Following a call to order by Senator Joseph C. Harder, Chairman, Senator Allen moved, and Senator Angell seconded a motion to approve minutes of the Committee meeting of Tuesday, February 1, and the motion carried.

Chairman Harder then distributed printouts on School Finance to Committee members and explained that these had been prepared by Mr. Dale Dennis of the Department of Education (Attachments 1 and 2). The Chairman said he thought this information would be helpful to Committee members as they consider school finance. He reminded the Committee that the deadline requirement for school finance bills is different from other bills.

SB 63 - The Chairman then called upon Ferman Marsh, Superintendent of USD 450, who testified on behalf of United School Administrators as a proponent for SB 63. Mr. Marsh enumerated reasons why the State Department of Education should assume fiscal management responsibility from the Division of Accounts and Reports. He stated that school districts depend upon the State Board for budget workshops, for state aid and other monetary payments, and that they regularly seek counsel from the State Board. The State Board, he continued, is the logical place where budget documents should originate. Mr. Marsh testified that budget documents over the last ten years have been very complicated and that the present form is very comprehensive and lends itself well for auditing. If there should be any revision of the present budget form, he felt that USA should be involved in that revision.

The Chairman recognized Dr. Jerry Schreiner, Executive Director of United School Administrators, who introduced Superintendent Leo Lake, USD 435, and Superintendent Charles Stuart, USD 379. Both conferees stated that they supported Mr. Marsh's testimony and that they were available for questioning.

The Chairman said that further discussion on the bill will be at a later time when the Committee can, also, consider a proposed amendment that had been previously submitted to the Committee by Mr. James Cobler of the Division of Accounts and Reports. The Chairman said he would, also, like to have the old and new budget forms for Committee members to examine and compare before action is taken on the bill. Section, who was present, informed the Chairman that Mr. Cobler would bring these forms whenever they should be requested.

SB 79 - Mr. Charles Johns, who had presented written testimony (Attachment 3) to the Committee in opposition to SB 79, responded to questions by the Committee.

When the Chairman asked the Committee's pleasure regarding SB 79, Senator Bogina proposed a conceptual motion for an amendment whereby a person elected to a board previous to the effective date of this act, could retain his elected office for one term only. This motion was seconded by Senator Angell, and the amendment was adopted.

Senator Bogina then moved that SB 79, as amended, be recommended favorably for passage. This was seconded by Senator Montgomery.

Senator Parrish offered a substitute conceptual motion which would exclude those persons involved with job contracts for the school district from holding school board positions in their district. This was seconded by Senator Winter, but the motion did not carry. The Chairman then called for a vote on the primary motion made by Senator Bogina and seconded by Senator Montgomery to recommend SB 79, as amended, favorably for passage. The motion carried.

The Chairman then recognized Senator Kerr, who inquired whether or not the Committee would like to introduce a bill which would allow continuity to the competency based education testing program. Senator Kerr explained how there could be a one year gap in the testing program without passage of this bill. Senator Kerr moved, and Senator Montgomery seconded a motion to have this bill be introduced as a Committee bill, and the motion carried.

The Chairman adjourned the meeting at 2:30 p.m.

SUMMARY OF GOVERNOR'S SCHOOL FINANCE PROPOSAL

The Governor, in his budget, is recommending that the School District Equalization Act limitations for fiscal year 1984 be set at 4%-8%. Additional budget authority of 1.5 percent would also be available provided that the school district has increased the total amount of teacher salaries (including fringe benefits) of the prior year by the same percentage that the budget limitations were permitted to increase under the 4%-8% limitation. All of the additional 1.5 percent would have to be spent on the improvement of teacher salaries. This would translate into 2.5 to 3.0 percent toward the improvement of teacher salaries. For example, if the total teacher salaries for a school district amounts to \$1,000,000 in the 1982-83 school year and the budget limitation under the 4%-8% was permitted to increase five percent (5%), the school district would have to provide \$1,050,000 (\$1,000,000 times 5%) towards teacher salaries before the additional 1.5 percent of the budget per pupil could be increased. All of this 1.5 percent would then have to be spent for the improvement of teacher salaries and their fringe benefits.

The Governor provided for increases in general state aid and income tax rebate in the amount of \$62,200,000. This would result in a property tax increase of an estimated \$28,300,000. This level of funding would equate to approximately 48.0 percent of the total statewide school district general fund budgets and would provide an estimated average teacher salary increase of eight percent (8%).

The Governor also recommended that school districts' authority to transfer from the general fund to the capital outlay and food service funds be discontinued. The fiscal year 1983 budgets of school districts provide for approximately \$1,900,000 to be transferred from the general fund to the capital outlay fund. The school district food service transfers are budgeted at approximately \$5,650,000.

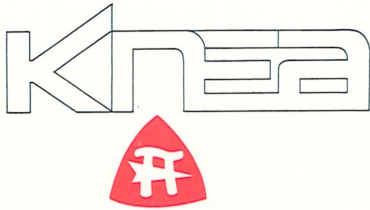

Testimony

Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, my name is Charles W. Johns, Director of Governmental Relations, representing the Kansas-National Education Association.

A bill similar to the one you have before you today in SB 79 has been introduced in the Kansas Legislature during the last several sessions. It has been defeated each time, and rightly so, because it has numerous faults to our way of thinking.

First, it would remove autonomy from the local Board of Education by telling it what it can and can't do regarding who is elected.

Secondly, it imposes its will on the local citizens by selecting prior to an election who can or cannot become a candidate.

It is discriminatory because it takes away a right that teachers now have.

There is also invaluable experience to be gleaned from a teacher's expertise in educational decisions. They would be contributing members on a wide range of issues. Boards of Education should not be limited in their talent pool.

There are several Attorney General's opinions that speak in a positive manner to a teacher being able to serve on their own local board.

I ask that you again defeat this discriminatory proposed piece of legislation.
