

DATA PROCESSING PROCEDURE

Two indexing clerks in the offices of the Chief Clerk of the House and Secretary of the Senate code and underline the essential data to prepare for entry into the machine procedure. Formerly five clerks were employed keeping a 3 x 5 file card in single subject sequence only.

The Journals maintained by the House and Senate are the sources of information transcribed into punched cards. The method of selecting and coding all information to be recorded in punched cards is illustrated in the sample page from the Journal of the House (Example A).

Before the Legislative Indexing could be programmed, the words and phrases used in the House and Senate to describe the parliamentary actions and legislative procedures they each follow had to be standardized. A list of standard phrases which would have universal meaning in describing legislative actions was prepared. A sample of the standard phrases adopted and the codes assigned to each descriptive action is illustrated in Example B, "New Action Description File A/O May 22, 1963".

Since the work of legislative bodies is largely done by committees, another list was prepared listing all committees and assigning a distinguished code to each. (Example D)

The basis of the Legislative Indexing system is the creation of a record for each bill and joint resolution introduced before both House and Senate.

The bill record consists of the following data taken from the House Journal and Senate Journal:

- a. House or Senate File Number
- b. Name of legislator or legislative committee who introduced the measure.
- c. A near-verbatim statement on the bill's purpose and to whomever or whatever the legislation pertains. (The phrase "Relating to" is used to preface the descriptive statement or title.
- d. A list of legislative actions affecting the bill, described in the standard phraseology of the "New Action Description File", Example . The actions are in chronological order and list date and page of the Journal from which information is taken.

To put the bill record data in a form that the machine can read, the indexing clerks mark copies of the Journal that have been typed and proof-read for the printer who puts the journals in the printed form illustrated in Example A. The journalized data that will be recorded in punched cards is indicated by underlining the pertinent words and phrases. Actions are coded by writing appropriate codes in the margin opposite the bill, amendment or joint resolution. When the action involves referral to a committee, this action is indicated by code and the committee code is placed in the inner margin.

Everything that is underlined or indicated by code in the proof journal is punched into cards that record the bill activity.

The punched cards are verified and those recording a new bill, amendment or joint resolution which has been introduced for the first time are used to establish the bill record tape file. The punched cards recording the day's activity on bills already introduced are used to update the bill record file.

The cards are matched against the tape file of bill records and the history of the senate and house bills through the particular day are printed.

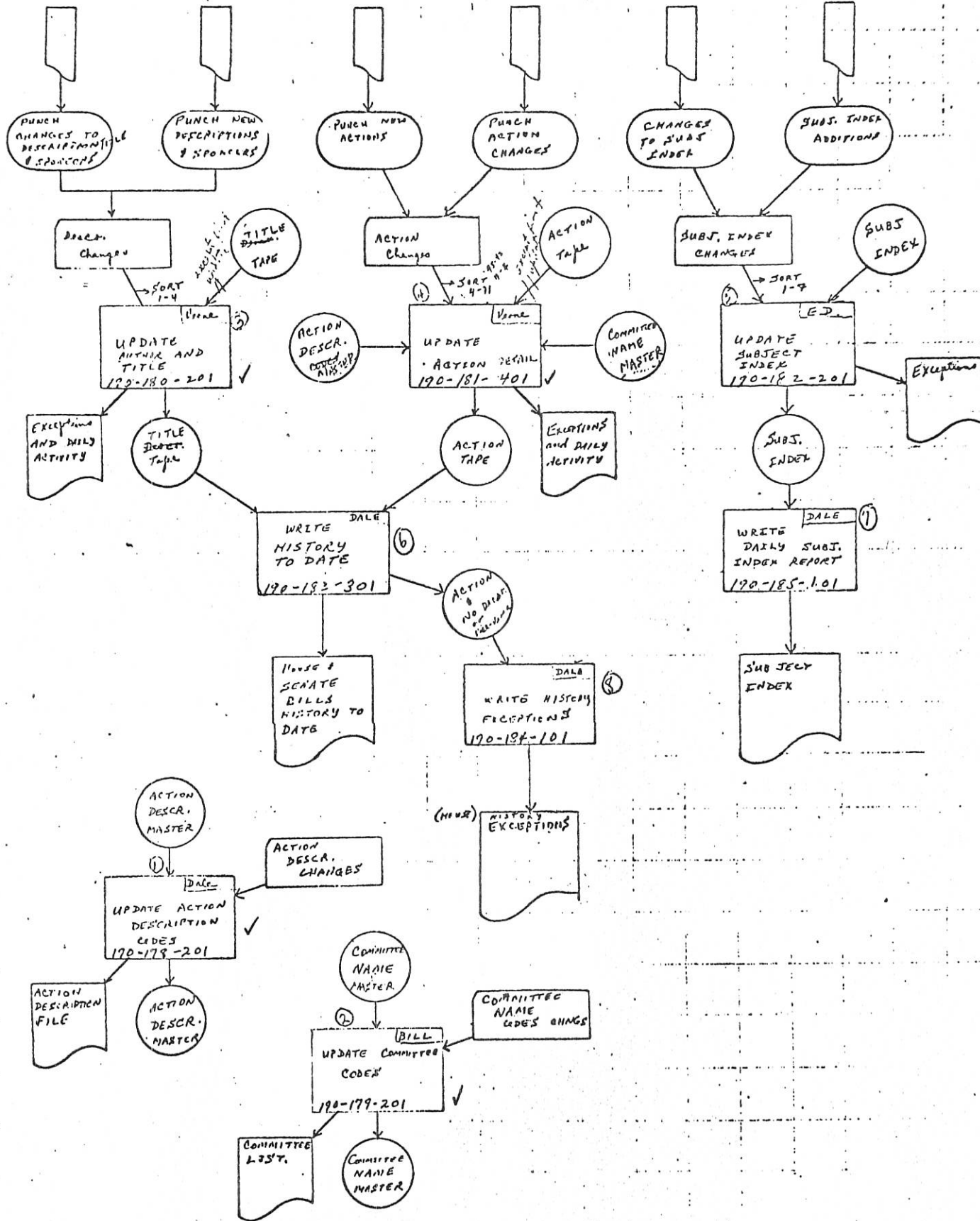
The punched cards prepared for a new bill, amendment or joint resolution can be used to produce the Subject Indexes automatically. The Subject Index (Example G) has a format design of alphabetized categories. The words and phrases used to title the bills in the Subject Index are exactly those describing the subject of the bill in the statement used in the bill histories. The Subject Index, in effect, uses a short title consisting of the words and phrases that describe who or what is affected by the proposed legislation. The house file or senate file numbers are included in the title to help the legislators locate the bill itself.

Where a bill can be classed in more than one category, it is listed wherever it is appropriate. Cross listing of subject title makes it easier for legislators to locate bills in which they are interested.

"3. So far as practicable, a county shall not be divided unless it is entitled to more than one (1) district, and senatorial district lines shall conform to township and voting district boundaries.

"Section 36. In 1965 and in the year ending in three (3) of each decade thereafter, the senatorial districts shall be redistricted.

"By November fifteen (15) in 1964 and in the year ending in two (2) of each decade thereafter, a ten (10) member redistricting commission shall be appointed to redistrict senatorial districts. The state central committee of the two (2) political parties casting the largest number of votes for governor in the last preceding election shall each appoint five (5) qualified voters. If a party fails to submit such names to the secretary of state by November fifteen (15), the supreme court shall promptly appoint the members from such party. Compensation for members of the commission shall be established by law.

"By February one (1) of the year following its appointment, the redistricting commission shall file with the secretary of state a statement of its action, including the boundaries and classification of senatorial districts. To be valid, this statement must be signed by seven (7) members. The general assembly may amend this statement or enact a substitute, but such action must be taken by May one (1) of such year.

"If the redistricting commission does not file its redistricting statement by February one (1) of the year following its appointment, the general assembly shall redistrict the senatorial districts in a single legislative enactment by May one (1) of such year.

"If the commission and the general assembly fail to redistrict within the time allotted, the supreme court shall redistrict by October one (1) of such year. The action of the court shall be entered and certified to the secretary of state by court order, which shall be final.

"Before June one (1) of such year, any ten (10) members of the general assembly may petition the supreme court to determine whether the redistricting of the commission or the general assembly substantially complies with the redistricting provisions of the constitution. If the redistricting substantially complies, the court shall so notify the secretary of state, and the decision shall be final. If the court determines that the redistricting does not substantially comply, it shall redistrict as provided in the preceding paragraph of this section.

"Section 37. Redistricting shall take effect beginning for the nomination and election of senators for the next regular session of the general assembly following the adoption of the redistricting statement, law, or court order. When a congressional or senatorial district shall be composed of two (2) or more counties, it shall not be entirely

separated by any county belonging to another district, and no county shall be divided in forming a congressional district."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution of the State of Iowa has been adopted and agreed to by the Fifty-ninth (59th) General Assembly, and having been referred by such Assembly to the Legislature to be chosen in the next general election, being the Sixtieth (60th) General Assembly, and having been duly published in accordance with and in compliance with the direction of the Fifty-ninth (59th) General Assembly, it is now adopted and agreed to by the Sixtieth (60th) General Assembly in this Joint Resolution, and shall be submitted to the people at a special election to be held for that purpose on the first Tuesday in December in the year nineteen hundred sixty-three (1963) in accordance with the directions of Article X of the Constitution of Iowa. The submission at said special election shall in all respects be governed and conducted as prescribed by law and the Constitution of Iowa for the submission of a constitutional amendment at a general election.

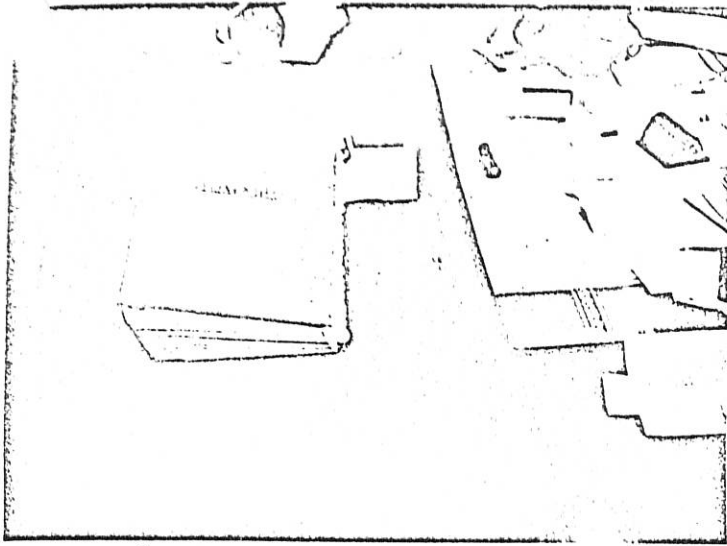

The Iowa General Assembly, consisting of a senate and a house of representatives, carries out the legislative functions of the Iowa state government. Since the assembly convenes in January of each odd-numbered year and generally completes its work sometime in May, many legislative matters await the assembly by the time it reconvenes. In order for the assembly to function properly, individual members and committees must have complete information on bills and resolutions introduced and must be able to follow these bills and resolutions throughout the session.

In keeping with fairly uniform practice, therefore, legislators are furnished with:

1. Printed copies of the bills and amendments introduced in the General Assembly branch in which they serve. These copies are filed in numerical sequence in a special binder called the "bill book".
2. A complete year-to-date history (including a subject index) of the legislative actions in both the house of representatives and the senate. This is issued three times: (1) just before recess, (2) 30 days later, and (3) when the session is over.
3. A copy of either the daily Journal of the House (H. J.) or Journal of the Senate (S. J.), depending upon the General Assembly branch in which the legislators serve.

Traditionally this material has reached legislators too late to provide absolutely current information. Copies

of bills and amendments, for example, have usually been received about three days after their introduction; and two weeks have commonly elapsed between cutoff date and delivery date for the bill history and subject index.

In order to minimize this time lapse in supplying essential information, the Iowa General Assembly has mechanized the area of legislative indexing through the application of an IBM 1401 Data Processing System. The new procedure was begun during the 1963 session and immediately aroused interest on the part of other state governments, as indicated by the number of high-ranking representatives who have since attended seminars on the Iowa system. The 1401 makes information on legislative matters quickly and easily available to individual legislators and committees and speeds the delivery of midterm and final legislative compendiums.

William R. Kendrick, chief clerk of the house, has expressed considerable satisfaction with the manner in which the legislative indexing program has been mechanized. Mr. Kendrick, who has had extensive experience in developing methods of gathering and disseminating legislative information, and who has served for years in this area on a committee of the Council of State Governments, is pleased with the financial saving in the printing and preparation of the indexes. For example, 400 copies of the midterm comprehensive bill history, subject index, and bill roster (a list of bills and individual legislators or committees who introduced them) were printed at a cost of only \$1.25 per book.

STATUTORY INSTRUMENTS MECHANIZED

Before the introduction of the 1401 Data Processing System, individual legislators and committees in the Iowa General Assembly relied upon the chief clerk of the house and the secretary of the senate for current information on legislative matters, and for help in finding specific bills by subject. The actions in the house and senate were manually posted on 3" x 5" cards by clerks and secretaries. An index to the history files was also maintained manually.

The first objectives of the mechanized legislative indexing program were to make current information more readily available to all legislators and to develop a more comprehensive and accurate method for preparing a subject index.

To provide daily information on the status of bills before the house and senate, reports were designed which would contain (1) a daily history of house bills,

with a record of all previous legislative actions taken on the measures, and (2) a similar history of senate bills. Bills are identified by "H. F. " or "S. F. " (house file or senate file), along with their numerical sequence, and the name of the individual or committee sponsoring them. Each bill has a descriptive title which is followed by the actions taken (in chronological order) and the journal page number on which those actions are recorded. Information contained in bill histories and indexes is derived from the journals maintained by the

house and senate, as explained under "Data Processing Procedure".

A third daily output of the system is a current subject index, which is divided into alphabetized categories. For each bill, the index shows a short title derived from the descriptive title in the bill history. The house file and senate file numbers are included in the index to help the legislators locate the bill itself. When a bill can be classed in more than one category, it is cross-indexed for easier reference.

Thus, during the first session in which data processing equipment was used in legislative indexing, Iowa's legislators had more up-to-date information on legislative matters than ever before. Beginning with the next term, it is planned to furnish daily bill histories and a subject index to every legislator on an overnight basis. The printer used with this system will print information directly on mats or "masters" from which the required number copies will be reproduced by an offset process.

DATA PROCESSING PROCEDURE

The basis of the legislative indexing system was the creation of a punched card record for each bill and joint resolution introduced before the general assembly. Information sources for these records were the house and senate journals which had been typed and proofread for the printer.

In many cases, however, a given word or phrase used in these journals had a different meaning in each of several different regions; and in other cases a number of different words or phrases all had the same meaning, even to different branches of the Iowa General Assembly. Before the legislative indexing could be programmed, therefore, the words and phrases used in the journals to describe parliamentary actions and legislative procedures had to be standardized, and a "New Action Description File" prepared. Iowa's standardization of phraseology has been of interest to other state legislatures, which recognize mutual adoption of standard terms as essential to better exchange of legislative information.

Since the work of legislative bodies is done largely by committees, a list of all committees was also prepared, with a distinguishing code assigned to each.

Whereas five clerks were formerly employed to keep a 3" x 5" card file in single-subject sequence, two indexing clerks now prepare the essential data for entry into the machine procedure. The clerks underline pertinent words and phrases on the pages of the journal, and assign appropriate codes to actions in the margin of the page opposite the bill, amendment, or joint resolution. When the action taken by the house or senate involves a committee, that committee is designated by code in the inner margin.

Everything that is underlined or indicated by code on the pages of the proof journal is punched into cards that record the bill activity. The punched cards are verified, and those recording a bill, amendment, or joint resolution introduced for the first time are used to establish the bill record tape file. The punched cards recording the day's activity on bills already introduced are used to update the bill record file.

The cards are matched against the tape file of bill records, and the history of the senate and house bills through the particular day is printed. The resultant printout is the daily bill history. The punched cards prepared for a new bill, amendment, or joint resolution can be used to produce the subject index.

CONCLUSION

Visiting legislators have witnessed demonstrations in which the IBM 1401 has rearranged data in order to produce bill records and indexes in the form required by the respective legislative bodies. The Iowa General Assembly itself is giving serious thought to changing the arrangement of the index. Instead of having alphabetized subject categories, the index may be alphabetized by keywords selected from bill titles. If this is done, words and phrases in the journals will no longer be underlined, but entire paragraphs will be transcribed to punched cards. copies thereof that may be by law required, and the secretary of state
shall within ten (10) days after the same are printed make out and
deliver to the state printer an the index to the same; and the state
printer shall within twenty (20) days thereafter print said index
and deliver to the secretary of state copies of such laws duly indexed
and bound, in such manner as may be by law required.
