

MINUTES OF THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

Introduction of bill concerning change in Judicial Districts

Senator Pomeroy discussed the judicial reapportionment measure passed during the 1982 session, and made suggestions for changes in that measure. He distributed Attachments A, B and C for the committee's use during his discussion. He asked that a bill be introduced and referred to the Senate Judiciary Committee to establish a new judicial district and change judges' assignments, etc. He said it would mean repeal of a 1982 law, and the net effect is that there would be a saving to the state in the current fiscal year and next fiscal year.

Motion was made by Senator Werts and seconded by Senator Gaines to introduce a bill as recommended by Senator Pomeroy. The motion carried by roll call vote.

SB 92 - Appropriations FY 1984, Adjutant General

Senator Werts presented the subcommittee report on this section (Section 2). Following several questions from committee members, motion was made by Senator Werts and seconded by Senator Talkington to adopt the subcommittee report. The motion carried by voice vote.

Motion was made by Senator Werts and seconded by Senator Bogina to introduce a bill recommended in No. 3 of the subcommittee report to create an "Armories and Units General Fees Fund" and to refer the measure to Committee of the Whole. The motion carried by roll call vote.

SB 400 - Osteopathic scholarships

Senator Doyen briefly explained the measure. Mr. Riehms then spoke to the measure. He called the committee's attention to the contents of Lines 54 through 59, and noted that this would give the Board of Regents no authority to establish criteria and it could lead to arbitrary selections. He further expressed concern that, if it is required that initial consideration be given to five upperclassmen, the selection may be restrictive. Senator Doyen explained that this is predicated on keeping the same number of scholarships--a total of 60 or 15 each year.

Motion was made by Senator Doyen and seconded by Senator Talkington to delete language in Section 1 (d), beginning on line 54 with the word "Except" and ending on line 59 after the period. The motion carried by voice vote.

Motion was made by Senator Doyen and seconded by Senator Warren to report SB 400 as amended favorably for passage. The motion carried by roll call vote.

SB 19 - Residency requirements for postsecondary educational institutions

Motion was made by Senator Warren and seconded by Senator Talkington to report the bill adversely.

A motion was made by Senator Doyen and seconded by Senator Gaines to require nine months' in the state to establish residency for tuition purposes, and to include community colleges, Washburn University, and all Regents' institutions. The motion carried by voice vote.

Motion was made by Senator Gaines and seconded by Senator Doyen to report SB 19 as amended favorably for passage. Following an extended discussion, a roll call vote was taken, and the motion lost on a tie vote.

SB 72 - Tuition grants for army and air national guard students

Motion was made by Senator Talkington and seconded by Senator Bogina to amend SB 72 to phase in the tuition grant program over a period of five years. It was noted that the fiscal note would be determined by legislative appropriation. The motion carried by voice vote.

Motion was made by Senator Talkington and seconded by Senator Warren to report SB 72 as amended favorably for passage. The motion carried by roll call vote.

SB 152 - Supplemental appropriations FY 1983, Department of Corrections

Senator Hess explained that the community corrections program in Sedgwick County will not be ready until June 1, and it is the general consensus of the people involved that SB 152 is not necessary.

Motion was made by Senator Talkington and seconded by Senator Werts to report SB 152 adversely. The motion carried by roll call vote.

SB 389 - Accessibility of state building construction documents

Mr. Griqqs distributed a balloon of page 2 of SB 389 with suggested amendments. Following a short discussion, motion was made by Senator Gaines and seconded by Senator Bogina to amend SB 389 by adopting Option 2 on the balloon. The motion carried by voice vote. (See Attachment E)

Motion was made by Senator Talkington and seconded by Senator Gaines to report SB 389 favorably as amended. The motion carried by roll call vote.

SB 393 - Transfers of moneys between funds, Department of Administration

Motion was made by Senator Talkington and seconded by Senator Hein to report SB 393 favorably for passage. The motion carried by roll call vote.

SB 22 - Multi-year appropriations for Kansas state penitentiary

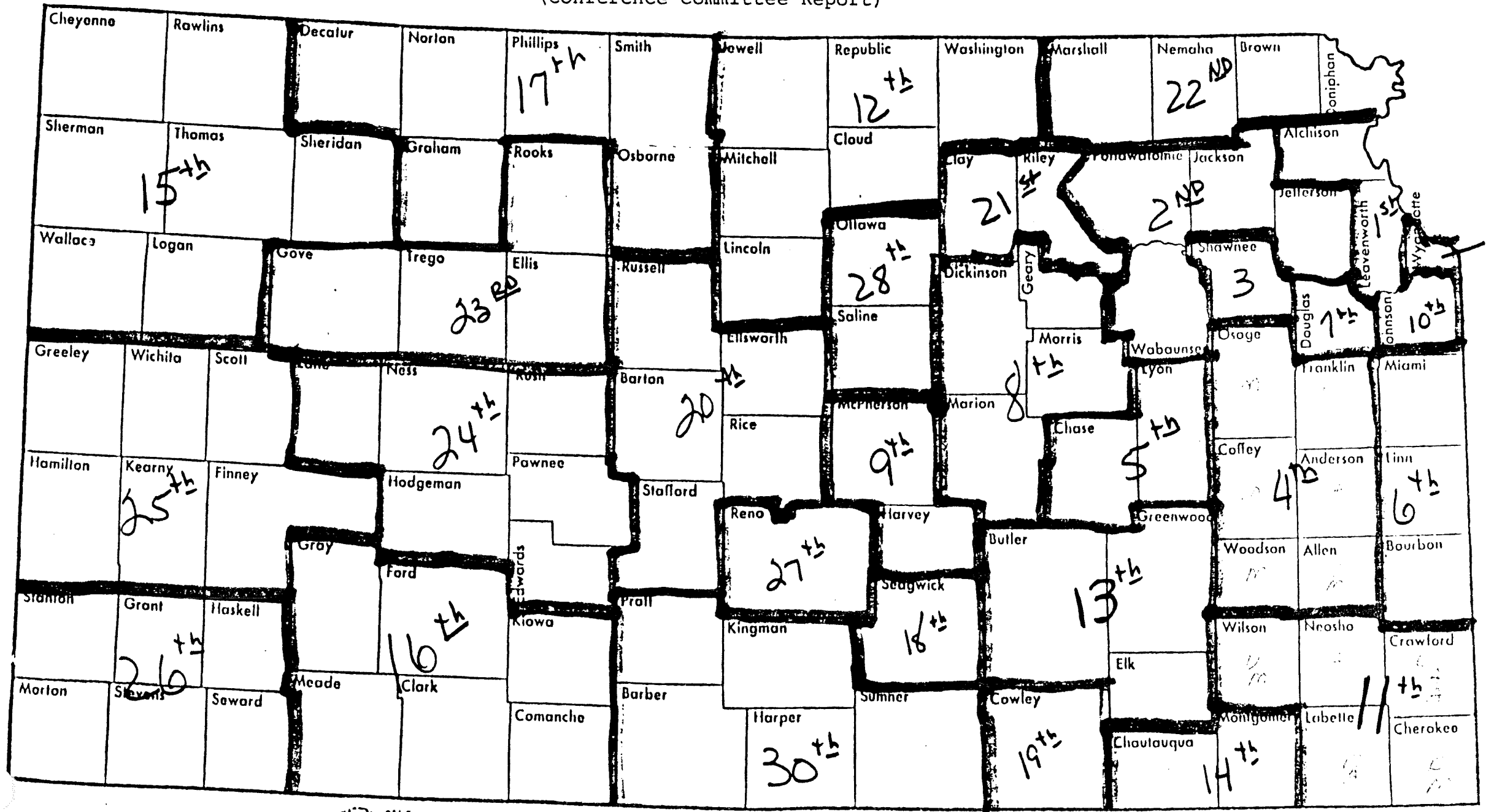
Motion was made by Senator Bogina and seconded by Senator Talkington to report SB 22 adversely. The motion carried by roll call vote.

Introduction of bill concerning Kansas Corporation Commission part time employees, as suggested in SB 109 subcommittee report

Motion was made by Senator Hein and seconded by Senator Warren to introduce a bill amending K.S.A. 75-2935, Subsection (1) (i) by deleting the words "or other competent authority." The motion carried by voice vote.

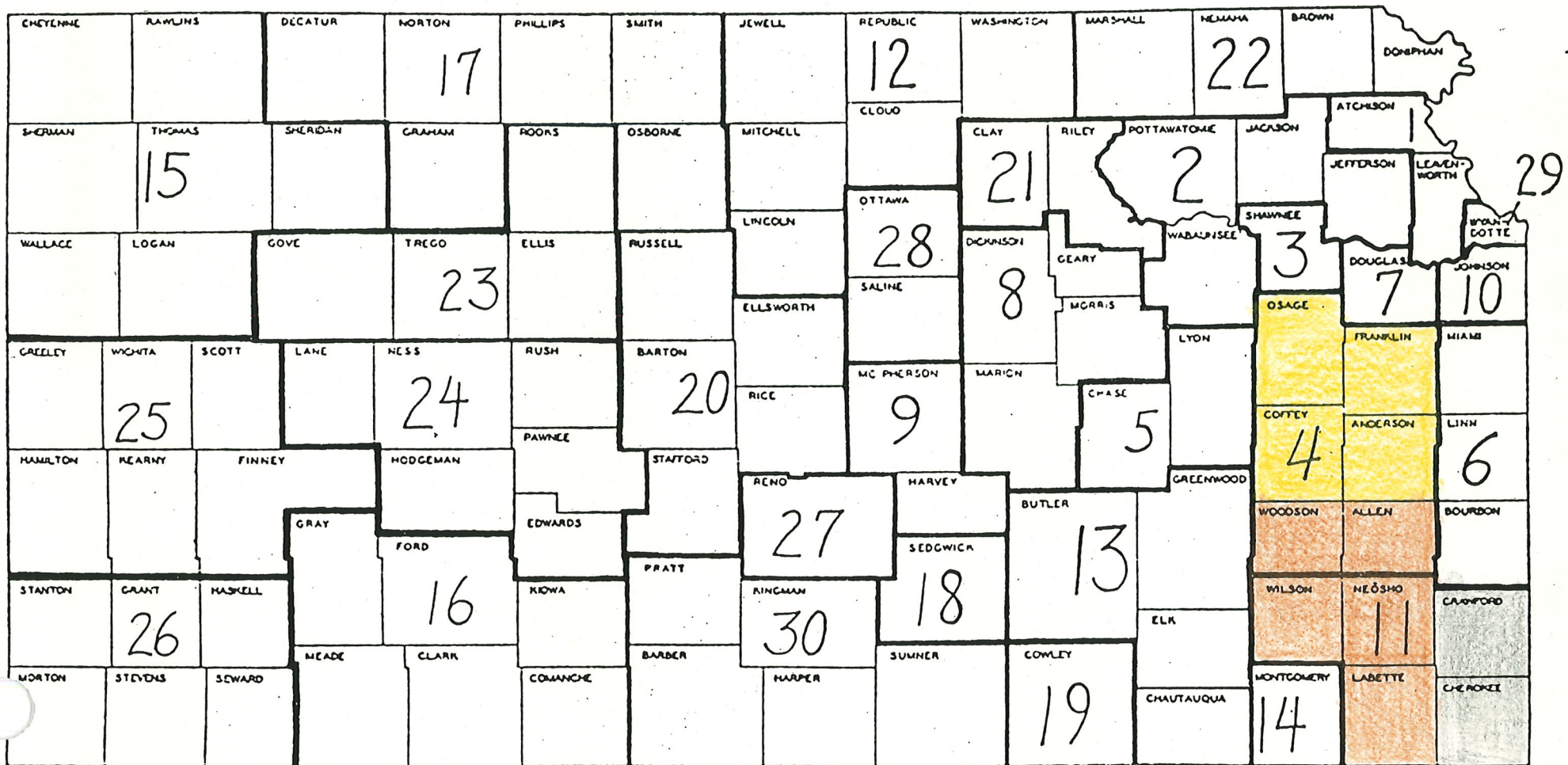

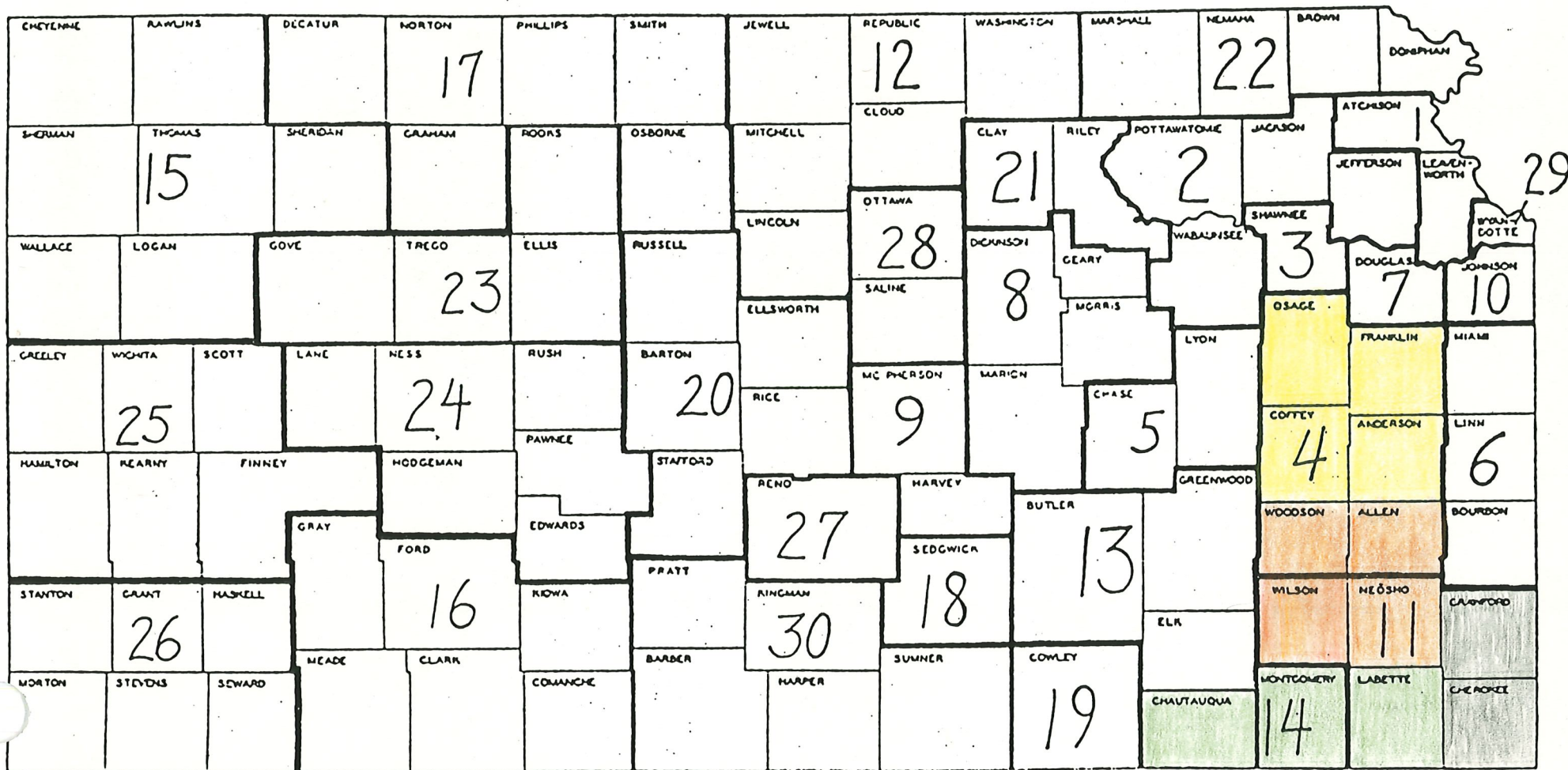

PROPOSED BILL NO. _____

For Consideration by Senate Committee on Ways and Means

AN ACT concerning the adjutant general; creating the armories and units general fees fund; prescribing the disposition of certain reimbursements and other receipts; authorizing rules and regulations for the administration thereof.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. (a) There is hereby created in the state treasury the armories and units general fees fund which shall be administered by the adjutant general.

(b) The adjutant general shall remit all moneys received pursuant to policies and rules and regulations of the adjutant general as reimbursements or other receipts from Kansas army or air national guard units or Kansas state guard units or personnel of such units for excess or private expenditures or services including, but not limited to, armory utility costs incurred during periods of armory rentals, costs of excess or private use of telecommunications services and costs of awards and decorations, to the state treasurer at least monthly. Upon receipt of each such remittance, the state treasurer shall deposit the entire amount thereof in the state treasury and such amount shall be credited to the armories and units general fees fund.

(c) The adjutant general may adopt rules and regulations establishing policies and procedures for the administration of the armories and units general fees fund.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the statute book.

0065 *purposes to the extent deemed appropriate by the secretary in*
0066 *the best interests of the state.*
