Chairman Bogina called the meeting to order and announced that subcommittee assignments had been made and were being distributed. (Attachment 6).

SB 373 - Compensation and expenses of members of state board of regents

Senator Bogina explained that SB 373 would equate compensation for members of the Board of Regents with that of legislators. The cost of the bill would be an \$8,412 additional expenditure from the State General Fund based on last year's figures.

Following discussion, Senator Gaines moved and Senator Feleciano seconded to amend SB 373 to include the Turnpike Authority. Following further discussion, Senators Gaines and Feleciano withdrew their motion and second.

Senator Bogina announced that the Committee would hold the bill to allow staff time to provide more information regarding compensation rates for various state boards.

SB 359 - Prescribing annual salaries of public officers.

Ron Miles appeared before the Committee on behalf of the State Board of Indigents' Defense Services in support of amending SB 359 to allow district public defenders to be compensated at the same rate as district attorneys. He reviewed Attachment 1, and told the Committee that the average salary of the 5 public defenders is \$45,000; whereas the average salary of a district attorney is \$60,000.

Gerald Goodell, State Board of Indigents' Defense Services, told the Committee that the public defender system is more economical than assigned counsel. There are currently 5 offices in Salina, Junction City, Topeka, Wichita, and Johnson county; plans to locate in Wyandotte and Leavenworth; and a recommended office in Garden City. In answer to a question, Mr. Goodell stated that he was proposing raising the salary from \$46,000 to \$60,000 for 5 persons plus any additional offices which may be opened.

Gene Olander, Shawnee County District Attorney, appeared before the Committee in opposition to section one of SB 359, and reviewed Attachment 2.

Nick Tomasic, District Attorney of Wyandotte County, appeared before the

Committee to ask that district attorneys' salaries be equal to that of judges. (Attachment 3)

Tom Bath, Assistant District Attorney of Johnson County, appeared before the Committee on behalf of Paul Morrison, Johnson County District Attorney, and reviewed Attachment 4.

Keith Farrar, Board of Tax Appeals, told the Committee that all board members would prefer to stay under current provisions. He noted that members of the Board of Tax Appeals are appointed from Congressional districts, and these persons have the additional expense of maintaining a home in Topeka. Mr. Farrar suggested that because the Corporation Commission, the Board of Tax Appeals and the Parole Board all have similar responsibilities, their pay should be commensurate.

Elwaine Pomeroy, Kansas Parole Board, appeared in opposition to SB 359, and reviewed Attachment 5.

Chairman Bogina asked for the Committee's wishes. Senator Winter moved and Senator Allen seconded that SB 359 be reported adversely. The motion carried.

Chairman Bogina requested that the subcommittee which has the Board of Indigents' Defense review salaries of that board.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:50 A.M. with the next meeting scheduled for 11:00 A.M., January 24, 1990.

Senate Bill 359

The State Board of Indigents' Defense Services supports amending this bill to allow District Public Defenders to be compensated at the same rate as district attorneys.

Public defenders protect the constitutional rights of our citizens.

Public defenders have district-wide jurisdiction, sometimes multi-district assignments.

Public defenders routinely represent clients charged with society's most heinous crimes, at great personal sacrifice in terms of time, effort and prestige.

District Public Defenders must possess the same experience and educational qualifications as district judges.

District Public Defenders are active trial lawyers and administrators, requirements not made of district attorneys.

Kansas ranked 9th in a recent survey of public defender salaries in ten states.

District Public Defenders continually strive to provide effective and economical defense services, having averaged \$300 per case in FY 89, contrasted with an assigned counsel average of \$471.

20 *Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:*

21 Section 1. K.S.A. 22a-105 is hereby amended to read as follows:
22 22a-105. *Except as otherwise provided in section 5*, each of the
23 district attorneys elected under this act shall receive an annual salary
24 ~~equal to the salary provided for district judges in K.S.A. 1978~~
25 ~~Supp. 75-3120g, and any amendments thereto~~ of \$60,978. The
26 salary of each district attorney shall be paid by the county comprising
27 the judicial district in which ~~he or she~~ *the district attorney* is elected
28 in equal monthly installments and in the manner county officers and

Testimony of Gene M. Olander, Shawnee County
District Attorney on Senate Bill 359

The five District Attorneys are opposed to section one of Senate Bill 359.

In 1973, District Attorneys' salary (\$21,000) - same as District Judges.

The District Attorneys' salary lagged behind District Judges until 1978 when 22a-105 was amended to its present provision - present salary is \$65,248.

American Bar Association: Standards on the Prosecution Function; recommends that the chief full time prosecutor receive the same salary as judges of general jurisdictions in their respective districts.

The District Attorneys' salary has no fiscal impact on the State budget.

There are only five District Attorneys, all in the largest jurisdictions with large staffs and many responsibilities.

District Attorneys have basically the same qualifications as District Judge and economic fairness should be considered in passing on this provision.

The relationship and responsibility between District Attorneys and District Judges are very similar. We can't speak to the other positions affected by this bill but only to the five District Attorney positions.

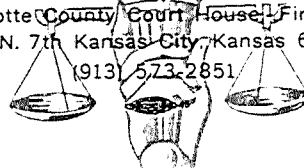
There is a clear and rational relationship between the two positions and this has not only been recognized by the American Bar Association but by the 1978 Kansas legislature.

The American Prosecutor, representing the executive branch, under a system of divided powers, defined in a written constitution, is an officer of the Court only in the same sense as any other lawyer. He is not a career official or civil servant. He is an elected local official, having no ties with the Judiciary, or Legislative branches of the government, nor even with the Attorney General of the State.

The prosecutor has enormous power. The power of the prosecutor to institute criminal prosecutions rests in him an authority in the administration of criminal justice, at least as sweeping as, and perhaps greater than, the authority of the Judge who presides in criminal cases.

The prosecutor has a final rule which reflects in a sense the conflicting public attitudes on law enforcement and is the source of some difficulties.

On the one hand, the prosecutor is the leader of law enforcement in the community. He is expected to participate actively in the fight against crime.

He is also called upon to make public statements, to propose legislative reform, or to direct the energies of the law enforcement machinery of the community. He is expected to be tough on crime.

On the other hand, the office demands and the public expects, that the prosecutor will respect the rights of persons accused of crime.

Our nation began with resistance to oppressive official conduct and our constitutions demand that the prosecutor accord basic fairness to all persons. Because of the power the prosecutor has, the constitution imposes on him a special duty to protect the innocent and to safeguard the rights guaranteed to all, including those who may be guilty.

The conflicting demands on a prosecutor may exert pressures on him, but his public responsibilities as well as his obligations to the bar and the community require that he be something more than a partisan advocate intent on winning cases.

The legal profession has long been aware of the special aspects of the prosecutors role. The code of Professional Responsibility, states,

"The responsibility of a public prosecutor differs from that of the usual advocate; his duty is to seek justice, not merely to convict."

Because he is lawyer as well as a public officer, he is answerable not only to the voting public, but also to the professional discipline code, and also to appellate review, where his conduct can be called into question.

Trials, represent a small part of the activity of the prosecutor.

The vast majority of the criminal cases are disposed of without trial as the result of guilty pleas.

Properly conducted, plea discussion may produce a result that we expect from a trial, but more quickly.

Disposition without a trial provides a substantial saving to the legal community and the general public, both in terms of time and money.

Cost saving alone is not an appropriate justification for avoiding a trial. However, a fair and just disposition of a case without a trial is obviously preferable to its disposition by trial, as is true in civil litigation. The speed and certainty of a disposition by plea promotes deterrence, a basic goal of criminal justice.

The plea discussion process also affords an important avenue for a personalized application of standards to take into account the particular circumstances of the offense and of the offender. It gives the defense attorney an opportunity to expose more of the background of the accused which may lead to a better disposition of the case.

There is an enormous rise in the crime rate. The public is concerned with the quality and the efficiency of the administration of the justice system. All aspects of the criminal justice system have undergone changes in the past 10 or 20 years.

The legislative and the county have imposed restraints upon the justice system, and some of the restraints are the result of excesses on the part of law enforcement agencies and their failure to adapt to changing conditions.

I have no quarrel with this. Law enforcement in our free society must obey the rules established by our constitution. We must serve society.

I am here today for District Attorney Paul Morrison opposing Senate Bill #359. Mr. Morrison could not be here today as he is involved in an anti-drug meeting with the County Commission.

I believe it is only fair that a District Attorney in the State of Kansas should be paid commensurate with a District Court Judge. The District Attorney in today's world runs a large office in a sizeable urban area. In many respects, that individual is like the head of a large corporation. The demands are very great and oftentimes there are scant resources to deal with the problems. I know that the District Attorney of Johnson County, more often than not, works a sixty hour week. I know that to do the job well requires a massive investment of time and energy. To say that the District Attorney in the State of Kansas is not equal to the pay of a District Court Judge is ridiculous. We strongly oppose this measure.

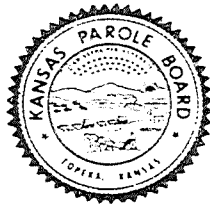

District Attorney prosecutes all criminal cases

Parole Board decides upon release

Corporation Commission decided complex cases, often after protracted hearings

Board of Tax Appeals always has heavy workload - especially now

KPB and BTA salaries were tied to administrative judges

Chairman - administrative judge who was a district judge

Members - administrative judge who was an associate district judge

When associate judges eliminated, differential was set at \$2,465, which was the difference between district judges and associate district judges

KCC differential is between chief judge and other judges of court of appeals
