover up or falsify any*
37 *record with the intent to impede, obstruct or influence any investigation*
38 *by the commissioner or the commissioner's designee; or*

39 (2) *alter, destroy, shred, mutilate or conceal a record with the intent*
40 *to impair the object's integrity or availability for use in a proceeding*
41 *before the commissioner or a proceeding brought by the commissioner.*

42 Sec. 7. K.S.A. 9-2218 is hereby amended to read as follows: 9-2218.

43 (a) If the commissioner determines after notice and opportunity for a

1 hearing pursuant to the Kansas administrative procedure act that any
2 person has engaged, is engaging or is about to engage in any act or practice
3 constituting a violation of any provision of this act or any rule and regu-
4 lation or order hereunder, the commissioner by order may require any
5 or all of the following:

6 (1) That the person cease and desist from the unlawful act or practice;

7 (2) that the person pay a fine not to exceed ~~\$5,000~~ \$10,000 per in-
8 cident for the unlawful act or practice; ~~or~~

9 (3) *If any person is found to have violated any provision of this act,*
10 *and such violation is committed against elder or disabled persons, as de-*
11 *fined in K.S.A. 50-676, and amendments thereto, in addition to any civil*
12 *penalty otherwise provided by law, the commissioner may impose an ad-*
13 *ditional penalty not to exceed \$10,000 for each such violation;*

14 (4) *censure the person if the person is registered or licensed under*
15 *this act;*

16 (5) *bar or suspend the person from applying for a license or registra-*
17 *tion under this act, or associating with a mortgage business or supervised*
18 *lender licensed in this state;*

19 (6) *issue an order requiring the person to pay restitution for any loss*
20 *arising from the violation or requiring the person to disgorge any profits*
21 *arising from the violation. Such order may include the assessment of in-*
22 *terest not to exceed 8% per annum from the date of the violation; or*

23 (7) that the person take such affirmative action as in the judgment of
24 the commissioner will carry out the purposes of this act.

25 (b) If the commissioner makes written findings of fact that the public
26 interest will be irreparably harmed by delay in issuing an order under
27 subsection (a), the commissioner may issue an emergency cease and desist
28 order.

29 (1) Such emergency order, even when not an order within the mean-
30 ing of K.S.A. 77-502, and amendments thereto, shall be subject to the
31 same procedures as an emergency order issued under K.S.A. 77-536, and
32 amendments thereto.

33 (2) Upon the entry of such an emergency order, the commissioner
34 shall promptly notify the person subject to the order that it has been
35 entered, of the reasons, and that a hearing will be held upon written
36 request by the person.

37 (3) If the person requests a hearing, or in the absence of any request,
38 if the commissioner determines that a hearing should be held, the matter
39 will be set for a hearing which shall be conducted in accordance with the
40 provisions of the Kansas administrative procedure act. Upon completion
41 of the hearing the commissioner shall by written findings of fact and
42 conclusions of law vacate, modify or make permanent the emergency
43 order.

- 1 (4) If no hearing is requested and none is ordered by the commis-
2 sioner, the emergency order will remain in effect until it is modified or
3 vacated by the commissioner.
- 4 Sec. 8. K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 16a-2-103 is hereby amended to read as
5 follows: 16a-2-103. (1) ~~This section applies~~ *The provisions of this section*
6 *shall apply* to all consumer loans and all consumer credit sales.
- 7 (2) The finance charge on a consumer loan or consumer credit sale
8 shall be computed in accordance with the actuarial method using either
9 the 365/365 method or, if the consumer agrees in writing, the 360/360
10 method:
- 11 (a) The 365/365 method means a method of calculating the finance
12 charge whereby the ~~annual~~ *contract* rate is divided by 365 and the re-
13 sulting daily rate is multiplied by the outstanding principal amount and
14 the actual number of days in the computational period.
- 15 (b) The 360/360 method means a method of calculating the finance
16 charge whereby the ~~annual~~ *contract* rate is divided by 360 and the re-
17 sulting daily rate is multiplied by the outstanding principal amount and
18 the number of assumed days in the computational period. For the pur-
19 poses of this subsection, a creditor may assume that a month has 30 days,
20 regardless of the actual number of days in the month.
- 21 (c) If the documentation evidencing a consumer credit contract is
22 silent regarding whether the 365/365 method or the 360/360 method
23 applies, then the 365/365 method shall apply.
- 24 (3) *In addition to the methods listed under subsection 2, the compu-*
25 *tation of finance charges on a consumer loan secured by a first or second*
26 *lien real estate mortgage may be computed using the following amorti-*
27 *zation method: the contract rate is divided by 360 and the resulting rate*
28 *is multiplied by the outstanding principal amount and 30 assumed days*
29 *between scheduled due dates. For the purposes of this subsection, a cred-*
30 *itor shall assume there are 30 days in the computational period, regardless*
31 *of the actual number of days between due dates.*
- 32 ~~(3)~~ (4) The finance charge on a consumer loan or consumer credit
33 sale may not be computed in accordance with the 365/360 method,
34 whereby the ~~annual~~ *contract* rate is divided by 360 and the resulting daily
35 rate is multiplied by the outstanding principal amount and the actual
36 number of days in the computational period.
- 37 ~~(4)~~ (5) Creditors may ignore the effect of a leap year in computing
38 the finance charge.
- 39 ~~(5)~~ (6) (a) Except for any portion of a loan made pursuant to a lender
40 credit card which does not represent a cash advance, interest or other
41 periodic finance charges on a consumer loan may accrue only on that
42 portion of the principal which has been disbursed to or for the benefit of
43 the consumer.

1 (b) On a consumer credit sale, interest or other periodic finance
2 charges may accrue only on that portion of the principal which relates to
3 goods, services or an interest in land, as the case may be, which has been
4 shipped, delivered, furnished or otherwise made available to or for the
5 benefit of the consumer or has been disbursed to or for the benefit of
6 the consumer.

7 ~~(6)~~ (7) Subsection (2) does not apply to a consumer credit sale the
8 finance charge for which is computed in accordance with subsection (5)
9 of K.S.A. 16a-2-201, and amendments thereto.

10 ~~(7)~~ (8) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this act, the finance
11 charges on consumer loans or consumer credit sales originating prior to
12 January 1, 1994, which computed such finance charges on a precomputed
13 basis, shall be subject to the conditions, limitations and restrictions con-
14 tained in the uniform consumer credit code as in effect on December 31,
15 1993, as such code relates to precomputed finance charges.

16 ~~(8)~~ (9) This section shall be supplemental to and a part of the uniform
17 consumer credit code.

18 Sec. 9. K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 16a-2-302 is hereby amended to read as
19 follows: 16a-2-302. (1) (a) The administrator shall receive and act on all
20 applications for licenses to make supervised loans under this act. Appli-
21 cations shall be filed in the manner prescribed by the administrator and
22 shall contain the information the administrator may require by rule and
23 regulation to make an evaluation of the financial responsibility, character
24 and fitness of the applicant.

25 (b) Submitted with each application shall be a nonrefundable appli-
26 cation fee. Application and license fees shall be in such amounts as are
27 established pursuant to subsection (5) of K.S.A. 16a-6-104, and amend-
28 ments thereto. The license year shall be the calendar year. Each license
29 shall be nonrefundable and nonassignable, and shall remain in force until
30 surrendered, suspended or revoked.

31 (c) The administrator shall remit all moneys received under K.S.A.
32 16a-1-101 to 16a-6-414, inclusive, and amendments thereto, to the state
33 treasurer in accordance with the provisions of K.S.A. 75-4215, and
34 amendments thereto. Upon receipt of each such remittance, the state
35 treasurer shall deposit the entire amount in the state treasury. Of each
36 deposit 20% shall be credited to the state general fund and the balance
37 shall be credited to the bank commissioner fee fund. All expenditures
38 from such fund shall be made in accordance with appropriation acts upon
39 warrants of the director of accounts and reports issued pursuant to vouch-
40 ers approved by the administrator or by a person or persons designated
41 by the administrator.

42 The 20% credit to the state general fund required by this subsection
43 (c) is to reimburse the state general fund for accounting, auditing, budg-

1 eting, legal, payroll, personnel and purchasing services, and any and all
2 other state governmental services, which are performed on behalf of the
3 administrator by other state agencies which receive appropriations from
4 the state general fund to provide such services.

5 (d) Every licensee shall, on or before the first day of January, pay to
6 the administrator the license fee prescribed under this subsection (1) for
7 each license held for the succeeding license year. Failure to pay the li-
8 cense fee within the time prescribed shall automatically revoke the
9 license.

10 (2) No license shall be issued unless the administrator, upon inves-
11 tigation, finds that the financial responsibility, character and fitness of the
12 applicant, and of the members thereof if the applicant is a copartnership
13 or association and of the officers and directors thereof, if the applicant is
14 a corporation, are such as to warrant belief that the business will be op-
15 erated honestly and fairly within the purposes of this act. An applicant
16 meets the minimum standard of financial responsibility for engaging in
17 the business of making supervised loans, under subsection (1) of K.S.A.
18 16a-2-301, and amendments thereto, only if:

19 (a) The applicant has filed with the administrator a proper surety
20 bond of at least \$100,000 which has been approved by the administrator.
21 The required surety bond may not be canceled by the licensee without
22 providing the administrator at least 30 days' prior written notice and must
23 provide within its terms that the bond shall not expire for two years after
24 the date of the surrender, revocation or expiration of the subject license,
25 whichever shall first occur; *and*

26 (b) *the applicant provides evidence in a form and manner prescribed*
27 *by the administrator that establishes the applicant will maintain a satis-*
28 *factory minimum net worth, as determined by the administrator, to en-*
29 *gage in credit transactions of the nature proposed by the applicant. Such*
30 *net worth requirements shall be established by the administrator pursuant*
31 *to rule and regulation and shall not exceed \$500,000 for each applicant*
32 *or licensee.*

33 (3) The administrator may deny any application or renewal for a su-
34 pervised loan license if the administrator finds:

35 (a) There is a refusal to furnish information required by the admin-
36 istrator within a reasonable time as fixed by the administrator; or

37 (b) any of the factors stated in K.S.A. 16a-2-303, and amendments
38 thereto, as grounds for denial, revocation or suspension of a license.

39 (4) Upon written request the applicant is entitled to a hearing on the
40 question of license qualifications if: (a) The administrator has notified the
41 applicant in writing that the application has been denied; or (b) the ad-
42 ministrator has not issued a license within 60 days after the application
43 for the license was filed. A request for a hearing may not be made more

1 than 15 days after the administrator has mailed a writing to the applicant
2 notifying the applicant that the application has been denied and stating
