MINUTES OF THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON FISCAL OVERSIGHT.

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Carl Holmes at 9:08 a.m. on January 21, 1998 in Room 527-S of the Capitol.

Chairperson Carl Holmes introduced Representative Kay O'Connor, who testified as an opponent of the fiscal note on <u>HB 2379</u> before the Fiscal Oversight Committee. Chairperson Holmes reminded the Committee that the hearing dealt with information on the <u>Fiscal Note on HB 2379</u>, and not on policy issues.

Representative O'Connor noted that she was testifying not to argue the merits of the bill, but only the fiscal effect, and said she opposed the fiscal note because it did not reflect that school vouchers would mean a savings to the State of Kansas. She stated that her information indicated there would be a savings.

Representative O'Connor presented to the Committee a document that included only the money portion of the She explained how to understand the fiscal direction of the bill, which includes bill (Attachment 1). information in which the eligibility requirements for vouchers are phased-in.

Representative Jim Morrision asked about the value of the special education vouchers and Ms. O'Connor responded that the voucher values were different for the different student classifications.

Representative O'Connor distributed to the Committee a graph (Attachment 2), with information showing onefourth of parents with children in public schools would send them to another school if given a choice, and three-fourths would send their children to a private or parochial school. The paper was included in a study done by Emporia State University.

A 1995 Private School, Fall-Voucher Survey Participants document (Attachment 3), was distributed to the Fiscal Oversight Committee Members and Representative O'Connor explained the survey.

Chairperson Holmes asked for clarification of who would pay the difference between the cost of tuition and the actual cost of student education. Representative O'Connor responded that payment would be made by donations, scholarships, or a church if it is a parochial school.

Representative O'Connor commented on the success of the voucher system being used in Milwaukee, Wisconsin and in Cleveland, Ohio.

Representative Richard Reinhardt asked how students already in private schools or home schools would be included in the voucher program. Representative O'Connor said that issue was included in the information distributed to the Committe members and she would address it later in her presentation.

Representative O'Connor distributed a paper to the Committee members that included detailed information on reduced and free lunch students written by Andy Tompkins, Commissioner, Kansas State Board of

Education, Nutrition Services Team (Attachment 4).

A document that included special education enrollments in the public and private schools (<u>Attachment 5</u>), was handed to the Committee members. This printout included the same information for special schools including those operated by SRS, penal institutions and contractual agencies.

Representative John Edmonds asked for more information regarding the Rainbows United School in Wichita. Ms. Diane Gjerstad, Wichita Public Schools, explained that Rainbows United was an agency that provided special services for handicapped children, ages zero to five. Representative Edmonds noted that there were several other schools in the document that were similar.

Representative O'Connor distributed to the Committee members a list of *Projected Costs of State Vouchers under House Bill 2861* (Attachment 6), and explained how she had adjusted several of the columns to show her view of what the projected costs should be.

A document titled *Some Statistics* (<u>Attachment 7</u>), was distributed to the Committee. This document included information regarding statistics using Representative O'Connor's numbers, along with estimated cost and savings work sheets and projections for state vouchers.

Chairperson Holmes asked if there would be enough schools (seats)to accommodate those who would change schools. Representative O'Connor responded that schools would be built and temporary buildings would be used until that was accomplished. She said schools that had been closed would be opened again and used by the second year.

Representative Tim Carmody asked for further explanation of the funding for special education versus regular students. It was agreed that the author of the fiscal note should explain the funding.

The were no further questions.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:50 a.m. The next meeting is scheduled for January 22 at 9:00 a.m.






Keeping Children Where They Are








Quality of Public Schools


Would you say that the overall quality of public schools your community is much better, about the same, somewworse, or much worse than it was five years ago?
