MINUTES OF THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON FEDERAL AND STATE AFFAIRS.

The meeting was called to order by Senator Oleen at 11:10 a.m. on February 1, 1995 in Room 254-E of the Capitol.

Sen. Oleen announced that each member had a copy of follow up information from Adjutant General Rueger's National Guard presentation which outlined exactly how many armories there were across the state and where they are located (Attachment 1). Each member also received written testimony from Racing Commissioner Robert Londerholm (Attachment 2) in support of **SB 124**.

Sen. Oleen called for introduction of bills and Sen. Tillotson introduced a proposed Senate Concurrent Resolution which provides for the convening of a conference of the states (Attachment 3). Sen. Tillotson made a motion to introduce it and it was seconded by Sen. Praeger. The motion passed.

Sen. Oleen introduced Col. Fred Hepler and pointed out that last year the Governor established the task force and committed some state dollars to ensure that the task force was on track in targeting and being able to tell the story of Ft. Riley, the second largest industry in the state of Kansas. Sen. Oleen introduced Rep. Gerry Geringer from Junction City and other interested parties.

Col. Hepler began by explaining that "BRAC" is the acronym for the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commission. The commission was established in the U.S. Congress to carry out three rounds of military base closings and realignments. Col. Hepler stated that the 1995 round will prove to be very competitive. He outlined many of the reasons BRAC became necessary, listed the criteria each base is held accountable for in the selection process, and finally addressed whether Fort Riley specifically was at risk (Attachment 4). Col. Hepler was careful to point out that BRAC will consider the cumulative economic impact on communities when making its decisions which has not been done in previous BRAC's.

While discussing whether Fort Riley was at risk, Col. Hepler explained that each base was ranked on a scale from 1 to 11 and that Fort Riley had received a ranking of 8 in 1993. Col. Hepler stated that all of the data would be resubmitted for analysis in 1995 and therefore improvements, such as the completion of a railhead which has increased the base's ability to conduct strategic deployment, would be included. Sen. Oleen asked when the next ranking by the Department of the Army would come out and Col. Hepler answered March 1, 1995.

Col. Hepler called for questions of the committee and Sen. Oleen asked if there could be forces from Europe or around the United States moved to Fort Riley through the realignment process and Col. Hepler said that was a possibility. Sen. Vidricksen asked if funds and projects currently underway at Fort Riley would be considered for the 1995 ranking. Col. Hepler answered that anything which has been authorized through 1996 would indeed be considered in the rankings.

Sen. Gooch asked if the airport at Fort Riley was utilized and Col. Hepler explained that it was used for helicopter use only and the base instead used the Manhattan Airport or Forbes Field in Topeka for large deployment strategies.

Sen. Oleen addressed the reduction of United States troops to a force power of 490,000 by 1996. Col. Hepler stated that the reduction is not under the jurisdiction of the BRAC and that reduction has been decided by the Army Chief of Staff, General Sullivan.

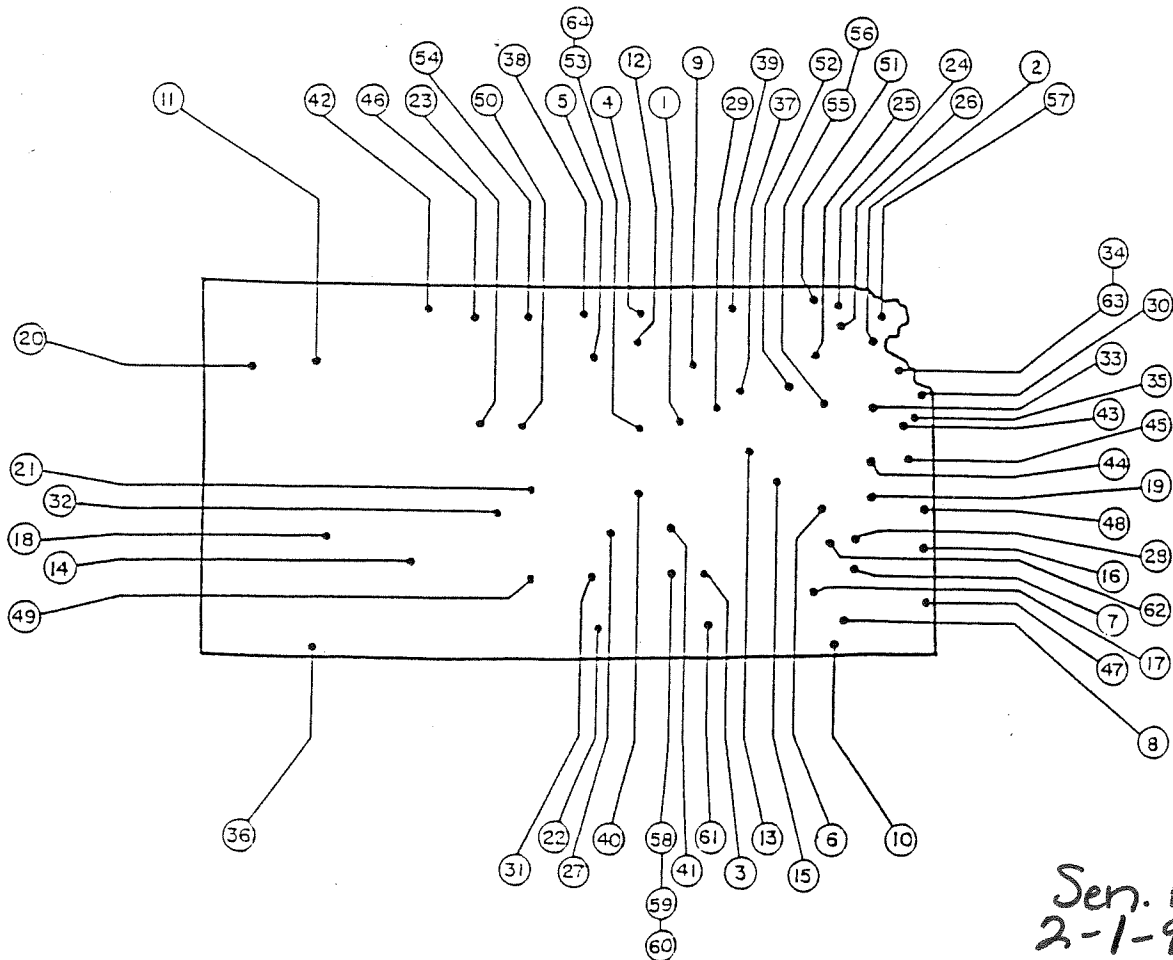

Dear Senator Oleen:

I have been advised that your Committee will meet this coming Monday morning concerning the Racing Commission's proposed legislative amendments but will be unable to attend. However, I understand that the Chair of the Commission, Oscar ("Liz") Peltzer will be in attendance, along with our Executive Director, Art Neuhedel, who will make the presentation, and our counsel, Terry Hamblin, as well as as possibly other staff.

It is felt that the amendments are essentially technical or corrective oversight in nature, or like the mandatory fingerprint requirement, necessary in order to comply with federal requirements. The change in the measurement period from one day to one week's average for computing the ratio between live and simulcast races likewise does not effect any fundamental change of policy or philosophy of the Racing Act. All of these proposals have been discussed before representatives of the various segments of the industry at Commission meetings over the past several months, and would appear to have no real opposition. The change from a daily to a weekly measure for maintaining the ratio between live and simulcast races appears to have good support, as it allows more flexibility for having more races on, for example, the weekends, when handle and attendance may be higher, yet it preserves a safeguard against any deliberate abuse.

As was done at the meeting between Commission representatives and you and Chair Boston last week, I would comment separately on the proposal to extend the term of Commissioners from 3 to 4 years. As noted, our law basically prohibits Commissioners from having involvement in the industry, with the result that there is usually between one and two years of "learning curve", for this complex industry facing new Commissioners. Given the need for stability in this fragile, threatened industry (which affects economically much more than just the racing portion), it is felt that a longer term would aid in the necessary stability and understanding, and such would appear well supported in comparison with other states.

## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. \_\_\_\_\_

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION providing for the convening of a conference of the states; appointment of delegates; development of an action plan to restore checks and balances between states and the national government; organization of the conference of the states.

WHEREAS, The constitution of the United States established a balanced compound system of governance and through the tenth amendment reserved all nondelegated and nonprohibited powers to the states or to the people; and

WHEREAS, Over many years, the federal government has dramatically expanded the scope of its power and preempted state government authority and increasingly has treated states as other than co-equal partners; and

WHEREAS, The federal government continues to mandate programs that state and local governments must pay for and administer; and

WHEREAS, The conference of the states will communicate broad bipartisan public concern on the extent to which the American political system has been distorted and provide a formal forum for state governments to collectively propose constructive remedies for a more balanced state-federal governance partnership for the 21st century: Now, therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Kansas, the House of Representatives concurring therein: That the following be adopted:

(1) A delegation of five voting persons from the state of Kansas shall be appointed to represent the state of Kansas at a conference of the states for the purposes described in paragraph (2) to be convened as provided in paragraph (3). The delegation shall consist of five voting persons as follows:

(a) The governor or, if the governor does not wish to be a

member of the delegation, then a constitutional officer selected by the governor; and

(b) four legislators, two from each house selected by the presiding officer of that house. No more than two of the four legislators may be from the same political party. Each presiding officer may designate two alternate legislator delegates, one from each party, who have voting privileges in the absence of the primary delegates.

(2) The delegates of the conference of the states will propose, debate and vote on elements of an action plan to restore checks and balances between states and the national government. Measures agreed upon will be formalized in an instrument called a states' petition and returned to the delegation's state for consideration by the entire legislature.

(3) The conference of the states shall be convened under the section 501(c)(3) auspices of the council of state governments in cooperation with the national governors' association and the national conference of state legislatures no later than 270 days after at least 26 state legislatures adopt this resolution without amendment.

(4) Prior to the official convening of the conference of the states the steering committee will draft:

(a) The governance structure and procedural rules for the conference;

(b) the process for receiving rebalancing proposals; and

(c) the financial and administrative functions of the conference, including the council of state governments as fiscal agent.

(5) The bylaws shall:

(a) Conform to the provisions of this resolution;

(b) specify that each state delegation shall have one vote at the conference; and

(c) specify that the conference agenda be limited to fundamental, structural, long-term reforms.

(6) Upon the official convening of the conference of the states, the state delegations will vote upon and approve the conference governing structure, operating rules and bylaws.

Be it further resolved: That the Secretary of State be directed to send copies of this resolution to the council of state governments, the national governors' association and the national conference of state legislatures.

## Governor's Task Force In Support Of Fort Riley

### Meeting Minutes

Tuesday, August 23, 1994

9:00 a.m.

Leaders Club - Fort Riley, Kansas

The Task Force meeting was called to order by Mr. Bob Knight, Vice-Chair at 9:15 a.m..

Vice-Chair Knight announced that Governor Finney approved a Kansas Economic Initiatives and Opportunity Grant of \$203,500 to support the efforts of the Task Force. The grant will be used to pay DPRA for the Economic Impact Analysis and retaining the Washington based support services of Mr. George Schlossberg and Mr. Barry Steinberg. He encouraged everyone on the Task Force to let Governor Joan Finney know of our appreciation of her support to the Task Force.

Vice-Chair Knight introduced Merrill Werts, Civilian Aide to the Secretary of the Army and Vice-Chair of the Task Force.

Vice-chair Werts described the role of the Washington consultants and outlined the selection process. Vice-chair Knight then introduced Dr. Charles Warren.

Dr. Charles Warren outlined the importances of the DPRA work. He pointed out that the analysis is still a working draft and is released only to the Task Force members. Dr. Warren emphasized this information demonstrates the need for very aggressive economic development effort for this region. He then introduced Mr. Don Wissman of DPRA.

Mr. Don Wissman gave a slide presentation of his study. He highlighted the direct and indirect economic impact of a base closure in the local areas as well as the State.

Vice-chair Werts facilitated a general discussion allowing the Task Force members to ask questions and make suggestions for further refinement of the analysis.

Vice-chair Werts introduced Dr. Casey Thomas.

Dr. Thomas briefed the Task Force on the activities of the Communication/Liaison Committee. He requested Task Force concurrence on a proposed Fort Riley information paper the committee would send to a list of influential public and private sector leaders throughout the state. The Task Force provided a series of suggestions for strengthening the paper and gave their concurrence.

Dr. Thomas with the assistance of Pat Henry briefed the Task Force on the committee's plan to create a brochure outlining the many positive facts about Fort Riley. This brochure could be accompanied by a short video tape and together be presented to TV outlets and the BRAC staff and Commissioners.

The Task Force then met in committee structure. At the conclusion of the Committee time the Task Force reconvened for committee reports.

Communications/Liaison Committee:

- Continue to work a fact sheet concerning Fort Riley and the BRAC process. When finalized send with a cover letter to addressees for their use in communicating with their people.
- They will continue to work on the brochure and video tape in concert with our Washington consultants.
- Vice-chair Knight suggested a "Dear Colleague" letter be prepared for our elected state officials emphasizing the fact that this is a state wide issue.
- Senator Oleen concurred and suggested a presentation to the state's Economic Planning Committee that meets in November.
- Representative Hochouser suggested using TV and Radio talk shows as a means of increasing grass roots education.

Research Committee:

- Continue refinement of the Economic Impact study looking at the loss of corporate income taxes as it effects the state.
- Will introduce information from the Kansas River Basin study as it becomes available
- Will start working with the Office of Economic Adjustment for further planning and research funding.

BRAC Committee:

- Pleased with the structure now in place. Will continue to work with the consultant team to prepare for possible BRAC presentations.
- Keep their work focused on the evaluation criteria.

Congressional Liaison Committee:

- Emphasized the importance of close and continual coordination with Kansas congressional delegation.
- Will continue to encourage senior uniformed and civilian officials to visit Fort Riley.
- Are developing a 30-60 day work plan.

The Executive Director announced the next Task Force meeting will be scheduled during the week of 14 November 1994.

The Task Force was called to order by Mr. Bob Knight, Vice-Chair at 9:15 a.m..

Mr. Knight introduced the Task Force's two new members, Mr. Bill Stolzer of Commerce Bank in Manhattan and Mr. Dick Theisen, with First Kansas Group. Mr. Knight recognized Governor Joan Finney's support and stressed the transition from Governor Finney to Governor elect Bill Graves will not lessen the support the Task Force receives.

Mr. Knight introduced Mr. Merrill Werts, Civilian Aide to the Secretary of the Army and Vice-Chair of the Task Force.

Mr. Werts introduced Dr. Casey Thomas, Chairperson of Kansans For a Strong Fort Riley, who along with his board presented the Task Force with a check in the amount of \$5,000.00 to underwrite the production of the Fort Riley brochure.

Mr. Werts updated the Task Force on the Association of the United States Army (AUSA) Annual Meeting and the briefing they had with the Task Force's Washington consultants.

Fred Hepler, Executive Director of the Task Force, introduced the guest speaker Ms. Wendi Steele, who was on the professional staff of the BRAC Commission in 1991 and the Defense Legislative Assistant for Senator Nichols from Oklahoma in the 1993 BRAC.

Wendi Steele spoke to the Task Force about unwritten guidelines of the BRAC process and what to expect as hearings unfold. She discussed the criteria that guides the BRAC Commission's work and emphasized the importance of the military value of a base. She discussed some examples of what we, as a community, could expect in the next round of base closures. Ms. Steele closed her presentation by answering questions from the Task Force membership.

Fred Hepler updated the Task Force on the visits from The Secretary of the Army, The Under Secretary of the Army, The Assistant Secretary of the Army for Installations and the anticipated visit of the Secretary of Defense. Hepler also reported that Senator Dole is going to invite the Chairman of the 1995 BRAC Commission, Alan Dixon, to visit Fort Riley.

The Task Force broke into their committee structures. At the conclusion of the Committee time the Task Force reconvened for committee reports.

Communications/Liaison Committee:

- Briefed on the production of the Fort Riley video and brochure
- Outlined the "mail out" to 100 (+) professional associations in Kansas

Research and Analysis Committee:

- Described some preliminary work they are doing with the Office of Economic Assistance and the process involved in military reuse

BRAC Management and Review Committee:

- Continue to monitor the BRAC Commission nomination process and will develop approaches to best influence the Commission once it is formed.

Congressional and Liaison Committee:

- They emphasized the work our Washington consultants are doing, in support of the Task Force

Mr. Werts recognized Mr. Knight who stated this will be his last Task Force meeting. Mr. Knight will be returning to Wichita and thanked the Task Force and Governor Joan Finney for allowing him the opportunity to serve.

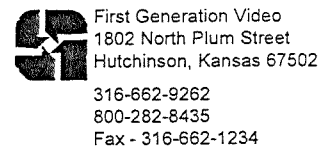
