Conferees appearing before the committee:

The meeting convened at 12:55. For the benefit of those who were not present at yesterday's meeting, Chairman Snowbarger briefly outlined the presentation of the Wyandotte County and other statewide maps proposed by sub-committee chairmen. Work continued yesterday afternoon to remove some of the "cross-hatched" areas. Representative Adam advised they have maps to be presented by the Democratic members of the sub-committees. Following that we will open the public hearings on HB-2492. The only scheduled conferees in today are from Rice County.

Representative Freeman explained what he and Representative Miller had done with the areas where northeast and southeast come together. They worked out district 53 in the northern half of Franklin County that crosses over into Osage County. New District 19 takes in the rest of Osage Co. and comes into the northern part of Lyons Co. where it currently exists. They tried to work out the disputed area in the two townships, Pleasant and Bruno, Chase and other cross hatched areas around Sedgwick. Those have not been resolved.

One other change was made to yesterday's maps. Chairman Snowbarger passed around Committe #1, Version 3 report (Attachment 1), which reflects all of these changes on the map. Representative Roe reported on the change in the Central region which was made partly in response to concerns expressed by Representatives Whiteman and Campbell. Because of the domino effect, communities of interest, one man one vote rule, Rooks County is split three ways even though it is a county of only 6,265. The district around Hays has been moved into Rush County. Northern Rush County is with the rural Russell, Ellis County District. They worked thru the rest of the area in the same manner as above.

Representative Adam explained the Northeast map presented by the Democratic members of the sub-committee. They attempted to get their deviations as closto zero as possible, while maintaining communities of interest, and compactness. They collapsed one district. Six counties remain whole. District 60 has been combined with District 61.

Representative Campbell presented the Southwest-West and part of the Central maps. They started out trying to adhere to the #1 Guideline, to achieve numerical equality as closely as practicable. Population ranges on their map were from a plus one in the 108th to a plus 497 in the 114th. The second Guideline they tried to adhere to was "compactness" as well as "community of interests". Tried to put the city of Salina together and not dilute the minority community. This plan puts two Republican incumbents together without decreasing the number of districts.

Representative Whiteman who served on the Central and Southeast subcommittees stated they had problems in the Rice County, Great Bend area. They collapsed Representative Harder's and Samuelson's districts because that is an area where there is a high Mennonite population and it is easier to preserve the "community of interest", plus make the other districts look more compact, and the deviations justify doing that. The Southeast Kansas area is difficult because of the population numbers. She estimates that she has considered close to 50 different proposed maps of this area. It came down to making compact districts, trying to get everyone within the deviations, and maintaining the very distinct communities in the rural southeast part of the state. Representatives Brady and Lacey's districts were combined into one. There are additional changes that are not reflected on the map. Research is doing a deviation run on the changes. They should be ready this afternoon.

Representative Blumenthal presented a different map for Johnson County. He tried to keep existing districts as close as possible within present boundaries, maintain communities of interest and compactness. He made changes in Districts 20, 22, and 28.

Representative Grotewiel and Representative Williams have worked together on Sedgwick County map and they are willing to work on a plan that would enable southeast area to deal with Butler County-Sedgwick County line and have as little division as possible.

The meeting opened for public hearings on HB-2492. Representative Fry introduced conferees from the 151st District, Rice County: Jack Janssen, former realtor from Lyons; John Saylor, Editor, Lyons Daily News; Howard Hodgson, Little River Commissioner; and Jack Wempe, Director Rice County Economic Development Corporation from Little River. Mr. Wempe presented the testimony (Attachment 2). No other conferees were present. Public hearings will continue to be held open.

Representative Hensley explained the rationale behind his proposed map of Shawnee County. The most important criteria considered was "community of interest" to form north Topeka, Soldier township, and Silver Lake-Rossville areas and others. This plan would break county lines on the west rather than on the east. He proposed to collapse the current 53rd district into four different districts because there is a "community of interest" in each of these four different districts. Population figures are all within tolerance, ranging from a high of about 18,400 to a low of 17,925. The minority population of Topeka will be primarily concentrated in the 52nd District. There are some in the 59th. The 52nd and 59th are not essentially changed except for picking up some needed additional population.

Thank you for allowing us to make this presentation to you today. We in Rice County are terribly concerned about the outline of our legislative district. We recognize the problem you face in meeting the legal requirements in reapportionment. To us, this is not a partisan issue. We are politically united in our desire to remain a cohesive county.

In 1974, the Rice County Development Corporation was founded supported by a county mill levy. We were the first county in Kansas to do this and have really pioneered the regional economic development effort which the legislature has adopted as a priority in the eighties. We struggle against fragmentation of effort and have worked long and hard to bring our county communities together in a common purpose. Now we are faced with political fragmentation and fear the effect on our effort.

An urban county can be divided politically and still retain political influence and interest. A rural county is more affected. Our only hope for functioning in todays competitive environment is to regionalize our effort and to cooperate on a county basis. This we are doing.

Please consider the ramifications of your action beyond the political arena. Please help us in our effort to survive and prosper. Please avoid any action which will be negative as it applies to that which we are about.

We have been pleased with our political association with Ellsworth County. We share, as counties, both size and character. Ideally this would remain. But more important, our cohesiveness as a county is at stake. Wherever we go, let us go together.
