

MINUTES OF THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE AND SMALL BUSINESS

Representative Long moved to approve the Committee minutes of January 15, 1985, January 23, 1985 and January 24, 1985. Representative Apt seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Harland Priddle introduced Don Jacka, Assistant Secretary, Kansas State Board of Agriculture, and Loreen McMillan and Mike Burns of the Marketing Division. He said Don Jacka would meet the Committee on Thursday and escort them to the Kansas State Board of Agriculture. He gave a review of the activities of the Kansas State Board of Agriculture, along with a slide presentation. He distributed handouts to the Committee, Attachment A. Mr. Priddle stated the Board of Agriculture has a budget of \$11,000,000 and employs 300 people, of which 180 work in Topeka and the remaining 120 work throughout the state. He mentioned there is a continuing development of state water resources, development and survey of pest detection and expansion of markets for Kansas agricultural products, such as China, Hong Kong and France.

The Chairman expressed an interest in the possibility of the Committee touring the seed inspection and weights and measures facilities in Topeka.

Representative Hamm introduced Jim Brownlee, Publisher of Equity, from Enid, Oklahoma.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:50 a.m.

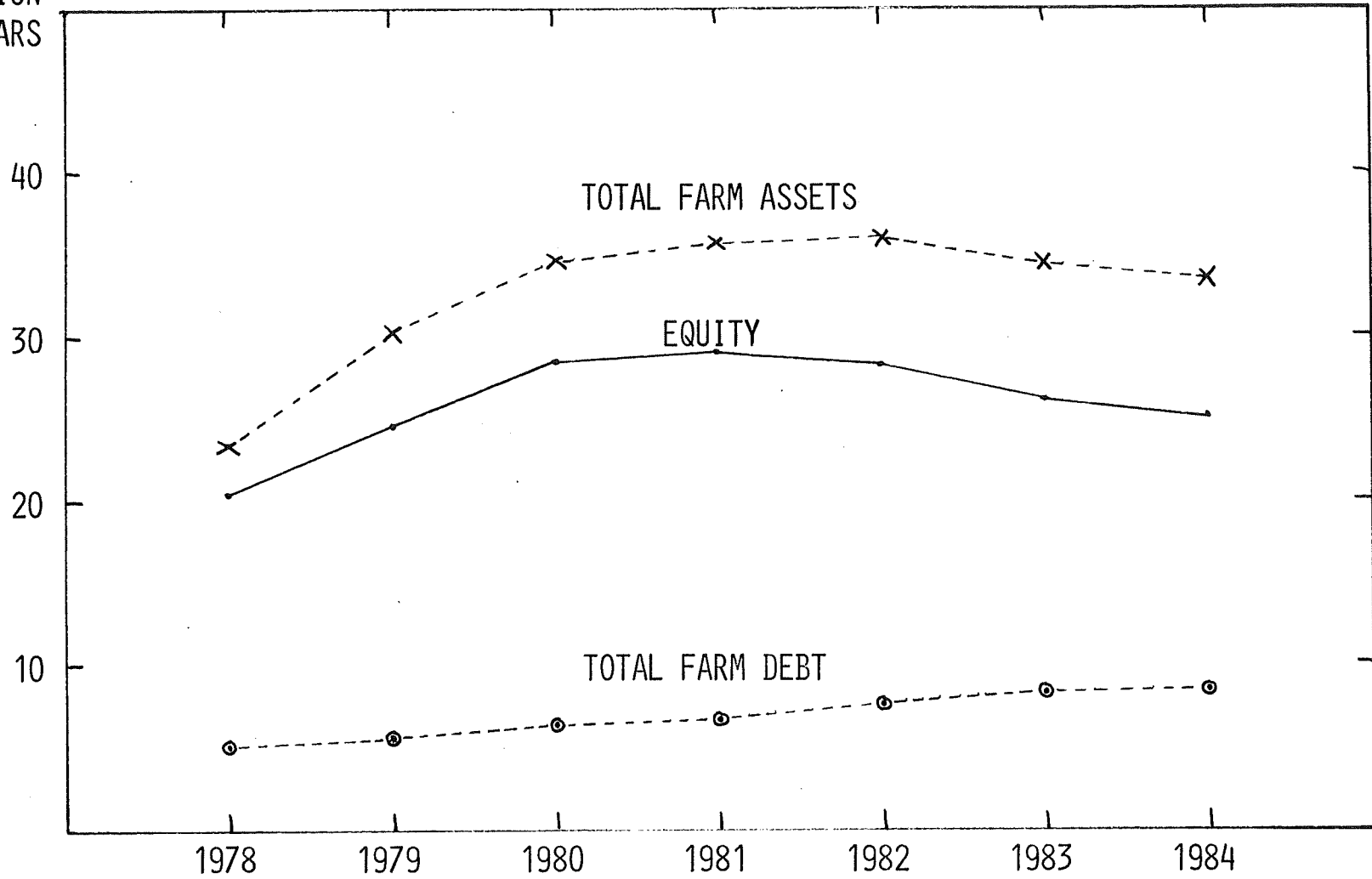

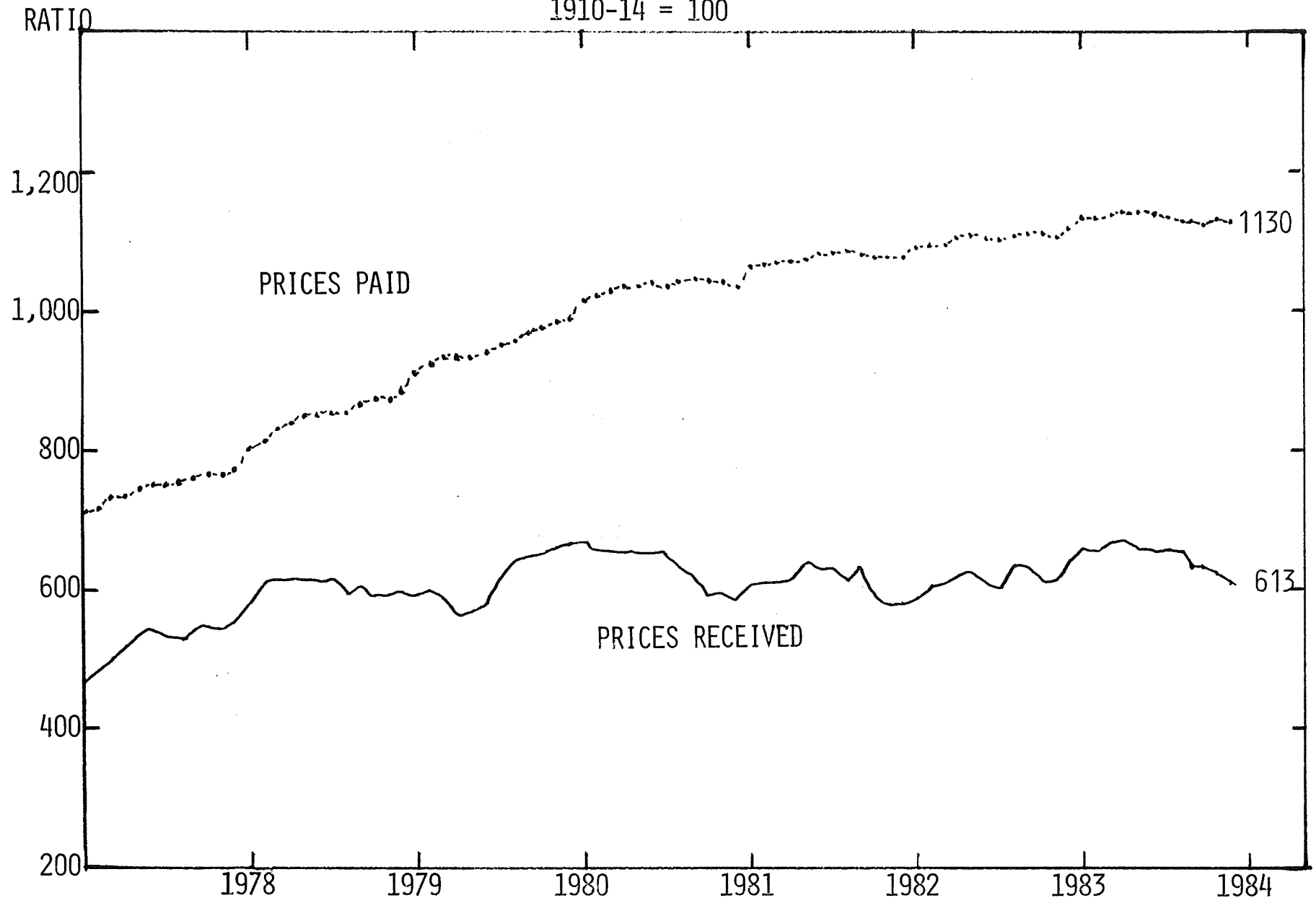

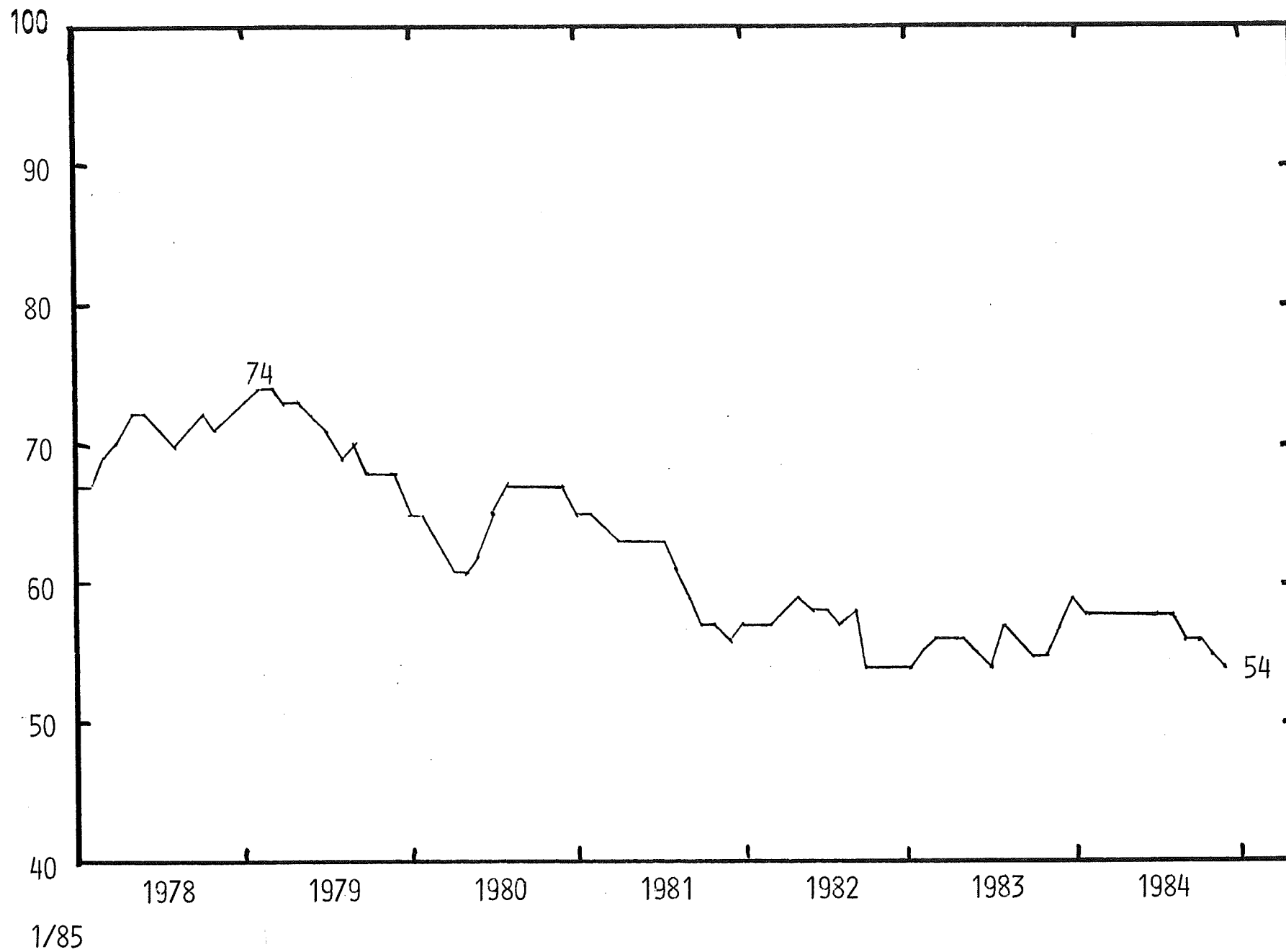

1983 NET INCOME DOWN 36 PERCENT

Cash receipts from farm marketings in Kansas during 1983 are estimated at \$5,397.9 million down 9 percent from 1982, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Livestock and livestock product sales decreased 4 percent from the previous year and cash receipts from crops decreased 16 percent. Kansas is still the cattle and wheat state with cash receipts from cattle marketings at \$2,625.4 million accounting for nearly half of total receipts. Cash receipts from wheat ranked second at \$1,360.0 million. Government payments were more than double the previous year mostly because of P.I.K. payments and at \$598.2 million ranked fourth in the

nation. Net income per farm after inventory adjustment during 1983 in Kansas was \$7,958, down 36 percent from a year earlier. Gross farm income declined 4 percent from the preceding year while production expenses increased 2 percent. Kansas farm production expenses were a record high \$5,781.1 million with livestock purchases, representing the largest share of production expenses, increasing 10 percent from 1982. Real estate farm debt outstanding totaled \$3,800 million with most debt owed to Federal Land Banks at \$2,063 million. Nonreal estate farm debt outstanding totaled \$4,932 million with nearly half of this debt owed to banks.
