RE: Scheduling the Legislative Workload

Pursuant to the Committee's request, the staff has assembled data relative to the legislature's workload as reflected by numbers of bills introduced in the 1963, 1965, 1967, and 1968 Sessions. Accompanying tables show the bill introduction patterns on a daily basis for those sessions.

The magnitude of the legislative workload during a session is often illustrated by citing the total number of bills introduced. Such a figure is only a partial reflection of the legislative work. For example, in 1965, 604 of the 1,019 bills were introduced in the House. In addition, the House received 269 bills that passed the Senate. The workload is further amplified by the number of times each bill is considered by a committee, conference committee, or by the House and Senate in regular session.

Legislative Deadlines

It has been common for state legislatures to establish certain deadlines for the purpose of expediting business. Such deadlines have generally not been formal, that is, spelled out in the rules of procedure. They have been established during a session to meet particular needs. Kansas has followed this basic pattern for the years included in this study. House and Senate concurrent resolutions have been adopted establishing such deadlines. Cut-off dates were set for introduction of bills sponsored by individuals, and for committee-sponsored bills in each of the sessions reviewed. However, certain committees such as the House and Senate Ways and Means and Assessment and Taxation committees were regularly excluded from these deadlines. Another deadline established by concurrent resolution in each session, except in 1968, has been to conclude consideration of legislative matters and to set the date for final adjournment. The constitutional provision for sessions in even-numbered years, adopted in 1966, effectively fixed the adjournment date in 1968, at the 60th calendar day.

In two of the four sessions reviewed (sessions of 1965 and 1968), it was found necessary to extend the cut-off date for the introduction of bills sponsored by individuals by one or two days. An apparent reason for this was to relieve somewhat the burden on the bill drafting staff in the Revisor of Statutes' office.

During the 1963 Session, an additional deadline, effective after the 51st legislative day in the Senate and the 53rd House legislative day, was established. It related to the limitations on the types of bills considered by the two houses:

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 27,- (1963) - "Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Kansas, the House of Representatives concurring therein: That the House cease consideration of House bills, except committee bills (a) which pertain to the raising of revenue and the levying of taxes, (b) which require or make appropriations, (c) which provide for the reapportionment of the legislative districts of the state of either the House or the Senate, (d) which pertain to education or the financing of schools, and except conference reports and amendments, on Saturday, March 23, 1963; and that the Senate cease consideration of Senate bills, except committee bills (a) which pertain to the raising of revenue and the levying of taxes, (b) which require or make appropriations, (c) which provide for the reapportionment of the legislative districts of the state of either the House or the Senate, (d) which pertain to education or the financing of schools, and except conference reports and amendments, on Saturday, March 23, 1963."

Other deadlines have been observed by the legislature during the final days of a session. These have been based primarily on informal agreements, and are designed to maintain an orderly pattern for handling of the workload in the final days.

Some states are now establishing schedules for the various legislative activities. In 1967, Oklahoma began meeting in annual 90-day sessions without restrictions as to subject matter. As is the case in Kansas, there is a provision for carrying over legislation to the second session in the biennium. The Oklahoma schedule is found in the House rules. The schedule adopted for use by the Michigan legislature for 1968 also is shown on the following page:

There are many alternatives available for scheduling the work of the legislature. Under any proposed plan it would probably be impossible to eliminate peak work periods for the various stages. Proposed experimental schedules could take into account the need for adequate flexibility to meet the demands of the legislature. If the schedule were placed in the House and Senate rules, it could be altered only by suspending the rules upon an emergency motion. If the concurrent resolution is used for scheduling the work of the legislature, subsequent resolutions could provide the needed flexibility.

Deadlines established at each session of the legislature affect certain agencies which provide supporting services. The Revisor of Statutes' office (bill drafting), the Printing Plant, and the Secretary of State's office are examples of offices where the work is extremely demanding during certain of the critical stages in the legislative process. Scheduling a more evenly balanced workload might not eliminate the problems experienced by these agencies related to peak workloads, but might provide some relief.

During the last three "90-day" sessions, the legislature has met an average of about 65 legislative days. Unrestricted bill introduction by individuals and committees has been allowed through about half of the session. The average cut-off date for introduction of individual bills for the three year period has been the 29th legislative day. The general cut-off date for committee bills has been about two-thirds of the way through the session - about the 43rd legislative day. During the remaining legislative days (est. 20) of each session, a minimum of 50 additional bills have been introduced for consideration. Thus, while efforts must be concentrated in the last 20-25 legislative days on considering many of the 900-plus bills introduced prior to the cut-off dates, the legislature still receives an average of 2 or 3 new bills each day for its consideration. A general policy consideration is whether or not it would be helpful to schedule cut-off dates for bill introductions earlier in the sessions. The annual general sessions amendment and the carry-over provision from odd-to even-numbered years could be a rationale for such a change in scheduling.

It has been traditional in the closing days of a session for each house, on an informal basis, to discontinue consideration of its own bills for the purpose of concentrating on the bills received from the second house. In the last one or two days, each house is working concurrently on items of business on its calendar and on conference committees. During these days, difficulties are encountered in receiving committee reports, getting explanations of bills, and receiving conference committee reports because of the many activities occurring simultaneously. The records show that most of the final conference committee decisions are made on the final two days of the session during which bills are considered. The sample schedule included in this report is designed to relieve somewhat this last minute congestion.

The first general session in an even-numbered year under the 1966 constitutional amendment was held in 1968. Theoretically,

some relief in the mounting legislative workload should have resulted. However, the log-jam at the end of the session was equal to that of previous general sessions. In addition to the 323 carry-over bills from 1967, the 1968 Legislature received 758 new bills. Decisions had to be made on more than 1,000 bills in the 44 legislative days. In 1965, decisions were required on about 60 fewer bills than in 1968, and the legislature had about 20 more legislative days than the 1968 Legislature had to make those decisions.

Any proposed schedule of the legislative workload requires certain policy decisions. The following schedule is illustrative only of one approach that might be used to accomplish a more evenly distributed or manageable legislative workload. Based on committee discussion, the illustrative schedule is fairly rigid in setting early deadlines, particularly in the even years. Rules could be adopted in the House and Senate incorporating such a timetable, or it could be established by a concurrent resolution. Deadlines such as those relating to introduction of bills could be explained to legislators at the preorganizational meetings following the general elections.

One reason given in support of adopting the annual sessions amendment in 1966, was that during the short session in even years, time would be available for in-depth consideration of major policy matters, as well as to state budget requirements. If need be, such policy matters could be carried over from the odd year sessions for further study. A proliferation of bills introduced during the even-year sessions could minimize the effectiveness of this arrangement. To offset this the sample schedule shown on the previous page contains rather short deadlines for bill introduction in the even-year session, particularly for bills sponsored by individuals.

Under the proposal, the Ways and Means Committees would not be bound by any of the bill introduction deadlines. This is partly because until the deadline for conference committees, it is not always possible to determine completely the items to be included in the omnibus bill. When necessary, other committees, such as Claims and Accounts, could introduce bills beyond the suggested deadlines by suspending the rules or adopting a new resolution.

It might be possible to shorten the period allowed for bill introduction during sessions in even-numbered years even further than is illustrated in this plan. Emphasis could be placed on requesting bill drafts during the interim from the Revisor's office. Coordination with the printer should be emphasized so that bills introduced in the early days of the session can be printed ahead of time, thereby leveling off the early session load at the plant. Printed bills could be available immediately upon introduction.

In summary, the plan outlined herein moves up and clarifies some of the deadlines the legislature has become familiar with over the years relating to introduction and consideration of bills listed on the calendar. A specific time is set aside for conference committee work and somewhat more time is allotted for the legislature to give consideration to gubernatorial vetoes.
