MINUTES OF THE Senate COMMITTEE ON Legislative & Congressional Apportionment

The meeting was called to order by Senator Vidricksen at

Senator Vidricksen called the meeting to order and introduced Mary Galligan to brief the committee on what the Legislative Research Department could do for the committee and what information they have available.

Mary Galligan distributed copies of the Summary Report for Senate Districts, (Exhibit A), the 1988 Census for the Kansas Senate Districts, (Exhibit B) and the 1978 Census for the Kansas Senate Districts, (Exhibit C) and explained the statistical information. The Minutes of the January 25, 1989 meeting were introduced as (Exhibit D). Miss Galligan then distributed a map of District 65, (Exhibit E), of the Junction City area and explained the breakdown and numerical identification of the map.

There was considerable discussion concerning maps and procedures to be used in reapportioning. Mary Galligan asked for clarification on whether the committee wanted a House district overlay and Senator Vidricksen responded by saying that it would be advantageous. Senator Yost suggested that perhaps it would be more beneficial to wait until those districts are drawn to do the overlay.

Senator Vidricksen stated that there were three things on the agenda and one of them was the Proposed Guidelines. It was the plan to appoint a 5 person sub-committee to work out the lines and do the western two-thirds of the state first, starting at the west boundaries and moving east.

Senator Steinger stated for the record that "there is no tolerable deviation, there is only justifiable deviation...and once you exceed a certain percent the justification becomes almost impossible."

Senator Steinger expressed the thought that preparing overlay maps should not be that big of a job as there had been some when they did redistricting in the past.

The Chairman distributed copies of the Proposed Guidelines for ReDistricting, (Exhibit F).

Senator Steineger stated for the record that he "personally, sees no reason for indulging ourselves in an attempt to reapportion the Senate at this time and those reasons have been set out in letters dated January 31, 1989 and February 6, 1989, addressed to the Attorney General, copies of which, and certainly the February 6th letter had been sent to every member of this committee. Those two letters enunciate the reasons the writer believes this reapportionment to be unnecessary and ill advised. The stated purpose is to solve a problem that arises with upcoming elections for the State Board of Education. If in truth and in fact that is a problem, then it should be addressed by not reapportioning the Senate but redrawing the State Board of Education boundaries, perhaps coexistent with the new House districts which are being revised and would provide then an easy and ready guide for the creation of Board of Education Districts."

The Chairman then explained that the Proposed Guidelines were part of those used 10 years ago for reapportionment and they are strictly a draft proposal and can and most likely will be changed and he would try and schedule another meeting to discuss and adopt Guidelines. A copy of the Special Report of the Committee on Legislative, Congressional and Judicial Apportionment was distributed (Exhibit G).

There was considerable more discussion and the Chairman read the summary paragraph from the Attorney General's Opinion which stated that "the Senate must be reapportioned in 1989 to assure the constitutionality of the 1990 board member elections," and asked for that to be marked as (Exhibit H).

A motion was made by Senator Yost to approve the minutes of the January 25, 1989 meeting. This was seconded by Senator Hayden and the motion carried with Senator Steineger asking to "pass" on the minutes until he had time to review them.

Senator Bond made the motion to adjourn the meeting. This was seconded by Senator Hayden. Motion carried and the meeting was adjourned at 4:45 p.m.

MINUTES OF SENATE APPORTIONMENT COMMITTEE

Senator Vidricksen, Chairperson, called the meeting to order for the purpose of reviewing the provisions of the Kansas Constitution and any case law or other pertinent information regarding legislative reapportionment.

Senator Vidricksen asked Mr. Ensley, Revisor of Statutes, to review the current provisions of section 1 of article 10 of the Kansas Constitution relating to the apportionment of districts of members of the houses of the legislature together with any background information that might be of assistance. Mr. Ensley explained that prior to the last amendment of this section the constitution had required that the representative and senatorial districts be apportioned in the regular session of the legislature in 1979 and at its regular session every 10th year thereafter. He explained that the section was amended to provide that "At its regular session in 1989, the legislature shall by law reapportion the state representative districts, the state senatorial districts or both the state representative and senatorial districts upon the basis of the latest census of the inhabitants of the state taken by authority of chapter 61 of the 1987 Session Laws of Kansas. At its regular session in 1992, and at its regular session every tenth year thereafter, the legislature shall by law reapportion the state senatorial districts and representative districts on the basis of the population of the state as established by the most recent census of population taken and published by the United States bureau of the census. . ."

Mr. Ensley pointed out that the constitution appeared to provide an alternative by stating that the legislature shall reapportion the state representative districts, state senatorial districts or both state representative and state senatorial districts in 1989. Mr. Ensley stated although there were no cases directly in point that based upon such case law as was available and other factors involved in his opinion it would be safer to have the districts of the senate reapportioned in 1989.

Chairman Vidricksen stated that this was one of the basic questions which must be decided by the committee and asked for discussion. Senator Steineger stated that inasmuch as members of the senate would not be required to run for office prior to the redistricting of the senate in 1992, that the reapportionment of senate at this time would be little more than a futile act. He

pointed out that redistricting at this time could change the composition of certain districts in that it could change the ratio of urban to rural constituents. Senator Parrish raised the question as to whether if the senate were reapportioned, incumbents would be representing the districts as constituted when elected or would be representing the districts as reapportioned. Senator Johnston also expressed concern whether an incumbent senator would continue to represent the constituents in the area from which the senator was elected or would represent constituents within the district as reapportioned. He then asked if inasmuch as senators will not run for election in 1990 reapportionment could not be delayed until the regular session in 1991. Mr. Ensley stated that the constitutional provision specifically provided that "bills reapportioning legislative districts shall . . . be effective for the next following election of legislators and thereafter until again reapportioned."

Senator Yost asked what the effect upon the validity of the districts of members of the state board of education would be if the senatorial districts were not now reapportioned. Mr. Coldsnow responded that the requirements of the federal constitution concerning one person, one vote applied to other elective offices in the same manner as to houses of the legislature. He also pointed out that the districts of members of the board of education had not been changed since the last reapportionment of the senate and the courts have recognized the "once a decade rule" as being a reasonable maximum for reapportionment in all such districts.

Senator Francisco asked if senatorial districts were reapportioned this year if senators should run for office in 1990. Chairman Vidricksen responded that this could only be done through amendment of the constitution. Senator Bond asked if even though the committee were not certain that reapportionment of senatorial districts were absolutely mandated in 1989, is it advisable to run the risk of forcing the courts to reapportion board of education districts if it was determined that reapportionment was necessary and the legislature failed to act?

After further discussion by members of the committee, Senator Bond moved that the committee proceed with the development of a bill for the reapportionment of senatorial districts in 1989. Senator Yost seconded the motion. Chairman Vidricksen asked if there was any discussion on the motion. Senator Steineger stated that for the record he wanted to say that "in my opinion, this is an exercise in futility and we are going to have to re-do everything when we get the federal census anyway. I don't think the state school board is a problem. It is only a problem if someone cares to make it a problem which I doubt if anyone ... will bring a lawsuit on the state schools."

After a brief discussion, Chairman Vidricksen called for a vote upon the proposition and announced that the motion had carried. The meeting was adjourned at 4:17 p.m.

PROPOSED GUIDELINES OR CRITERIA
For Redistricting State Senate Districts - 1989 Session

1. Efforts should be made to make the population of the districts as even numerically as possible.
2. Deviations should not exceed plus or minus 5% with the ideal district figure of 57,336. (Deviation - plus or minus 2,867 overall 5,734. Range would be 54,469 to 60,203.
3. The "building blocks" to be used for drawing senatorial districts shall be county lines, or other natural boundaries, precincts within cities and townships outside cities: Precinct lines have been established by election officials and the 1988 census figures have been tabulated by precinct and townships.
4. Senatorial districts lines and boundaries should be easy to identify and easy to understand by the voters.
5. Care should be taken to insure the integrity of existing political boundaries as much as is practicable.
6. The districts should be numerically contiguous.
7. There should be recognition of similarities of interest. Social, cultural, racial, ethnic and economic interests common to the population of the area which are probably subjects of legislative action, generally termed "community of interest", should be considered.
8. Districts should not be drawn to protect or defeat an incumbent Senator.
9. The basis for Senate reapportionment will be the 1988 Kansas Census as certified to the Kansas legislature by the Secretary of State pursuant to L. 1987, Ch. 61 and Article 10, Sec. 1(a) of the Constitution of the State of Kansas. These figures are the most recent available in Kansas.
10. Fair and effective representation is the basic aim of legislative and congressional apportionment.

ORIGINAL MOTION

Senator Morris requested unanimous consent to allow a special report submitted by the Committee on Legislative, Judicial and Congressional Apportionment to be published in the Journal of the Senate.

Consent was granted, and the report is printed as follows:

SPECIAL REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATIVE, CONGRESSIONAL AND JUDICIAL APPORTIONMENT

The Committee on Legislative, Congressional and Judicial Apportionment makes the following report and recommendations on SB 220:

The Committee immediately commenced hearings and meetings for the purpose of presenting at the regular session of 1979 a bill reapportioning the Senate districts in accordance with the mandate of Art. 10, § 1(a) of the Kansas Constitution. Oral and written presentations were made to the Committee by members of the public including the Kansas Coalition on Reapportionment which involves the League of Women Voters, Common Cause, American Civil Liberties Union and the Women's Political Caucus. A spokesman for the Kansas Coalition on Reapportionment also represented to the Committee that the Coalition meetings

have also included other citizens who are interested in reapportionment. Standards for reapportionment as established by the Kansas Coalition for Reapportionment and the rationale for such standards were duly and thoroughly discussed and considered by the members of the Committee in determining guidelines and criteria to be considered by the Committee in the development of senatorial reapportionment plans and this bill. Notice of the Committee's meetings and hearings was given in accordance with law, rules of the Senate and custom and procedure of the Committee.

Criteria for Reapportionment:

Having considered the oral and written presentations, pertinent provisions of the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution and statutes of the state of Kansas, the relevant case law expressed in judicial decisions and sources in the field of reapportionment, the following are the criteria developed and used by the Committee in formulating plans for reapportionment of the Senate legislative districts in Kansas and are recommended as the criteria to be used by the Senate in considering SB 220:

1. As required by the U. S. Constitution and the case law of both the state and federal courts interpreting the same, the districts should be numerically equal in population as nearly as practicable and the population of Senate districts should be within plus or minus 5% of the ideal population (which is 58,982) except in unusual circumstances. Any deviation from the ideal population should have justification and should be in writing. Kansas is one of the relatively less populated states and population of Senate districts in Kansas is relatively small. The plus or minus 5% population variance guideline permits a reasonable equality in the Senate districts since the variance in the number of persons within this guideline permits a practical attainment of numerical equality especially when other factors such as the relatively large expanse of geographical area contained in Kansas districts in relation to population are considered.

2. A district should be easily identifiable and an easily understandable district by the voters.

3. The basis for Senate reapportionment should be the 1978 Kansas Agricultural Census figures which are the most recent available in Kansas. Census figures have been compiled within basic units such as townships, precincts, wards as well as within city limits and county boundaries. Many of these units use prominent natural or man-made geographic features as boundaries. Thus following rather than disregarding these census divisions will aid in establishing actual, well-defined Senatorial districts easily identifiable and easily understandable to the voters.

The "Comparison of 1970 Federal Census with 1978 Census, By Counties" compiled by the Kansas Legislative Research Department (December 5, 1978) shows a 4.89% gain over 1970 U. S. Census figures for Kansas. Subsequent corrections in addition increased the population figures slightly from 2,358,993 to 2,359,262 (an increase of 269) which would make the percentage increase 4.90%. In the January 22, 1979, issue of U. S. News and World Report at page 6, there is a chart in which 1970 U. S. Census figures for each state and the latest estimates for each state are compared. The chart shows the latest U. S. Census estimate for Kansas as 2,348,000 and gives Kansas a 4.4% growth from 1970 to the latest census estimates. The article does not indicate the date of the latest U. S. Census Bureau figures and only identifies them as "a new Census Bureau estimate". When the 1978 state agricultural census figure of 2,359,262 is compared to the estimate in the U. S. News and World Report article it appears that the overall total figures for the state are within a reasonable tolerance for such enumerations (0.48% above the latest census estimate).

4. The territory included within a district should be as compact as possible and contiguous. In working with this criteria or guideline the Committee took into account the availability and facility of transportation and communication between the people in a proposed district, between the people and candidates in the district and between the people and their elected representatives.

5. Consideration was given to the fact that the bill seemed to have a real chance of being implemented rather than being an existing political maneuver.

6. The integrity and good faith of the bill served so far as practicable.

7. There should be no economic interests which are subjects of legislative action which be considered as districts excluded from a reapportionment. The bill should be reapportioned in an effective reapportionment legislative reapportionment common to all states and those common to many same transportation facilities the same methods of communication were made to the Committee integrity of procedure and formation of districts in order to define political groups. Furthermore, organizations along local political, legislative and city lines as reapportionment.

8. Districts will be in the legislator (Senator).

5. Consideration was given to growth and population trends where such trends seemed to have a valid historical basis. Such considerations being used to implement other criteria or guidelines, primarily with respect to integrity of existing political subdivisions.

6. The integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions should be preserved so far as practicable.

7. There should be recognition of similarities of interest, and social and economic interests common to the population of the area which are probable subjects of legislative action, generally termed a "community of interests", should be considered in determining whether the area should be included within or excluded from a proposed district in order that all of the citizens of the district should be represented reasonably, fairly and effectively since the achieving of fair and effective representation for all citizens is concededly the basic aim of legislative apportionment. Examples of such interests, among others, are those common to an urban area, a rural area, an industrial area or an agricultural area and those common to areas where people share similar living standards, use the same transportation facilities, have similar work opportunities, or have access to the same media of communication relevant to the election process. Presentations were made to the Committee urging adherence to the criteria of maintaining the integrity of counties and cities, and deploring needless division thereof in the formation of districts. It is clear that in many situations county and city boundaries define political, economical and social boundaries of population groups. Furthermore, organizations with legitimate political concerns are constituted along local political subdivision lines. Therefore, unnecessary division of county and city lines in reapportionment should be avoided.

8. Districts will not be intentionally drawn to protect or defeat an incumbent legislator (Senator).

As to all of the foregoing criteria used by the Committee and recommended to the Senate as a whole, their applicability, priority and scope, other than population equality, depend on circumstances indigenous to the area under consideration. To the extent required by the U. S. Constitution, population equality controlled and was always considered by the Committee insofar as possible and practical.

Consideration of plans submitted to the Committee:

Various individual legislators, local governmental groups and private groups or individuals submitted suggestions or plans for all or a portion of the state. The Committee kept foremost in mind that the Legislature is responsible for enacting a reapportionment plan and this cannot be delegated to others or assumed by them.

All of the suggestions or other reapportionment plans submitted to the Committee have been carefully considered.

Many of the plans and proposals contained valuable suggestions for solving specific problems and all plans and proposals submitted were considered carefully in connection with the preparation of the recommendations contained in this bill. Proper weight was given to the reasons underlying all such plans and proposals. However, innumerable districts ideal for particular communities can be constructed if each is considered in isolation but when the entire state is divided into a specified number of districts, that which may appear ideal for one place or another must be subordinated to the goal of fair and reasonable apportionment of the whole state. That is the goal sought and upon which the recommendations to the Senate contained in this bill are based.

Reapportionment plan recommended for adoption by the Senate:

The legal descriptions of the recommended districts are contained in SB 220. Maps delineating these districts are contained in Appendix A and statistics are set forth in Appendix B.

The reasons underlying the formation of all of the Senatorial districts was the application of the recommended criteria set forth above. A brief description of the districts together with some of the specifics used which led to their formation are

reported below. Formation of district lines was a complex task and innumerable decisions had to be made at each stage of the process. In many instances several false starts were necessary before a district could be formed which reasonably conformed with the criteria which would not interfere with the reasonable formation of adjacent districts. As the formation process proceeded it was often necessary to go back to previously formed districts and readjust the boundaries to solve some theretofore unforeseen difficulty.

Senate Districts

District 1: Counties of Doniphan, Brown, Atchison and Jackson and the northwest four townships of Jefferson County. This district is very similar to the existing district and the four townships in Jefferson County were attached to this district to bring the population as close as practicable to the ideal population. These townships as well as most of the rest of the district are rural in economic interests and the four townships in Jefferson County lie mostly to the northwest of a large body of water known as Perry Reservoir which tends to act as a barrier to the area east of it. The district is now easily identifiable and understandable by the voters and is as compact as possible and contiguous.

District 2: City of Lawrence and all of Douglas County except the three southern townships thereof. This district is easily identifiable and understandable by the voters as it includes the city of Lawrence and the six townships surrounding the city in the northern part of the county. These six townships were included for purposes of bringing the population as near to the ideal population as practicable and reasonable. The district includes those townships surrounding Clinton Reservoir and the Wakarusa Valley and the area north thereof in the county and they have a community of interests, especially in the way they are developing. The area is as compact as possible and contiguous and is contained within one county. The southern three townships of Douglas County have a community of interests more similar to the district to the south to which they are attached and were excluded from Douglas County and added to District 11 as practical solution to meet the equality of population requirement as nearly as practicable.

District 3: Leavenworth County and the southeastern half of Jefferson County. The county of Leavenworth is intact and most of the area of Jefferson County lies to the east of Perry Reservoir which forms a natural barrier north and south through much of Jefferson County. The eastern part of Jefferson County attached to this district is similar in many respects to Leavenworth County and has a community of interests with Leavenworth County. The southwestern part of Jefferson County included in this district is along corridors of travel from the cities of Leavenworth and Lansing to the state capitol at Topeka. The district is as compact as possible and contiguous. Jefferson County surrounding the southern part of Perry Reservoir has a community of interests which is somewhat different from the northwestern part of the county. The integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions has been preserved so far as practicable.

Districts 4, 5, and 6: All of Wyandotte County. District lines within the county make the districts easily identifiable and easily understandable by the voters. They follow major thoroughfares and are drawn along relatively straight lines which are clearly identifiable by the residents of the county. The districts are as compact as possible and contiguous and the integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions has been preserved so far as practicable. For these three districts the deviation from highest to lowest population is 0.9%.

Districts 7, 8, 9 and 10: All of Johnson County except the southern six townships. The 14,193 residents in the southern tier of six townships in Johnson County are included in a district to the south made up of portions of Douglas, Osage, Miami and all of Franklin County. The districts themselves are as nearly equal as practicable while maintaining the integrity of the existing city boundaries and vary from a +2.4% to +3.1% from the ideal population figure. There are sixteen cities in this north portion of Johnson and city lines were broken in only two cities: Overland Park (population 82,400) which had to be divided among districts

7, 8 and 9 because of its size and one precinct of the city of Overland Park was attached to district 7 for population equality as possible and contiguous and city boundary lines.

District 11: Franklin County and the eastern half of Osage County and the southern tier of six townships of Miami County. The total population is approximately 14,000 persons. The rural community of interests of the district is generally slightly to maintain the integrity making it easily identifiable. The district generally follows population shift and is as compact as possible.

District 12: Allen, Bourbon and Crawford Counties and the southeastern part of Anderson County. The present boundaries were changed to make population shift and to make a division of Miami and Anderson County a major arterial thoroughfare understandable district for interests and similar reasons.

District 13: Cherokee County and the southern townships thereof. This district includes the townships of Osage and Shawnee. The population of the district is as nearly as practicable to the ideal as the Cherokee lowlands as is a north-south highway facility. The district is basically an industrial community of interests. The district is easily identifiable for the voters and the integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions has been preserved as far as practicable.

District 14: Neosho and Montgomery Counties and the city of Coffeyville. The district is the area and contains three townships which all have a similar community of interests. The population range of 10,000 to 15,000 persons. These communities are involved with the area's farming and are easily understandable by the voters. The integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions has been preserved so far as practicable. The population of Montgomery County was a factor in the formation of this district.

District 15: Cherokee County and the city of Coffeyville. The district is the city of Coffeyville and the eastern part of Cherokee County. The population of the district is approximately 14,000 persons. The rural community of interests of the district is generally slightly to maintain the integrity making it easily identifiable. The district generally follows population shift and is as compact as possible.

7, 8 and 9 because of its large population and extensive north-south dimensions and one precinct of the city of Merriam shifted from district 10 and placed in district 7 for population equalization purposes. The districts are as compact as possible and contiguous and irregularity of district lines reflects the irregularity of city boundary lines.

District 11: Franklin County, the northern tier of townships in Osage County, eastern half of Osage County, southern tier of townships of Douglas County and southern tier of six townships of Johnson County and the northwest four townships of Miami County. The southern tier of six townships in Johnson County contain approximately 14,000 people and are included in this district to aid in equalization of population as nearly as practicable. These townships have a somewhat rural community of interests as does the rest of this district. The western portion of the district is generally bounded by a major traffic thoroughfare (adjusted slightly to maintain the integrity of existing political subdivisions, e.g. townships) making it easily identifiable and easily understandable by the voters. Otherwise, the district generally follows the existing district but reflects the eastward population shift and is as compact as possible and contiguous.

District 12: Allen, Bourbon and Linn Counties and the eastern half of Anderson County and the southeastern half of Miami County. The district is very similar to its present boundaries except that Woodson County and the western half of Anderson County and parts of Crawford County were deleted to recognize the population shift and to make the population as near the ideal as practicable. The division of Miami and Anderson Counties follows insofar as possible and practicable major arterial thoroughfares which will give an easily identifiable and easily understandable district for the voters. These counties have a community of interests and similar economic activities.

District 13: Cherokee County and Crawford County excepting the northwest two townships thereof. This district is very similar to the existing district except two townships (Osage and Sherman) were added in order to aid in adjustment of population of the districts in the southeast part of the state to make population as nearly as practicable to the ideal population. Osage township is associated with the Cherokee lowlands as is practically all of the district. Sherman township is on a north-south highway facilitating travel to the rest of the district. This district has basically an industrial, mining and correlated farming economy and shares a community of interests. The district is easily identifiable and easily understandable for the voters and the territory included within the district is as compact as possible and contiguous. The integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions has been preserved so far as practicable.

District 14: Neosho and Labette Counties, the northwest two townships of Crawford County and the city of Coffeyville and Cherokee Township of Montgomery County. The district is as close as practicable to the ideal population for the area and contains three medium size cities (Chanute, Parsons and Coffeyville) which all have a similar community of interests and are in the general population range of 10,000 to 15,000. Cherokee township includes the urban fringes of Coffeyville. These communities have a similarity of legislative interests and are involved with the area's farming economy. The district is easily identifiable and easily understandable by the voters and is compact and contiguous. It was necessary to shift population to the east into this district and moving that part of Montgomery County was a practical solution.

District 15: Chautauqua, Elk, Wilson and Woodson Counties and Montgomery County (except the city of Coffeyville and Cherokee Township), western half of Anderson and eastern half of Coffey County. This district had the greatest amount of population deficiency of the existing districts in southeast Kansas and it was also necessary to move some population to the east. It has a population of within 0.9% of the ideal population. The western part of Anderson County and the eastern part of Coffey County contained in this district are generally bounded to

the east and west respectively by major thoroughfares which will aid in making the district easily identifiable and easily understandable by the voters. It now contains all of the Chautauqua Hills area of the state and center part of the surrounding Osage Questes. There appears to be absolute similarity of a community of interests and the economy is basically that of farming and ranching. A major easily identifiable thoroughfare runs north-south through the district giving easy access to the major population centers of the district.

District 16: Butler and Greenwood Counties and the western half of Coffey County. This district is basically the same as the existing district except for the eastern part of Coffey County which is deleted for the purposes of maintaining as near as practicable an ideal population. As mentioned above the division of Coffey County is generally as near as practicable along a major traffic artery and is bounded on the north by a major freeway giving an easily identifiable and easily understandable district for the voters. This district has very similar community of interests and is basically a ranch, oil and farming community.

District 17: Chase and Lyon Counties, northeastern half of Marion County, west central and southwest portions of Osage County and southeast half of Morris County. This district is similar in area to the existing district except that the boundaries have been shifted on the east and west to reflect the eastern movement of the population and to make the district as nearly equal to the ideal population as is practicable. This district is as compact as possible for the sparse population and is contiguous. The district has a community of interests in the farming and ranching areas. Township 2 of Morris County is retained with the city of Council Grove to maintain a community of interests surrounding Council Grove Lake since the city of Council Grove owns property in the area of the lake upon which many of the residents reside.

Districts 18, 19 and 20: Shawnee County. The existing district have been adjusted to bring all three districts totally within the boundaries of Shawnee County. The three districts within the county have been drawn to within one-half of one percent of population variance. The district are as compact as possible and contiguous and are generally drawn along major thoroughfares and other easily identifiable boundaries to make the district easily understandable by the voters. The districts also represent a community of interests within the county in so far as practicable and possible.

District 21: Wabaunsee, Pottawatomie, Marshall and Nemaha Counties, the north half of Riley County and that part of Riley County to the east and south of the Kansas River, that part of Geary County southeast of the Kansas River, the northwest half of Morris County and the townships of Lyon and Union in Dickinson County. Riley County is no longer broken into three separate districts and no county in this plan is broken more than two ways although prior court ordered redistricting had split more than one county into three separate senatorial districts. The district is more compact than the original district boundaries. The entire district has a very similar community of interests in farming and ranching and the city of Herrington is brought into the district in the southwest so that the southwest part of the district now has its trade center in this district. Practically all the rural area of Riley County is now with a district which has very similar community of interests.

District 22: That part of Geary County northwest of the Kansas River, and the southern portion of Riley County west and north of the Kansas River. This district is a small and compact district and is contiguous. It contains two medium-sized cities which historically have had a community of interests and have been included within the same district. The district is easily identifiable and understandable by the voters and generally follows a natural barrier to the southeast and county lines to the west, and easily identifiable boundary to the north and a natural barrier of a large reservoir to the northeast.

District 23: Washington, Cloud, Clay, Ottawa and Dickinson Counties except

This district begins to show the effects of difficulties encountered in drawing districts in sparsely settled areas of the state.

District 24: Lincoln, Ellsworth and Saline Counties. Lincoln County had previously been split into two senatorial districts and the north half of Lincoln County has now been added to this district for the purposes of bringing the population as near as practicable to the ideal population and unifying Lincoln County. It has one-tenth of one percent (0.1%) deviation from the ideal population. The district is as compact as possible and contiguous and is easily identifiable and easily understandable by the voters. The two counties in the west of the district are preserved with the community of interests with their trade center of Salina and the integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions has been preserved.

District 25: McPherson and Harvey Counties, except the city of Sedgwick in Harvey County and the western tier of townships of Marion County. The city of Sedgwick was moved from this district to help make the population as near as practicable to the ideal population and to avoid splitting a city into two senatorial districts. The communities in the western part of Marion County have an identifiable community of interests with the rest of the district and especially with Harvey County and are along major transportation routes making them readily accessible to the remainder of the district. The formation of this district in this manner also avoids breaking Reno County into three separate senatorial districts as was previously done by a federal court reapportionment.

Districts 26, 27, 28, 29, 30 and 31: These districts include all of Sedgwick County and that part of the city of Sedgwick in Harvey County and that part of the city of Mulvane in Sumner County. The two cities of Sedgwick and Mulvane were each previously split into two separate senatorial districts pursuant to a federal court ordered reapportionment. They are included within districts 31 and 26 respectively in order to bring populations as near as practicable to the ideal population and to avoid dividing two relatively small communities into separate districts thereby ignoring their community of interests. District 26 includes the vast majority of the second and third class cities located within Sedgwick County and includes the rural western, southwestern and southern parts of Sedgwick County. There is a similarity of terrain and agricultural activities in this area and the district will serve the community of interests of the area included therein. For these six districts the deviation from the highest to lowest population is 0.9%. The boundaries for these districts have been drawn along natural political boundaries to preserve the integrity of existing political structures insofar as practicable and in keeping with the goal of equal population among these districts insofar as is practicable. The districts are easily identifiable and understandable by the voters and as compact as possible and contiguous and recognize certain barriers, *e.g.* rivers, freeways, etc. The northeast part of the county has an altogether different soil structure and agricultural interests from the part of the county included in district 26 and has suburban development such that the community of interests is more closely related to the eastern part of the city of Wichita. Districts 29 and 31 recognize the constraints of major thoroughfare and freeway barriers and certain natural boundaries to make the districts as easily identifiable and easily understandable as possible and to avoid splitting districts into areas not easily accessible to the remainder of the districts.

District 32: Cowley County and Sumner County, except the western tier of townships and Springdale Township (except that part of Conway Springs located in Springdale Township, which remains in District 32). The boundaries are almost identical to the existing boundaries with the exception of a minor adjustment of one township in the western part of Sumner County. This district includes the three communities of Arkansas City, Winfield and Wellington, which are the major communities in the district and have historically and traditionally been in the same district and have a community of interests with each other. If the district were extended to the east it would break a county line and would make the district less readily and easily identifiable and understandable to the voters and would divide community interests and trade areas. This district borders on the western part of the state which is sparsely settled and where the districts will be covering vast expanses of territory. The western boundary is almost identical with that located by a federal court in a reapportionment order.

District 33: Seven entire counties in the west part of south central Kansas, the south three tiers of townships of Reno County, and the western portion of Sumner County not included in District 32. This portion of the state is rather sparsely settled and covers a vast expanse of territory with the district generally recognizing the community of interests of the area and includes the major communities with which the rest of the area generally identify. The area is as compact as possible and contiguous and is reasonably identifiable and reasonably understandable by the voters with boundaries of the district where county lines are broken being as closely identified to existing senatorial district boundaries as is practicable. The integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions have been preserved insofar as practicable.

District 34: Generally the northern two tiers of townships of Reno County including the city of Hutchinson. To bring this district within any closer deviation from the ideal population would necessitate a further fracturing of Reno County into separate senatorial districts when surrounding areas are considered. Reno County is not divided into three separate senatorial districts as was previously done in the federal court reapportionment. The district is easily identifiable, easily understandable and is as compact as possible and contiguous. Insofar as is practicable with a large community such as Hutchinson contained within the district the community interest of this area has been preserved and the integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions have been considered.

District 35: Russell, Barton and Rice Counties. This district preserves the integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions and is as near as practicable to the ideal population. The major communities in this district are all identifiable with the oil and gas industry and have traditionally had a community of interests. The district is identical with the present senatorial district. There is no change requiring the voters to identify with a new district.

District 36: Eight complete counties in north central Kansas. The integrity of existing political subdivisions has been preserved insofar as practicable and no county lines are broken within this district. This makes this large district easily identifiable and easily understandable by the voters therein. The district is as compact as possible and contiguous and is served by a major east-west highway which will permit access within the district as practical as possible. The district has been restructured to recognize the gradual shift of population from west to east but has preserved insofar as practicable the community of interests of the existing district. While the districts in the western part of the state may have some deviation below the ideal population the vast expanse of territory covered by these districts should be considered. In order to avoid making the elected representative of the people any more inaccessible than is absolutely necessary due consideration was given to the need by each senator in the western areas of the state to cover a large area of the state.

District 37: Eight complete counties. This district preserves the integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions and remains unchanged from the existing district. The district preserves the community of interests in agricultural activities and is contiguous. The district is as compact as possible and contiguous and is generally concerned with the community of interests with district 36 as to its sparse population. The district is as compact as possible and contiguous and is also applicable to this district.

District 38: Eastern portion of the eastern part of the southern part of the state. This district is unchanged from the existing district and recognizes the integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions removed from the district. The population as is practicable and recognizes the integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions. The division of Haskell County in the court reapportionment and the two portions of this county are readily identifiable with the existing district. The district preserves the community of interests with the west. The district preserves the integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions. The city within this district is as compact as possible and contiguous and is also a portion of the state. Reference is made to the District 36 commentary.

District 39: Eight complete counties. This district is unchanged from the existing district and recognizes the integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions. The division of Haskell County in the court reapportionment and the two portions of this county are readily identifiable with the existing district. The district preserves the community of interests with the west. The district preserves the integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions. The city within this district is as compact as possible and contiguous and is also a portion of the state. Reference is made to the District 36 commentary.

District 40: 12 complete counties. This district is unchanged from the existing district and recognizes the integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions. The division of Haskell County in the court reapportionment and the two portions of this county are readily identifiable with the existing district. The district preserves the community of interests with the west. The district preserves the integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions. The city within this district is as compact as possible and contiguous and is also a portion of the state. Reference is made to the District 36 commentary.

The foregoing was adopted by the Committee on Legislative Reapportionment February 5, 1979.

District 37: Eight complete counties in the east part of central west Kansas. This district preserves the integrity of existing political subdivisions. This district also remains unchanged from the existing district and is as compact as possible and contiguous. The district preserves a community of interests of the district in its agricultural activities and with the communities within the district which are generally concerned with agri-business activity. The comments made with respect to district 36 as to its sparse population and the western part of the state would also be applicable to this district.

District 38: Eastern two-thirds of Haskell County and five complete counties in the east part of the southwestern corner of the state. This district is basically unchanged from the current existing district except that Comanche County was removed from the district to bring the population deviation as near to the ideal population as is practicable. The district is contiguous and as compact as possible and recognizes the integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions. The division of Haskell County is along the same line as established by the federal court reapportionment and recognizes the diversity of a community of interests in the two portions of this county in that the western third of the county is more readily identifiable with the community of interests of the Hugoton gas field to the west. The district preserves the other community interests of the district and recognizes the traditional location of the two communities of Liberal and Dodge City within this district which are the two strong trade centers associated with this portion of the state. Reference should also be made to the comments at the end of the District 36 commentary as to area, etc.

District 39: Eight complete counties and the western one-third of Haskell County located in the western portion of the southwest corner of the state. This district is unchanged from the existing district except for the deletion of Wichita and Scott Counties which were shifted out of this district to bring the population as near the ideal population as is practicable. As previously mentioned the western half of Haskell County is more closely identified as having a community of interests with this district through the Hugoton gas field. This district also preserves the integrity of the existing political subdivisions as far as practicable. The persons in this district and district 38 have become accustomed to this division of Haskell County between the two senatorial districts and any change would not appreciably help the population deviations and could only lead to confusion and an unnecessary readjustment in identifying the district. The district is easily identifiable and easily understandable for the voters. The territory is as compact as possible and contiguous and the comments with respect to the large areas covered by districts in the western part of the state as mentioned in the district 36 commentary are also applicable to this district.

District 40: 12 complete counties in the northwest corner of the state. The integrity and priority of existing political subdivisions are preserved and no county lines are broken in this district. This district is basically the same as the existing district except that Norton County was deleted from the northeast corner and the counties of Wichita and Scott were added to the south in order to bring the population as near as practicable to the ideal population. Population centers in this district have a community of interests and relate to the agricultural activities of the district all of which have similar concerns. The district is as compact as possible and contiguous and will be easily identifiable and understandable by the voters the statement with respect to sparsely settled areas of the state as set forth in the district 36 commentary is also applicable to this district.

The foregoing was adopted as part of the minutes of the meeting of The Senate Committee on Legislative, Congressional and Judicial Reapportionment held on February 5, 1979.

Constitution of the State of Kansas--Education--

Synopsis: Reapportionment of the Senate need not necessarily coincide with reapportionment of the House of Representatives. However, because current population figures reflect a 44.4% total deviation in State Board of Education member districts, it is our opinion that the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution requires that board member districts be reapportioned before the 1990 election of board members. Board member districts are based on senatorial districts. Thus, unless the senatorial districts can be regrouped to significantly lessen the current total deviation in population among board member districts, the Senate must be reapportioned in 1989. Reapportionment of the Senate in 1989 will not affect the terms of office of incumbent senators. Cited herein: K.S.A. 25-1911; 72-7513; Kan. Const., Art. 6, §§2, 3; Art. 10, §1; U.S. Const., Amend. XIV.

Dear Senator Vidricksen:

You request our opinion regarding reapportionment of the Senate in 1989. You first ask whether the legislature is constitutionally required to reapportion the Senate in 1989.

Article 10, section 1 of the Kansas Constitution provides in part:

"(a) At its regular session in 1989, the legislature shall by law reapportion the state representative districts, the state senatorial districts or both the state representative and senatorial districts upon the basis of the latest census of the inhabitants of the state taken by authority of chapter 61 of the 1987 Session Laws of Kansas. At its regular session in 1992, and at its regular session every tenth year thereafter, the legislature shall by law reapportion the state senatorial districts and representative districts on the basis of the population of the state as established by the most recent census of population taken and published by the United States bureau of the census.

. . . .

"Bills reapportioning legislative districts shall be published in the Kansas register immediately upon final passage and shall be effective for the next following election of legislators and thereafter until again reapportioned. . . ."

Recognizing that this provision appears to afford the legislature an option to not reapportion the Senate in 1989, you inquire whether case law and other constitutional provisions would nevertheless mandate such reapportionment.

One argument would be that since the House of Representatives must be reapportioned in 1989, the Senate must also be reapportioned in order to achieve validity of the whole reapportionment scheme. The United States Supreme Court has indeed held that the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth

Amendment to the United States Constitution "requires that the seats in both houses of a bicameral state legislature must be apportioned on a population basis." Reynolds v. Sims, 377 U.S. 533, 568, 84 S.Ct. 1362, 1385, 12 L.Ed.2d 506 (1964). The court has stated further:

"[I]n determining whether a good faith effort to establish districts substantially equal in population has been made, a court must necessarily consider a State's legislative apportionment scheme as a whole. Only after an evaluation of an apportionment plan in its totality can a court determine whether there has been sufficient compliance with the requisites of the Equal Protection Clause. Deviations from a strict population basis, so long as rationally justifiable, may be utilized to balance a slight overrepresentation of a particular area in one house with a minor underrepresentation of that area in the other house. But, on the other hand, disparities from population-based representation, though minor, may be cumulative instead of offsetting where the same areas are disadvantaged in both houses of a state legislature, and may therefore render the apportionment scheme at least constitutionally suspect." Lucas v. Colorado General Assembly, 377 U.S. 713, 84 S.Ct. 1472, 377 L.Ed.2d 632, 646, Note 27 (1964).

While the court makes a good argument for the desirability of reapportioning both houses simultaneously, we do not believe it has mandated simultaneous reapportionment. In Lucas the court was merely speaking to its scope of review in determining the validity of a reapportionment plan and went on to say that "the court below can properly take into consideration the present apportionment of seats in the House in determining what steps must be taken in order to achieve a plan of legislative apportionment . . . that sufficiently comports with federal constitutional requirements." Id. See also Maryland Committee for Fair Representation v. Tawes, 377 U.S. 656, 84 S.Ct. 1442, 12 L.Ed.2d 595, 606 (1964). Further, the Kansas Supreme Court has held procedurally sound the presentment of two separate bills, each

reapportioning only one house. In re Senate Bill No. 220, 225 Kan. 628, 633 (1979). In the past the court has considered the bills separately and we find no indication that it will cease to do so. Thus, while it might be advantageous or desirable to reapportion the Senate simultaneously with the House of Representatives, we do not believe federal or state courts would mandate simultaneous reapportionment.

You next ask whether the Senate must be reapportioned in 1989 in view of the fact that five members of the State Board of Education are up for election in 1990, and article 6, section 3(a) of the Kansas Constitution requires State Board of Education member districts to be based on senatorial districts. The United States Supreme Court has held that the "one man-one vote" rule applies generally to the election of public officials who exercise "general governmental powers" over the entire district from which they are elected. Avery v. Midland County, 390 U.S. 474, 88 S.Ct. 1114, 20 L.Ed.2d 45 (1968). Specific responsibilities of the State Board of Education include: Accrediting elementary and secondary schools, area vocational-technical schools, and community colleges; administering and distributing state and federal funds to local education units; appointing numerous advisory councils and reviewing their recommendations; certifying teachers, administrators, and school nurses; developing, administering, and monitoring state and federal plans; developing standards for courses of study and curriculum; evaluating and approving teacher education programs; holding public hearings on state plans, rules and regulations, transfers of territory, certain bond elections, and due process appeals; licensing proprietary schools operating in the state; supervising and coordinating the state system of community colleges and area vocational-technical schools; and supervising the Kansas State School for the Visually Handicapped and the Kansas State School for the Deaf. See Kan. Const., Art. 6, §2; K.S.A. 72-7513; State, ex rel., v. Board of Education, 212 Kan. 482, 489, 490 (1973). We believe that the United States Supreme Court would conclude that the performance of these functions by popularly elected officials would trigger the application of the "one man-one vote" rule. This is evidenced by broad language used in Hadley v. The Junior College District of Metropolitan Kansas City, Missouri, 397 U.S. 50, 90 S.Ct. 791, 25 L.Ed.2d 45 (1970):

"[W]hile the office of junior college trustee differs in certain respects from those offices considered in prior cases,

it is exactly the same in one crucial factor--these officials are elected by popular vote. [25 L.Ed.2d, at 50.]

. . . .

"If one person's vote is given less weight through unequal apportionment, his right to equal voting participation is impaired just as much when he votes for a school board member as when he votes for a state legislator. While there are differences in the powers of different officials, the crucial consideration is the right of each qualified voter to participate on an equal footing in the election process. [25 L.Ed.2d, at 50.]

. . . .

"[This] case forebodes, if indeed it does not decide, that the rule is to be applied to every elective public body, no matter what its nature. [J. Harland dissent, 25 L.Ed.2d, at 53.]"

Thus, in our opinion, the "one man-one vote" rule [described in Reynolds v. Sims, supra as substantially equal representation and clarified by Mahan v. Howell, 410 U.S. 315, 325, 35 L.Ed.2d 320, 330 (1973) as requiring an equal protection analysis] applies to the election of State Board of Education members, and the board member districts must be apportioned according to population on an equal basis, as far as practical.

The 1988 census figures you have provided show a 44.4% total deviation in the State Board of Education member districts. This is beyond any deviation the courts have found acceptable, thus requiring that something be done. Unless the senatorial districts can be regrouped to significantly lessen the total deviation (by amending K.S.A. 25-1911), it appears the senatorial districts must be reapportioned in 1989 to assure the constitutionality of the 1990 State Board of Education board member elections.


Finally, you inquire whether reapportionment of the Senate in 1989 will have any effect on incumbent senators' terms of office. The Kansas Supreme Court has held that it does not:

"The apportionment of the state into legislative districts pertains to the future election of a senator and representative from the district created by law and does not affect the title to office or the tenure of the members making the apportionment." Harris v. Shanahan, 192 Kan. 183, syl. ¶17 (1963).


While this case preceded Reynolds v. Sims and Baker v. Carr, in our opinion the above-quoted conclusion would still prevail. Please note, however, that should a vacancy occur in the senate, it would be filled according to the new boundaries established by the reapportionment. Marston v. Kline, 301 A.2d 393 (Pa. 1973). (The Pa. Constitutional provision which provides that "districts shall be used thereafter in elections . . ." is substantially the same as the Kansas constitutional provision.)

In conclusion, reapportionment of the Senate need not necessarily coincide with reapportionment of the House of Representatives. However, unless the senatorial districts (upon which State Board of Education member districts are based) can be regrouped to lessen the current total deviation in population, the Senate must be reapportioned in 1989 to assure the constitutionality of the 1990 board member elections. Reapportionment of the Senate in 1989 will not affect the terms of office of incumbent senators.
