Hearing on: SB 762 - Relating to personnel of the Kansas lottery

Jerry Simpson, Kansas Lottery, said that this bill would allow for a position of director of sales and marketing, as well as a director of finance who would be directly responsible for accounting and budgeting operations. He felt it was important to have both positions. He will provide an organizational chart and names of those who fill the slots.

A motion was made by Senator Morris and seconded by Senator Bond to recommend the bill favorably for passage. The motion carried.

Hearing on: HB 2695 - concerning disposition of certain firearms forfeited to law enforcement agencies

Darrell Montei, Department of Wildlife and Parks, said the bill would provide authority to law enforcement agencies to donate confiscated firearms to Wildlife and Parks and the KBI. They support the bill.

Hearing on: HB 2712 - concerning law enforcement training certification

Staff said this bill would repeal a duplicate statute which resulted when the statute was amended twice during the 1988 Session.

A motion was made by Senator Morris and seconded by Senator Strick that the bill be recommended favorably for passage and placed on the consent calendar. The motion carried.

Action on: HB 2844 - making the Kansas lottery subject to the sunset law

A motion was made by Senator Bond and seconded by Senator Strick that the committee reconsider its action of March 16. The motion carried.

A motion was made by Senator Vidricksen and seconded by Senator Bond that the date of the sunset be changed back to 1992. The motion carried.

A motion was made by Senator Bond and seconded by Senator Morris

Testimony Provided to Senate Federal and State Affairs Committee

March 19, 1990

H.B. 2695 would amend K.S.A. 21-4206 to provide additional firearms disposition authority to various law enforcement agencies. Confiscated firearms, when no longer needed for evidentiary purposes, may be returned by the court to the enforcement agency seizing the firearm. The receiving enforcement agency shall either sell the firearms with proceeds used for law enforcement purposes or trade the firearms for materials to be used for law enforcement.

H.B. 2695 would provide authority to law enforcement agencies to donate confiscated firearms to the Department as another option. Those agencies would retain the right to use whatever option they deem appropriate.

These firearms will benefit the Department's Hunter Education Program and the many volunteer instructors who are the backbone of that program. Certain firearms would be of benefit to our animal damage control efforts and will enhance training programs for our law enforcement personnel.

This bill was amended by the House Committee to include the K.B.I. as an agency authorized to also receive confiscated firearms from other enforcement agencies. The Department does not oppose that amendment.

The Department supports H.B. 2695.
