Meeting was called to order by Chairman Dean.

Rep. Dean commented on an LCC meeting held February 6, 1991, that had established some priorities as to how computers would be installed.

Dave Larson explained that the Computer Subcommittee of LCC asked to detail for them the committees who need implementation of computers. Results are, that as proposed, every Committee Secretary and every Office Secretary will get a desk top microcomputer and printer and all will network together. Leadership offices are also included. If plan adopted in entirety everyone from lowest to highest office would done next summer. Would accept any partial orders of equipment rather than postponing something indefinitely. This committee is to be provided with copy of time frame schedule.

The Committee then proceeded to the Clerk of House for a review of their computer systems. Janet Jones, Chief Clerk, passed out documentation giving background information of the office's computerization. (Attmt. #1).

Discussion followed.

Computerization has saved \$8000 in printing costs. Have same number of employees in office this year, but will be reducing by one or two in the future. The Clerk's office does not have a high turnover.

Recommendation was made by Chairman Dean to make arrangements where secretaries could come in during December and have a course in Word Perfect. They would not be paid a salary but cost of course would be paid. It was felt this recommendation would be cost beneficial. Some of the office secretaries have taken a course on Word Perfect from KNEA.

Need to negotiate with vendors so that they provide classes geared toward work done by legislature. Macintosh and IBM are about the same, except Macintosh cannot sort, draw lines, cannot edit macros or pause. Would have to have copy of program such as Word Perfect for each machine.

COMPUTERS, COMMUNICATION AND TECHNOLOGY

February 7, 1991

BACKGROUND: The office of the Chief Clerk has become very computerized over the last several years. This was primarily started when the voting machine was purchased from Daktronics in 1978. The basis for the vote recording was on disks (remember the old 8" ones?) and therefore, with the cooperation of the Revisor of Statutes staff, a program was set up to transmit the voting records directly on line to the printing plant. Although there were many bugs in that old system, it did work until the type of unit (Sycor) we were using was no longer supported by any company. At that time, the software was rewritten to use an IBM terminal. This is still in use.

Also, about the time the voting system was upgraded, the mainframe CICS operation for Bill Status which is what you get printed weekly in the Bill Status book or on the information terminals was established. An employee of each house is responsible for data input on each action in their body. This system is set up and maintained by the Revisor's office. I work with that system to assign the code numbers for all members and committees.

To utilize the information available in the system a program was written which allowed the data to be used for the Bill History in the permanent journals of both houses. This eliminated two positions (Bill History Clerk and Docket Clerk) in the staffs of both the House and Senate. The accuracy of the materail was greatly improved as there was no additional keystroking of material.

Also, for the permanent journal, the Subject Index was at one time prepared on the TextDBMS system. However, because of the technology which became available at the State Printing Plant, that is now done on WordPerfect. The mainframe program is harder to teach staff and because of extensive use of macros in WordPerfect the typing is greatly reduced. When one is using part-time employees, it is important that they quickly become productive. We have no opportunity for training and the mainframe programs take much longer to teach. The WordPerfect 5.0 process on the Subject Index takes two weeks less than using the mainframe program and the processing at the printing plant is significantly less also. There is a cost saving in DISC computer

time and also payroll on my staff.

Every two years a program is run which was written by the Revisor's staff which is used by the House leadership in making committee assignments. This program produces a listing of tentative assignments, conflicts of times, available members, etc. and is a valuable tool in this area. All data entry into the system is done by the Chief Clerk.

The House and Senate staffs are responsible for creating the list of documents (new bills, resolutions, committee reports and amendments) that need to be printed each day at the State Printing Plant. Also, the Revisor's identification number is cross-referenced with the number assigned to each bill or resolution. This allows each house to be responsible for their own work. This system was set up by the Revisor's office also.

As votes are taken on the House voting system, the data is stored on a hard disk in the IBM terminal at the front desk. However, in order for the State Printing Plant to access this data, the votes are transferred into the TextDBMS system. There is opportunity for a program to be run which would give a complete voting record for each House member which would be accurate and timely.

CURRENT: Moving the preparation of the House Journal and House Calendar into the 20th century has long been a goal of mine. The physical cut and paste operation is not only time consuming and messy but means that everything must be done at least twice.

For the 1990 session, the House Agenda in the Calendar was scanned into the computer, printed out and the State Printing Plant used that copy as camera ready copy. This worked out well but was very time consuming to produce in our office because of the codes for tabs, bold, margins, etc. also scan into the document and all had to be removed. The product was good but the printing quality did not match the rest of the document because of the lack of identical fonts and type sizes.

During the summer, I worked with the State Printer's staff and we developed a system whereby we scan in the documents, use codes which their computer can read and which sets the type styles and drive the printer. This has cut about 3 hours of preparation time off our work on Wednesday and at least an hour each day of the week when we are doing revised Agendas. It has also eliminated one typesetting operation and double proofreading per day. Previously we had to proof following the cut and paste

operation to determine if everything was placed in the proper position and then the following morning to determine if the State Printer did it correctly. This is also very cost effective from the point of view of the printing plant charging us for their time, keystrokes and setup. (I have also been able to get the Senate started on some of the same programs although they are not doing as much as we are--yet.)

This is all done on WordPerfect 5.0. Because the scanner is a MAC we must convert the documents to an IBM format which is all the State Printing Plant is able to use at this time. [MAC software **may** soon be available.]

We are also able to accept disks in either the MAC or IBM format from committee secretaries. Then their Agenda is just retrieved into our document.

Also, the "Status of Bills and Resolutions" and "House and Senate Bills in Committees" sections of the Calendar are prepared using WordPerfect 5.0. These are perfect documents to prepare on this type system because they work from a common base and numbers are added and deleted each day. Doing it in this manner allows us to proof our work before printing--not after the document is already published.

We are unable to automate any more of the Calendar due to the inability to obtain Bill and Resolution Titles from the Revisor's data base. We do not want to type titles into our document--each retyping opens an opportunity for errors. Also, part-time staff are not always at a level where one would ask them to prepare titles--the titles in the Revisor's base have been proofed and reproofed, which we would only duplicate.

Therefore, the main body of the Calendar is still the manual cut and paste preparation, relying on the State Printing Plant to pick up the correct work. Being able to import the bill and resolution titles electronically would allow us document control.

Another possibility is that when the leadership has computers with which we can communicate, they will be able to set General Orders and Reference of Bills on their system and we will access it for the Calendar.

The House Journal is completely computerized, except for bill titles and resolutions (which are transmitted on-line and printed in full) and amendments prepared by the Revisor's. Documents which are received as addresses (Governor, Chief Justice, etc.)

are scanned into the computer as are Communications from State Officers, etc. A series of macros sets up the Journal preparation. The only free text typing is done when Committee of the Whole is entered or when there are procedural motions made in the House.

Starting this month we will be picking up the Senate messages from the computer. That is where they are prepared and although we need hard copy to distribute and to accompany the bills we will be able to pick up those messages and import them into our documents. We will not have to retype them and neither will the printing plant. However, we will have to convert them to WordPerfect 5.0 and make a disk to take to the Journal Room which ties up our machine when someone else needs to be working on it. (Messages are written with macros also--just fill in the blanks, etc.)

When doing the Special Remarks section for the permanent journal, the clerk copies the data from the Journal over into her document for use, never having to retype any material.

Petitions are prepared on the computer and saved for the permanent journal. Each week as new ones are added they are saved for that week's printing and then put into the total base for later use.

The Enrolling and Engrossing Clerks type their reports into WordPerfect 5.0 for the Journal thereby eliminating two retypings done previously (Journal staff and printer).

The best thing about doing our work in WordPerfect is that it is so easy to learn. We have people who have come to us with prior knowledge; we have staff that have gotten summer jobs because of the skill they learned here. Also, I can do all the training necessary for the work we produce.

By using WordPerfect, we can evaluate the way we do things and change them ourselves without having to rely on someone else to set them up for us. This leaves us more free to experiment and adjust to the situations as they arise.

POSSIBILITIES: A Bill Title package which would be retrieval only and accessible through an IRMA connection and then imported to the PC document could be used by the Calendar and also by the Journal for Final Action titles.

When each committee secretary has a personal computer, they will

be able to send us the Agenda electronically and we can copy it into our program for the Calendar. Another possibility is that they will be able to bring us the data on a disk.

SUMMARY: By accepting (scrounging) the cast off equipment from other departments, I have been able to automate much of the work we want to accomplish. However, having only one MAC creates a bottleneck in writing information on disks for the State Printer.

The best solution of all would be to have the computer on the Journal desk in the Chamber and the Journal could be written as the session is in progress.







Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Kansas, the Senate concurring therein: That the Kansas legislature urges the United States congress to enact legislation providing a comprehensive national health plan that would cover all Americans.

Be it further resolved: That the Secretary of State be directed to send enrolled copies of this resolution to each member of the Kansas Congressional Delegation.
