The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Kent Glasscock at 9:00 a.m. on January 23, 1997 in Room 521-S of the Capitol.

Representative Ruby Gilbert moved and Representative Bonnie Sharp seconded a motion to approve the Minutes for January 16, 1997 and January 21, 1997. Motion passed.

Representative Robert Tomlinson announced that the Subcommittee on Ethics would meet Friday at 10:30 a.m. or upon adjournment of the House.

Chairperson Glasscock recognized Representative Lisa Benlon who moved to introduce the Riley County bill and Representative Gwen Welshimer seconded. Motion passed.

Representative Tomlinson introduced a bill to make amendments to the current ethics statutes at K.S.A. 46-236 and 46-237 which would make clear that it is illegal for a state officer or employee to solicit or receive anything of value for any official act or failure to act. Seconded by Rep. Jim Long. Motion passed.

Chairperson Glasscock informed the Committee that Dennis Hodgins will be getting each member a revised copy of deadlines. He also asked the Subcommittee Chairpersons to report to the full Committee by February 12, 1997.

The Chairperson asked Theresa Kiernan, Revisor, to explain **HB 2020** which is a follow-up to **SB 541**. Chairperson Glasscock opened the public hearing for **HB 2020**.

HB 2020 - An Act concerning townships; relating to the governing bodies thereof; amending K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 80-304 and repealing the existing section.

Chairperson Glasscock recognized Mr. Duane Sanders who was a proponent of **HB 2020**. He said that this bill would alleviate the problem for some honest civic-minded public servants. He referred to a 1917 statute that limits the yearly income to \$1,000.00. He pointed out that in 1917 that was three times the going day wage, but he feels it is not a decent monthly wage by today's standards. (Attachment 1.)

Representative Ray Cox asked Mr. Sanders for clarification about the cap, and Mr. Sanders explained that last year the legislation took off the cap. This bill would allow even the people who were paid in excess of the cap in previous years to keep the money earned.

Representative Tanner commented that he would have a problem with the bill if it applied to past wages to be renegotiated.

Representative Bob Tomlinson asked about how much money was involved, and the answer was, "How long is a rope?" Mr. Sanders said that townships vary so much that it is impossible to compare their budgets.

The Chairperson next recognized Ms. Charlene Cahail, former employee of the Riverside Township Board, who spoke in favor of **HB 2020**. Ms. Cahail explained her duties in her job and said that she feels she has earned all the money that she has received. (Attachment 2.)

Representative David Huff asked Ms. Cahail if her office was elective and she replied that it was. He asked her if she was paid \$1,000 a year, and she said that she was paid a salary which was \$14,000 in 1995.

Chairperson Glasscock recognized Ms. Willie Martin, Director of the Sedgwick County Intergovernmental Relations, who spoke as a proponent. She did not have written testimony, but explained in more detail the problems that have been created. Representative Larry Campbell said that he lived in a county that does not have townships, and he wondered why townships were necessary. Ms. Martin explained that townships are historical, and they keep closer representation at the local level.

Chairperson Glasscock introduced Ms. Joanie Storck, spokesperson and Trustee for the Salem Township Taxpayers' Group, who was basically an opponent of **HB 2020**. She explained if this bill is passed in its present form, it will stop townships from maintaining a check and balance type of government. She left one information packet which includes a copy of a letter from the Attorney General to Representative Ted Powers. She pointed out that in all of the opinions given by the Attorney General, there was a definite separation between compensation and salaries. She hoped the Committee would acknowledge this in **HB 2020**. (Attachment 3.)

Representative Gwen Welshimer asked Ms. Storck if she was an officer, and she replied that she was a trustee earning \$8.00 an hour and working about 1.5 hours per day. Representative Campbell asked her if there was compensation taken by the board, and she replied that it was not compensation, but a monthly salary of \$540.00. She added that the board members also paid themselves \$100 bonuses at Christmas and when this practice was questioned, they instead paid themselves \$100.00 for an organizational meeting.

Representative Deena Horst said that she was not familiar with townships, but asked how they received their money and if the purpose was for keeping the roads in repair. She was told that in the budget there are several funds.

Representative Cox asked Ms. Storck if she had an amendment written, and she replied that she did not. Representative Ted Powers then gave the Committee a brief history as to why and how the bill was passed in 1996.

Representative Gerry Ray wanted to know when this practice began and if the County would have to investigate all townships. Representative Benlon suggested that in Line 36 if the words "for compensation" were added, it could possibly protect those who actually did work for pay.

Chairperson Glasscock recognized Mr. Duane Sanders who had some additional comments. He said that he has served on his Township Board for over 20 years and is on duty 24 hours a day. He wanted to know how one could put a dollar value on that? He suggested that if the citizens do not like their board members, then they should vote them out of office.

There being no additional testimony, the Chairperson closed the public hearing on **HB 2020**.

Chairperson Glasscock called the Committee's attention to a letter from Mr. Don A. Myer, Executive Director of the Kansas Commission on Veterans' Affairs, in which he has corrected an error made in his testimony on **HB 2021**. (Attachment 4.)

The Chair announced that February 14 is the Drop Dead date for bill introduction.

The meeting adjourned at 10:30 a.m.

The next meeting is scheduled for January 27, 1997.

Chairman and members of the Committee:

To say the least, 1996 was an interesting and challenging year for Kansas Township officials. When we became aware in the later part of '95 that we had a problem we appealed to the legislature and our problem was vigorously addressed and solved, or so we thought.

We took our jobs, for the most part, to serve our neighbors and friends and when we were required to spend too much time away from our chosen vocations we paid ourselves a reasonable wage. Our receipts and expenditures are public information and are published, check by check and receipt by receipt yearly and reviewed and approved by the county commission. Generally, everyone was satisfied until it was discovered the 1917 statute that governed us put a \$1000. Per year cap on wages that we paid ourselves. In 1917 that was three times the going day wage but hardly a decent monthly wage by today's standards.

The Sedgwick County Attorney decided to recoup the wages some of us had been paid but the Sedgwick County Township Association doesn't feel that this is fair nor was the intent of this committee or the legislation which was enacted last year.

House Bill 2020 will alleviate the problem for some good and honest civic minded public servants, as you folks are. I am here representing the Sedgwick County Township Association and asking for your support and consideration for House Bill 2020.

Information from Charlene Pehel

Sedg. Co. Commissioners:

I was first hired by the Riverside Township Board in 1967 to do the bookkeeping, payroll & filing.

Several years later I became a board member, since I had first hand knowledge of the position of Clerk, Treasurer & Trustee, I chose to run for the Clerk's position.

Through the years many things have changed, the Township phone was put in my home, since I was the one available for the calls, later caller I.D. & call forwarding were installed on the phone, to better serve the residents, especially after we acquired the hall.

The township office was in my home for many years, I have always mainly worked from my home, the townships mailing address has been my home, the township checks are listed with my address as the address for the township, mainly so all calls would come to me & any mailings, since I was the primary person receiving calls & doing all office work. All general business of the township usually comes through me, whether it is complaints on the roads, discussion with insurance agents, Kpers questions, all computer work (I also have a computer in my home, that I use for the Township, same computer & same programs).

I have used my private vehicle in service for the Township, checking on roads, going to the bank, P. O., errands to purchase supplies for the hall & shop, many trips to the hall to check on the condition after each meeting or when there were problems with plumbing, heating, etc. In 1995 I put approx. 1,500 mi. on my personal car, no charge...

I attended bi-weekly meetings for Riverside Township in 1995, since this was the best way to handle business in a timely manner. List is attached.

I also have attended several meetings with different government agencies in th last year.

Sedg. Co. Courthouse for budget preparation.

Township meeting in the Juror room with the Commissioners & State Representatives. Meeting called by the Sedg. Co. Comm. with the Co. Counselor, State Representatives & Township officials.

Township meeting at the Sedg. County Clerk's office.

Sedg. Co. Commissioners meeting room with Comm. Schroeder to plan inter-governmental group between Riverside Township, Oaklawn Improvement Dist. & the Sedg. Co. Public Works Dept.

Another account of what I do for the Township is the report filed in the Clerks Office for the township, which I prepare which you have checked & have in your possession.

Duties of Charlene Cahail, Clerk & employee in 1995.

24 hrs. a day answering service for the Township, office phone in my home, when I am at the office I transfer the phone to the office, if I have stepped out of the office or my home the phone is on the answering machine, also we have caller I.D. for residents who call & do not leave a message, I return those calls.

My duties are that of a full time Office Mgr.:

Bookkeeping	Relaying any problems on the roads, etc.
Payroll	All correspondence for the township
Minutes	Mail incoming & outgoing
Agenda	Gasoline exemption forms-refunds
Kpers agent-	E.O.Y. reports for Treas. & Trustee
Publication of reports	All computer work
Filing	Numerous reports as required.

I attend numerous meetings for the township, including meetings with the Sedg. Co. Officials & intergovernmental meetings as required or requested.

I also check out problems on the roads in the township, which I feel are very important for all board members to be aware of in our positions.

I rent the Riverside Township Hall & make contracts with the residents for use of our building, after contract is signed I then give out a key. (This is any day, including Holidays).

I have worked for Riverside Township since 1967 and feel we have a good repore with the residents, due to the fact we are available at any time.

I drive my own vehicle for all meetings & supplies, etc. I don't charge mileage.

January 23, 1997

My name is Joanie Storck. I started out being the spokesperson for a group of taxpayers in Salem Township, and I am now the duely elected trustee of the same township. I became involved when I read a flyer that was distributed through our neighborhood in July 1994, requesting interested taxpayers to attend the August 1994, budget hearing at our township. The flyer informed us that our current and past township board members were taking monthly salaries out of our Road Funds. Being an "at home" wife and mother, who's children were already raised, I felt I had the time to give, to my local government, and neighbors. I gathered documentation, and made phone calls to our county and state offices, attempting to solicit help in our dilemma. Every office I talked with told me pretty much the same thing, "The statutes are too vague, or grey, If you don't like what they are doing, Vote them out!" I attended the August budget hearing, and read the statutes to the board members that dictated the amount of compensation they were allowed, and told them that if they continued their current practices, that we, the township taxpayers would seek prosecution! It was one year later, in July 1995, after attending the "AUDIT" conducted by the Co. Clerks office, that I was able to get Co. Comm. Hancock to ask for an opinion from the District Attorney, concerning 80-304. That request for an opinion, generated Attorney General Opinion 95-113. Immediatly after that opinion stopped the payments to the working boards, you see that we, (see enclosed letter, dated Jan 20, '96) the taxpayers group, tried to get grace, for those boards that were recieving legitimate compensation. You can also see by the response 9 days later that no one else had asked for an opinion!

I am here representing thousands of taxpayers of Salem township. In your packet, you will see a petition, that was circulated in the township regarding the County retrieving the monies, and as you can see, 98.9% believe this should happen.

If you pass this bill in its present form, you will have stopped us from maintaining a check and balance type of government. These people blatantly broke the law, and shattered the confidence of the voters. The enclosed expenditure sheets from the Co. Clerks office, are evidence, of just two years of the seven years, that these boardmembers (four people) raped our road funds, of over \$100,000.00. The Township had two full time, and, one or two part-time workers, preforming the maintenance duties of our township, which only left the "statutory" duties to each of the officers.

The enclosed information packet includes copies of letters from the Attorney General. One is a letter to our State Rep. Ted Powers, in which she notes; "The statute appears to give the board of county commissioners discretion in making such examination and working with the auditing board to determine if the errors can be corrected. Therefore, in answer to your first question, the township auditing boards could be required to refund the townships for any excess compensation paid if the board of county commissioners determines that overpayments


existed and that there is no way to correct the overpayments." So she is saying that it is **not** mandatory for the county commission to collect, or **even to examine!**

We the Salem Township Taxpayers, ask that before you make this blanket decision to validate **all** overspending, that you consider the ramifications of ignoring the thousands of voters in Salem Township. Our former boards purposefully ignored the laws of this state, and in doing so, have jeopardized the entire township system of government. We request that you seek the Attorney General's assistance in the wording of this ammendment, as to assure that the townships that have been raped of funds by board members that appear to have been holding the offices, for monetary gain, could have the right to retrieve it.

In all of the opinions given by the Attorney General, concerning this issue, there a definite separation between **compensation** and **salaries**. We ask that you please acknowledge the same, in the ammendment before you.

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S STATEMENT OF POLICY RELATING TO THE FURNISHING OF WRITTEN OPINIONS

The Attorney General of the State of Kansas has established the following statement of policy relating to the issuance of written opinions.

1. The Attorney General is required by K.S.A. 75-704 to furnish written opinions to the Legislature, or either branch thereof, or to the Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, State Board of Education or Commissioner of Insurance.
2. All other opinions are issued at the discretion of the Attorney General taking into consideration the significance of the issue to the state, the resources required to address the issue, availability of such resources and other determinative factors .
3. Opinions may be issued to individual members or committees of the Legislature, state officers and agencies. Only questions of government or statewide interest as determined by the Attorney General will be addressed. The Attorney General cannot act as legal counsel to individual constituents of public officials.
4. A request for the opinion by a state agency must be signed or endorsed by the chief executive officer or chief legal counsel of such agency.
5. The Attorney General may furnish written opinions to all County and District Attorneys in order to properly consult with and advise such attorneys. This does not extend to assistant or deputy county or district attorneys.
6. The Attorney General may furnish written opinions to the governing bodies of local governmental subdivisions, municipalities or agencies. A request for an opinion by a local unit of government must be submitted by the governing body or chief legal counsel thereof. Such requests may not be submitted by individual members of such governing body.
7. The Attorney General may furnish written opinions to elected county officers if the request for opinion has first been submitted to the county attorney or county counselor. Information and advice received from the county attorney or county counselor must be included with the request.

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8. All requests must contain a complete statement of the problem, together with a clear, concise question of law. All facts and questions must be stated in the correspondence. Only questions of law will be answered.
9. Where opinions are requested on behalf of agencies, officers or governmental units which have legal counsel available, the legal research and conclusions of such counsel shall be included with the opinion request. Interested parties may submit legal briefs regarding opinion requests.
10. The Attorney General will not furnish opinions on issues threatened, pending or scheduled for determination by the courts, including appeals from orders issued by quasi-judicial bodies.
11. Exceptions to the foregoing may be granted by the Attorney General where necessary and appropriate.
12. All opinions shall be written in accordance with K.S.A. 75-704a.
13. Opinions of the Attorney General are only valid and in force from and after approval and signature by the Attorney General.

Re: Townships and Township Officers--Township
Officers--Salaries; Reimbursement for Expenses

Synopsis: Township board members may be compensated only for
the positions which they are statutorily authorized
to hold and only in the amount specified by
statute. A monthly "salary" may not be paid in
lieu of the specified amounts. Cited herein:
K.S.A. 68-101; 68-132; 68-523; 68-525; 68-530, as
amended by L. 1995, ch. 232, § 3; 80-207; 80-302;

Dear Ms. Foulston and Mr. Fairchild:

You each have requested this office to issue an opinion

Other than K.S.A. 80-2510 which requires an itemization of expenses as part of the public record for hospital boards, we can find no statutory provision which dictates the type of documentation that must be presented in order for township board members to receive their compensation. However, because most of the authorized compensation is in the form of a "per diem," it logically follows that township board members must provide some form of time log to indicate the hours spent with respect to each office held. We note that most of the above listed statutes require that time spent on township business be "actual" and "necessary."

In conclusion, township board members may be compensated only for the positions that they are statutorily authorized to hold and only in the amount specified by statute. A monthly "salary" may not be paid in lieu of the statutorily specified amounts.

RE: Result of A.G. opinion 95-113, on Sedgwick County Townships

This letter is in reference to townships in Sedg. Co., and the effect of your opinion. The taxpayers of Salem township have repeatedly requested a ruling on THEIR townships boards practice of paying salaries, and the possible reimbursement to our road funds. Ref. letters from Sen. Mike Harris and Rep. Ted Powers, to your office dated January 10, 1996.

WHAT CREATED THE NEED FOR A RULING:

- Salem township taxpayers were enlightened to the mis-spending of our tax dollars by the November 1993 termination of our 9 year grader operator employee. His attempts to stop their mis-spending started in January 1993, after the board refused to pay him for weather related overtime because, "they did not have enough money."
- After reading the statutes carefully, we proceeded through the chain of command of County and State offices, seeking answers on how they were governed and who enforced the statutes. We recieved the same basic answer from all requests "The statutes are too vague (or grey)." "If you don't like what they are doing - Vote them out!" Deputy County Clerk Brent Shelton said, "Good Luck, this has been tried before, by Minneha township!"

EFFECTS OF YOUR 95-113 opinion on Sedgwick County townships:

- See enclosed copy of letter from District Attorney's office, dated Dec. 11, 1995.
- A special meeting was called by the Sedgwick County Board of County Commissioners on January 4, 1996, with the Township Boards, Co. Counselor Steven Plummer, First Deputy Assistant Attorney Douglas Roth, and the Sedgwick County delegates, that, resulting in Doug Roth directing ALL townships to "discontinue paying themselves wages in excess of the statutes."
- In many of the townships in Sedg. Co., the elected board members have been following the examples of the previous boards: believing they were in compliance to the laws, working as grader operators, full time clerks, etc. It is hard to imagine how long this has been going on, but we DO NOT believe that it was intentional mis-conduct on their parts. (as we do not believe the County Commisssoneers overlooking 80-304 was intentional) We DO believe the County Commission and the District Attorney's office have reacted wrongfully to your opinion 95-113, by terminating pay to WORKING township board members, thus effecting the safety of the citizens of Sedg. County. A small number of these townships do not have the tax dollars to pay a professional grader operator at \$20.00 plus, an hour, to clear their roads of snow when needed, as we have experienced this past week.

Your opinion 95-113, on page 3, the last two paragraphs, and page 4, the first two paragraphs, indicate "These provisions do not specifically authorize nor prohibit township board members holding these positions. Thus,....." Attorney General opinion 81-288 page 3 says, "You further inquire whether it is permissible for you to recieve compensation as a road maintenance employee of the district. In our opinion, such an arrangement is permissible....."

These two opinions alone, recognize there are provisions for compensation, for time actually and necessarily spent, and we realize each township would be different, however, we in Salem township are talking about salaries!

It is our belief that since two of the County Commissioners have stated their desire to consolidate the townships, and "do away with the un-educated, small government elected officials," that this is their attempt to create the illusion, that townships are not effective governments.

We insist, that our two years of requesting a ruling concerning the Salem township boards taking of SALARIES, have been blatantly ignored, and turned into a gross mis-justice to the honest township boards of Sedgwick County. We ask that the ruling by the District Attorney, that stopped wages to the working township boards of our county, be revised, pending clarification of the allowed compensation to each of these boards. The Salem Township Taxpayers committee, has been told that if we continue to seek prosecution of our boards, we will cause all townships boards in Sedgwick county to be audited, and accordingly prosecuted, for any compensation in excess of the statutes.

WOULD YOU PLEASE RESPOND TO THESE QUESTIONS:

Is there a legal difference between SALARIES and COMPENSATION?

Would the District Attorney be required to seek prosecution on a township board without a constituent complaint?

We the taxpayers still believe that non-employed, elected township boards, that have been paying themselves salaries, should be responsible, by law, to reimburse their townships. Thank you for taking time to read this, and respond.

Dear Ms Storck:

Attorney General Carla J. Stovall has requested that I respond to your letter dated January 20, 1996 regarding payment to township officials in light of Attorney General Opinion No. 95-113.

In your letter you ask that the ruling by the district attorney which stopped wages to township boards be revised pending clarification of the allowed compensation to the boards. **At this time the Office of the Attorney General does not have an opinion request seeking any clarification.** Enclosed please find a copy of the Attorney General's Statement of Policy Relating to the Furnishing of Written Opinions. It appears to me that the December 11, 1996 letter from the Sedgwick County District Attorney's office is consistent with Attorney General Opinion No. 95-113.

You also ask whether there is a legal difference between "salaries" and "compensation." As Attorney General Opinion No. 95-113 indicates, the term "compensation" is distinct from the term "salary." The term "salary" is not used in any of the township compensation or payment statutes. Please review that opinion.

In addition you ask whether the district attorney is required to seek prosecution on a township board without a constituent complaint. The decision whether to prosecute any criminal violation is within the discretion of a district or county attorney's office and is not dependent upon a citizen or constituent complaint.

Re: Township officers--compensation

Dear Representative Powers:

You ask my opinion on several questions concerning the letter sent by the Sedgwick County legal department to various township officials in Sedgwick County requesting a meeting with them concerning excess compensation they may have received. Specifically you ask, "[S]hould the townships boards that paid themselves monthly salaries, be required to refund the townships for the salaries they paid themselves in excess of the amount specified by law?" You also ask what statute of limitations would apply to an action by the county to recover the excess payments.

In response to your first question, K.S.A. 80-304 sets out the procedure for collecting monies paid by a township for any purpose in excess of what the law authorizes. The statute provides for an annual report by the township trustee to the county commissioners which includes "the items of account audited and allowed, the nature of each account, and the name of each person to whom such an account was allowed." It further provides:

"If such report and accounts are found not correct, or not in conformity to law, the board shall cite such township auditing board to appear before it and correct any errors appearing therein. Such township auditing board, and their bondsmen shall be liable to their township for the amount of any and all accounts or demands by them allowed or paid in excess of that authorized by law for any purpose. It shall be the duty of the county attorney of such county to prosecute any and all suits in the name of such township for the recovery of the same, in any court of competent jurisdiction."

Although the statute states that it is the duty of the county attorney to collect any overpayments, “[u]pon appointment of a county counselor, all duties in civil matters otherwise required by law of the county attorney pass to the county counselor.” Attorney General Opinion No. 80-121. *See also* K.S.A. 19-247. The township auditing board consists of the township trustee, township clerk and township treasurer. K.S.A. 80-302. K.S.A. 80-304 imposes a duty on the county attorney (or county counselor) to prosecute any suits for recovery of overpayments if the board of county commissioners finds from its examination of the township auditing board that overpayments exist and further, that the overpayments cannot somehow be corrected. The statute appears to give the board of county commissioners discretion in making such examination and working with the township auditing board to determine if the errors can be corrected. Therefore, in answer to your first question, the township auditing boards could be required to refund the townships for any excess compensation paid if the board of county commissioners determines that overpayments existed and that there is no way to correct the overpayments.

In response to your second question concerning the applicable statute of limitations, K.S.A. 60-512 states in part:

“The following actions shall be brought within three (3) years: . . . (2) *An action upon a liability created by a statute* other than a penalty or forfeiture.” (Emphasis added.)

I could find no Kansas cases that address this precise issue, although the Kansas Supreme Court has found that an action against a county treasurer to recover misappropriated funds is governed by the three-year statute of limitations set out in K.S.A. 60-512 (2). *State, ex rel., v. Masterson*, 221 Kan. 540 (1977); *State, ex rel., v. McKay*, 140 Kan. 276 (1934). In both of those cases the Court found that the action against the treasurer and the treasurer’s surety was one arising from a liability created by K.S.A. 19-513 which required the treasurer to deliver to his successor all moneys he held upon the termination of his office.

It is unclear whether a Court would find that the various statutes which set the compensation for township officials are statutes which create a liability against the township auditing board if excess compensation was paid to township officials. Those statutes which were in effect until May 2, 1996, are set out in Attorney General Opinion No. 95-113 which you refer to in your letter. Pursuant to amendments which were effective May 2, 1996, compensation to township officials is now determined by the township board and fixed by resolution of the board. K.S.A. 80-207, as amended by L. 1996, ch. 184, § 5. The issue of which statute of limitations applies to a given situation is often difficult to determine and frequently litigated. Since I could find no cases determining which statute of limitations applies to actions for overpayment of township officials, I am unable to provide a definitive opinion as to whether the three-year limitation of K.S.A. 60-512 would apply in this case.

This morning I testified before your committee in support of House Bill 2021, an act concerning the Kansas Commission on Veteran Affairs (KCVA). As I stood for questions, I answered a question incorrectly. Rep. Ray asked if any Veteran Service Representatives (VSRs) currently employed were non veterans. I answered there were not. This is not the case. There are three VSRs currently employed by the KCVA. They are located in our field offices at Colby, Hutchinson, and Kansas City, Kansas.

The VSR positions in these three locations were left vacant for extended periods of time due to the KCVA downsizing of FTEs and to meet budget reductions due to shrinkage rates. Each was an Office Assistant II at their respective location, and had served many years in that capacity. They were promoted in October or November of 1996 after serving as VSR Is in an acting assignment for up to a year. Due to their many years of experience in their offices, I believe they should be "grandfathered" in their present positions.

I apologize for my mistake, and regret any undue confusion or problems with House Bill 2021 it may have caused.
