The Chairman reported to the Committee that the Conference Committee on liquor issues met at 7:00 a.m. this morning and had a nice get-acquainted session and reviewed the bills that were before them. They will meet again Monday afternoon and will be working on mutual turf on the bills.

SB20 - disclosure of information of transportation of Sub. transportation of certain nuclear materials.

The Chairman asked Fred Carman to brief the Committee on the Sub. for SB20. He said there is a committee report that recommends that the substitute bill be passed if you desire to have this substitute bill introduced. Mr. Carman reviewed the bill.

Senator Walker moved that the Committee introduce the substitute bill for SB20 and that it be recommended favorably for passage. 2d by Senator Morris. Motion carried.

SB203 - repealing mandatory sentence for use of gun during certain crimes.

The Chairman called the Committee's attention to SB203. Senator Morris moved that the bill be reported adversely. 2d by Senator Arasmith. Motion carried. Senator Anderson asked to be reported as voting "no."

HB2104 - fish and game; authority of game protectors to make arrests.

The Chairman asked Fred Carman to brief the Committee on SB2104. Mr. Carman said there was some question concerning some of the language in the bill. Following that Senator Daniels made the conceptual motion that Staff draft the language in SB2104 to conform to correct any of the concerns which were discussed. 2d by Senator Arasmith. Motion carried.

Senator Daniels moved that HB2104 as amended be recommended favorable for passage. 2d by Senator Anderson. Motion carried.

HB2242 - law enforcement training training requirements; exemption for jail personnel.

This bill was requested by the Shawnee County Delegation, and Senator Reilly has visited with people in the Revisor's Office and the Attorney General's Office informally about this. Following discussion the Committee Members agreed to check with various local officials about this, and The Chairman will ask Representative Rannels to appear.

The meeting was adjourned.

SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE BILL NO. 20

By Committee on Federal and State Affairs

AN ACT concerning public records of transportation of certain nuclear material.

be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. (a) Definitions in K.S.A. 1984 Supp. 45-217 and amendments thereto shall apply to terms used in this act.

(b) A public agency shall not disclose a public record specified in this subsection (b), except as authorized by subsection (c).

(1) Records of the transportation of nuclear materials when information thereof is provided to the governor by authorities of the federal government or a licensee of the nuclear regulatory commission.

(2) Records of the transportation of nuclear materials when information thereof is received prior to and about movement from or to a nuclear reactor.

(c) When federal law provides for protecting information only until 10 days after the completion of transportation of related material, as for example in 10 CFR 73.21(b)(2) (ii), such public record may thereafter be disclosed, except that transportation of nuclear material having military significance shall not be within the purview of this subsection (c).

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the statute book.
