

MINUTES OF THE House COMMITTEE ON Governmental Organization

The meeting was called to order by Representative Gary Blumenthal at

Chairman Blumenthal called the meeting to order when quorum was present.

Hearing on SB 749 - No conferees appeared. Chair advised that he discussed this bill with Senator Oleen; she requested that HB 3103 be amended into SB 749.

Motion by Representative Bowden to amend HB 3103, as it passed the House, into SB 749--also permitting Revisor to make any technical corrections.
Motion seconded by Representative Hamilton, motion carried.

On bill as a whole, motion by Representative Bowden to report SB 749 favorably as amended. Motion seconded by Representative Hamilton, motion carried.

Hearing on SB 474 - An act concerning the Kansas sunset law, continuing in existence the Kansas commission for the deaf and hearing impaired.

Representative Ruth Ann Hackler submitted Subcommittee #2's report for the approval of the committee. She began by thanking Subcommittee members, staff and personnel from the Commission for their cooperation. (Attachment 1)

Representative Hackler reviewed the 6 recommendations contained in the report. The bill, as amended, would remove the Commission from provisions of the Sunset law and change the name of the Commission to Kansas Commission for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing.

Staff, Carolyn Rampey, explained 2 other proposed amendments. The first provides that appointments to the Commission will be staggered and begin and end on date certain. The second amendment is intended to correct technical errors in drafting Senate amendments; changing specific wording on lines 12, 13 and 14.

Motion by Representative Hackler to accept the Subcommittee's Report.
Motion seconded by Representative Samuelson, motion carried.

Representative McClure moved for the adoption of the above-recommended amendments, as one. Motion seconded by Representative Gilbert, motion passed.

Chair recognized Rogers Brazier, proponent for SB 474, who provided written testimony on the amendment. Since the amendment already passed, he declined to speak. (Attachment 2)

On bill as a whole, motion by Representative Hackler to report SB 474 favorable as amended. Motion seconded by Representative Brown, motion carried.

Chair directed committee's attention to Sub SB 471 and HB 3109--they will be taken up together.

Sub SB 471 - An act enacting the Kansas governmental operations accountability law.

HB 3109 ---- An act concerning the Kansas sunset law; continuing the provisions thereof in existence.

Chair recognized Representative Al Ramirez, who thanked all who participated in the review and assisted in preparing the report being submitted for the committee's consideration. (Attachment 3)

Representative Ramirez reviewed Subcommittee #1's recommendations to add the Department of Education to the list of agencies scheduled for audit review in 1998 and to change audit dates for both the Department of Administration and the Department of Human Resources.

The Subcommittee further recommended amending HB 3109--extend the Kansas Sunset Law for 1 year, 7-1-1993; include the Kansas Racing Commission for sunset review in 1993. Representative Ramirez stressed the Subcommittee's concerns regarding the Division of Information Systems and Communication (DISC) also scheduled for sunset 7-1-93 under provisions of HB 2668, recommended by the House Committee.

Julian Efird clarified the 2 separate amendments prepared by staff (Avis Swartzman). The first deals with the 3 recommendations in the report for Sub SB 471. The second is to amend HB 3109, the sunset bill, as outlined in the report.

Motion by Representative Ramirez to accept the Subcommittee's report. Motion seconded by Representative Watson, motion carried.

Representative Bowden moved to amend Sub SB 471, adding the Department of Education for review and changing review dates for Department of Administration to 1994 and the Department of Human Resources to 1999. Motion seconded by Representative Benlon, motion carried.

Representative Hamilton made a motion to amend the lottery into the K-GOAL bill (Sub SB 471), extending it for 3 years to 1995. Motion seconded by Representative Watson, discussion followed---several members expressed their strong opposition to the proposed amendment. Motion failed.

On bill as a whole, motion by Representative Bowden to report Sub SB 471 favorably as amended. Motion seconded by Representative Benlon, motion carried.

Action on HB 3109 - Motion by Representation Bowden to amend HB 3109, extending the sunset law for 1 year. Motion seconded by Representative McClure, discussion followed. The consensus of the committee was to extend the sunset law for longer than 1 year. Representative Bowden withdrew his motion and re-submitted motion to extend the sunset law for 4 years. Motion seconded by Representative McClure, motion passed.

On bill as a whole, motion by Representative Bowden to report HB 3109 favorably as amended. Motion seconded by Representative Weimer, motion passed.

Re: Sunset Review of the Kansas Commission for the Deaf and Hearing Impaired

The Subcommittee on the Sunset of the Commission for the Deaf and Hearing Impaired held two meetings to consider the Commission. The first meeting was for the purpose of receiving testimony and was scheduled to coincide with a meeting of the Commission in Topeka. As a result, the Subcommittee was able to receive input from Commission members, as well as from Commission staff, representatives of other state agencies, representatives of public and private groups that provide services for the disabled, and other interested parties. All testimony received by the Subcommittee was supportive of the Commission. In addition, Representative Hackler and Representative Brown were part of a group of legislators that met in Olathe to discuss matters of concern to the deaf community. Support was expressed for the Commission at that meeting as well.

The Subcommittee wishes to commend the Commission and its staff for the quality of the information it provided and the way in which that material was presented. (All comments during the meeting were immediately flashed on a screen, which enabled deaf members of the audience to follow and take part in the discussion.) In order to put the recommendations that follow in context, the Subcommittee wishes to state that it is impressed with the work of the Commission and thinks the Commission's work should be expanded so that persons in all parts of the state have access to the services it provides.

1. **S.B. 474, as amended, should be recommended favorable for passage. The bill would remove the Commission from provisions of the Sunset Law entirely and change the name of the Commission to the "Kansas Commission for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing." The Subcommittee also recommends that an amendment be added to the bill to clarify that appointments to the Commission begin and end on a date certain. In addition, the Subcommittee recommends an amendment to correct an oversight made when the Senate amendments were added.**

As introduced, S.B. 474 would have extended the Commission until July 1, 2000, under provisions of the Sunset Law. The Senate amended the bill to remove the Commission from the Sunset Law entirely. The Subcommittee supports the Senate amendment. As informative and interesting as the Subcommittee's review of the Commission was, the Subcommittee is mindful that such reviews are time

consuming for the Legislature and for the agency involved, particularly if its staff is small. The Legislature can ask for reports from the Commission any time it chooses. Removing the Commission from the Sunset Law will free up time for legislators to spend reviewing agencies that need oversight and give the Commission more time to do its job. (The Senate Amendment intended to accomplish this policy change was not correctly drafted. The Subcommittee recommends an amendment to S.B. 474 that would accurately reflect the Senate's recommendation.)

The Subcommittee also supports the name change of the Commission that S.B. 474 would accomplish. "Hearing impaired" has become obsolete nationally and the change to "hard of hearing" is requested by the Commission as being more descriptive of the condition of some of the people it serves.

The Subcommittee suggests an amendment to the bill which was proposed on behalf of the Appointments Secretary to the Governor. The bill as passed by the Senate would provide that the 12 Commission members appointed by the Governor serve four-year staggered terms. (Current law provides for three-year terms that are not staggered.) The suggested amendment would make it clear that the terms of appointive members begin and end on a date certain.

2. **Services provided by the Commission should be expanded, particularly to rural parts of the state, and the Commission should be encouraged to come forward to the Legislature with recommendations and proposals to accomplish this expansion.**

Testimony before the Subcommittee indicated that the Commission can be a lifeline for those deaf and hard of hearing people who live where services are provided. But for many Kansans who live in rural parts of the state, those services are not available. Unfortunately, the resources of the Commission are limited -- it has a staff of 4.0 FTE positions and a budget of approximately \$250,000. These resources already are strained and it is unrealistic to expect that much more can be done unless the Legislature enhances the Commission's resources. The Subcommittee makes no specific recommendation in this regard, but, having gone on record in support of expanded services, feels obligated to give its support to requests the Commission may make in the future for the additional staff and funding it will need if its services are to be expanded.

3. **The Commission should make an effort to develop an information base to document the number and location of persons in Kansas who are deaf and hard of hearing and who are in need of services the Commission provides.**

Members of the Subcommittee who promote the activities of the Commission and services for the deaf in general have been frustrated in the past because data to document the need for additional services do not exist or are incomplete. The Subcommittee encourages the Commission to address this need for better information.

4. **Educational institutions should be encouraged to provide outreach services and cooperative programs in order to extend training opportunities and other services statewide.**

The Subcommittee is aware of institutions that provide training for interpreters and other persons who work with the deaf and hard of hearing, but knows that these services are not available statewide. In addition, there is an unmet need for educational and vocational training programs, sign language training and materials, telecommunication training courses, workshops, and other services for both the deaf and their families and for teachers and other professionals who work with the deaf. Because it is not feasible for every school to offer these programs and services, the Subcommittee encourages the schools that are able to do so to enter into consortia and to develop outreach programs that will make more services available in the most efficient way.

5. **Support should be given to H.B. 2925, which would authorize the Commission to provide for the certification of interpreters and to charge fees for interpreter certification.**

The enactment of H.B. 2925, which is supported by the Commission, would authorize the Commission to regulate and certify persons who provide interpreting services for the deaf and hard of hearing. The Subcommittee supports the enactment of this bill.

6. **Legislation should be considered that would extend confidentiality provisions to interpreters for the deaf and hard of hearing.**

Time did not permit the Subcommittee to consider a proposal requested by the Commission that would make the relationship between an interpreter and a deaf or hard of hearing person subject to protections of confidentiality that exist for other professional-client relationships. The Subcommittee supports the concept and encourages the Commission to work with the Legislature to get its proposal implemented.

RE: Senate Bill No. 474

On behalf of the Appointments Secretary to the Office of the Governor, I would like to suggest an amendment to §2(b) of Senate Bill No. 474. A copy of the proposed amendment is attached to this memorandum.

The purpose of the proposed amendment would be to:

1. Insure that the staggered terms have a uniform beginning and termination date at annual intervals.
2. Provide that those members of the present commission serving unexpired terms on the effective date of the act would be reappointed to the new commission.

I believe that the proposed amendment merely clarifies what I perceive to be the intent of the legislature, but which due to appointments already having been made at different dates since October 31, 1991 would not be met with the language that presently exists in the first sentence of §2(b).

Thank you for your consideration of the requested amendment to this act.

RE: SUBCOMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

The Subcommittee reviewed the bill as passed by the Senate (Attachment 1) and discussed the original bill as introduced by the Special Interim Committee on Governmental Organization. The Subcommittee also discussed the present Kansas Sunset Law and some of the agencies scheduled for review under sunset provisions. Legislative Research staff provided a listing of state agencies ranked by State General Fund expenditures in FY 1991, including state operations expenditures and total operating expenditures (Attachment 2).

Subcommittee Recommendations

The Subcommittee makes the following recommendations to modify Substitute for S.B. 471 as passed by the Senate:

1. Add the Department of Education to the list of agencies scheduled for audit, evaluation and review in 1998. The Department of Education's inclusion was discussed in the Senate, but the agency was not added to the Senate version of the bill.
2. Shift the Department of Administration from audit, evaluation and review scheduled for 1999 in the Senate version to 1994.
3. Shift the Department of Human Resources from audit, evaluation and review scheduled for 1994 in the Senate version to 1999.

The Subcommittee recommends the items 1-3 be included as amendments to Substitute for S.B. 471, and that the bill be passed as amended.

In addition, the Subcommittee recommends the following item which concerns sunset:

1. Amend H.B. 3109 to extend the Kansas Sunset Law for one additional year, changing the expiration date from July 1, 1992, to July 1, 1993, and include the Kansas Racing Commission for sunset review by the 1993 Legislature in scheduling it for abolition on July 1, 1993. Also included under sunset review next year is the Division of Information Systems and Communications, scheduled for sunset on July 1, 1993, in provisions of H.B. 2668, as recommended by the House Committee.

SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE BILL NO. 471

As Amended by Senate on Final Action

Brief*

Sub. S.B. 471, as amended, would establish the **Kansas Governmental Operations Accountability Law (K-GOAL)**. Some of the agencies currently subject to sunset are included under K-GOAL. Other agencies currently subject to sunset are removed from the Kansas Sunset Law, except for the Kansas Lottery.

K-GOAL would provide for scheduled legislative oversight of designated state agencies, consisting of audit, review, and evaluation of certain state agencies on an annual basis, with no threat of abolition of any state agency which is reviewed.

The audit, review, and evaluation of designated state agencies would be required at least every eight years. Subsequent timing of evaluations of designated state agencies would be subject to legislative determination.

- A performance audit would be required of each state agency scheduled for evaluation and an audit could be no more than two years old to meet this requirement.
- Reviews would be required in each house, with performance audits to be made available by 30th day of the session.
- No abolition of any state agency scheduled for evaluation would be threatened.

Background

S.B. 471 was recommended by the Special Committee on Governmental Organization which reviewed the Kansas Sunset Law during the 1991 interim. The Sunset Law is scheduled to expire on July 1, 1992.

S.B. 471, as introduced, included most of the agencies currently subject to sunset. The bill would have provided for two separate legislative review procedures, the first process for evaluation of one group of state agencies (which is retained in the bill as amended by the Senate Committee) and a second process for abolition of another group of state agencies (which is deleted by the Senate Committee amendments).

A third group of state agencies currently subject to sunset would be removed from abolition and not included under K-GOAL: the Kansas Coal Commission, the State Library, the Dealer Review Board, and the Commission for the Deaf and Hearing Impaired.

State agencies included in the original bill (and under provisions of the Kansas Sunset Act) which would be removed by the Senate amendments from K-GOAL include: the Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board, Commission on Epilepsy, Human Rights Commission, Kansas Film Services Commission, Board of Nursing, Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct, Real Estate Appraisal Board, Board of Healing Arts, Insurance Department, State Treasurer's Office, Pooled Money Investment Board, Kansas Lottery, and Lottery Commission.

The Senate Committee on Governmental Organization added three agencies to S.B. 471 which are not included in the current Kansas Sunset Act: the Capitol Area Security Patrol, the State Board of Agriculture, and the State Conservation Commission. Four entities originally scheduled for abolition in S.B. 471 as introduced were shifted to the evaluation procedures: the Kansas Water Office and Water Authority plus the Kansas Lottery and Lottery Commission. Other Senate Committee amendments changed the maximum period between reviews from six to eight years, authorized the use of two-year-old performance audits rather than one-year-old audits, and made the effective date of the new law upon publication in the *Kansas Register*.

The Senate on Final Action amended S.B. 471 to keep the Kansas Lottery and Lottery Commission subject to the Kansas Sunset Law. Both entities are scheduled for abolition on June 30, 1992, under provisions of the Kansas Sunset Law. The Senate also deleted provisions in S.B. 471 which would have repealed the Kansas Sunset Law and changed the effective date of K-GOAL to July 1, 1992, instead of upon publication in the *Kansas Register*. The Kansas Sunset Law expires on June 30, 1992, according to K.S.A. 74-7245.
