Bills Considered: S.B. #494 Hearing
All members present except: Senators Herd and Saar
Conferees: Rep. George White, John Rose of the Kansas Pharmaceutical Assoc., Topeka, Joe Shalinsky of the State Board of Pharmacy, Kansas City, and Ray Miller of the State Board of Pharmacy, Leavenworth.

Chairman Norman E. Gaar called the meeting to order.

Mr. John Rose of the Kansas Pharmaceutical Association testified at this hearing of Senate Bill #494 and will send the committee his printed testimony.

Mr. Rose stated that the structure membership of Board of Pharmacy would change from five (5) to seven (7) members appointed by the governor and to serve three year terms. He said in his opinion one lay member would be adequate in place of the two suggested. Mr. Rose is in favor of the seventh member being a practicing physician instead of a Board of Health member. Recommends delaying the structuring of the boards at this time. He is concerned about the financing of a board of this size. It is a fee agency operating on fees collected, and he does not think money would be there to support it. He suggests delaying this until fiscal problems can be studied. Senator Robinson suggested this bill would be totally useless if the Executive Reorganization passes. Mr. Rose said the Board had done a good job of controlling the people, and asked that the control not be taken away from the. Five (5) Pharmacy members and one (1) doctor and one (1) layman agreeable to Mr. Rose. Representative White said this is the very best method of all boards. State divided into two districts, can submit names and anyone can be nominated on the floor. Would give the governor a list of ten names of the best qualified people to represent the people throughout the state and the governor would be able to choose one or two from this list. Senator Gaar stated that they could not impinge upon powers. They cannot require governor to make appointment from list submitted by any governmental agency. Mr. Rose said the Kansas Supreme Court has upheld this decision. 179KS638. Senator Gaar doubts this issue was presented. Senator West asked Mr. Rose if these people would be subject to advise and consent of the Senate and would Mr. Rose have any objections to this. Mr. Rose stated he would not.

Senator Gaar announced we will not be able to hear the cosmetologists tomorrow due to conflict, will hear barbers on Bill #512.

Senator Gaar said hopefully Mr. Doherty will be at committee meeting Thursday to explain the proposal on civil rights bill.

The committee will meet Wednesday morning, January 26, 1972 at 9:00.
