MINUTES OF THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON FEDERAL AND STATE AFFAIRS.

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Senator Lana Oleen at 11:00 a.m. on Thursday, February 4, 1999 in Room 254-E of the Capitol.

Chairman Oleen called the committee attention to a report from Jack Hawn providing the information that the committee had requested concerning legislators covered by KPERS. (Attachment 1)

Chairman Oleen continued hearings on **SB 55, SB 101 and SB 174: legislators compensation plan.**

She called on Senator Vidricksen. Senator Vidricksen stated that he introduced **SB 101** as a fairness issue; mileage and constituent allowance has not been changed since 1986. (Attachment 2). Constituent services need to be increased for the interim session and mileage would be increased by \$.02 per mile for legislators with districts over 1000 miles. This would attach to the current pay plan. The total fiscal note of the bill is under \$400,000. Discussion of the bill by the committee followed.

Senator Oleen addressed the committee concerning **SB 174**. : (Attachment 3). A form was put together to be used for vouchering expenses for constituent services up to \$1,000 per month. By claiming these expenses on a voucher system legislators would eliminate paying taxes on these. (Attachment 4) Amending the retirement system is another piece of **SB 174**. This plan would eliminate the annualization of salaries for legislators and end the KPERS system. Legislators would be covered under the deferred compensation plan with the state contributing 8% and with legislators able to contribute up to 17% of their own salary. The bill would allow individual legislators to accept all or part of the options. The bill would have the effective date of the Kansas Register; however the KPERS part of the plan can only end at the end of a term which would be January 2001.

The meeting adjourned at 12:05 p.m. The next meeting of the committee will be at 3:30 p.m. in Room 359-E for the confirmation of Gerald B. Gardner, Adjutant General.

Also, since 1988, 57 legislators who were not vested have withdrawn their contributions. There are currently 38 inactive legislators who are not vested but who have not withdrawn their contributions. We do not have any information prior to 1988.

Re: Cost of Increasing Interim Legislative Allowance

The attachments show separately for the Senate and House the cost of increasing the interim legislative allowance by \$250 per month and for providing legislators whose districts encompass more than 1,000 square miles an additional allowance of \$.02 per square mile. Following is a summary of the total annual cost of such a proposal.

The last change in the legislative allowance occurred in FY 1986, when the rate was increased from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

The present legislative allowance is \$600 per month for a period of nine months. For the Senate, this amounts to \$216,000 per year. Increasing this amount by \$250 per month would cost an additional \$90,000 per year. The following additional allowances also are proposed for consideration. Members having more than 1,000 square miles of territory in their district would qualify for the following additional amounts.

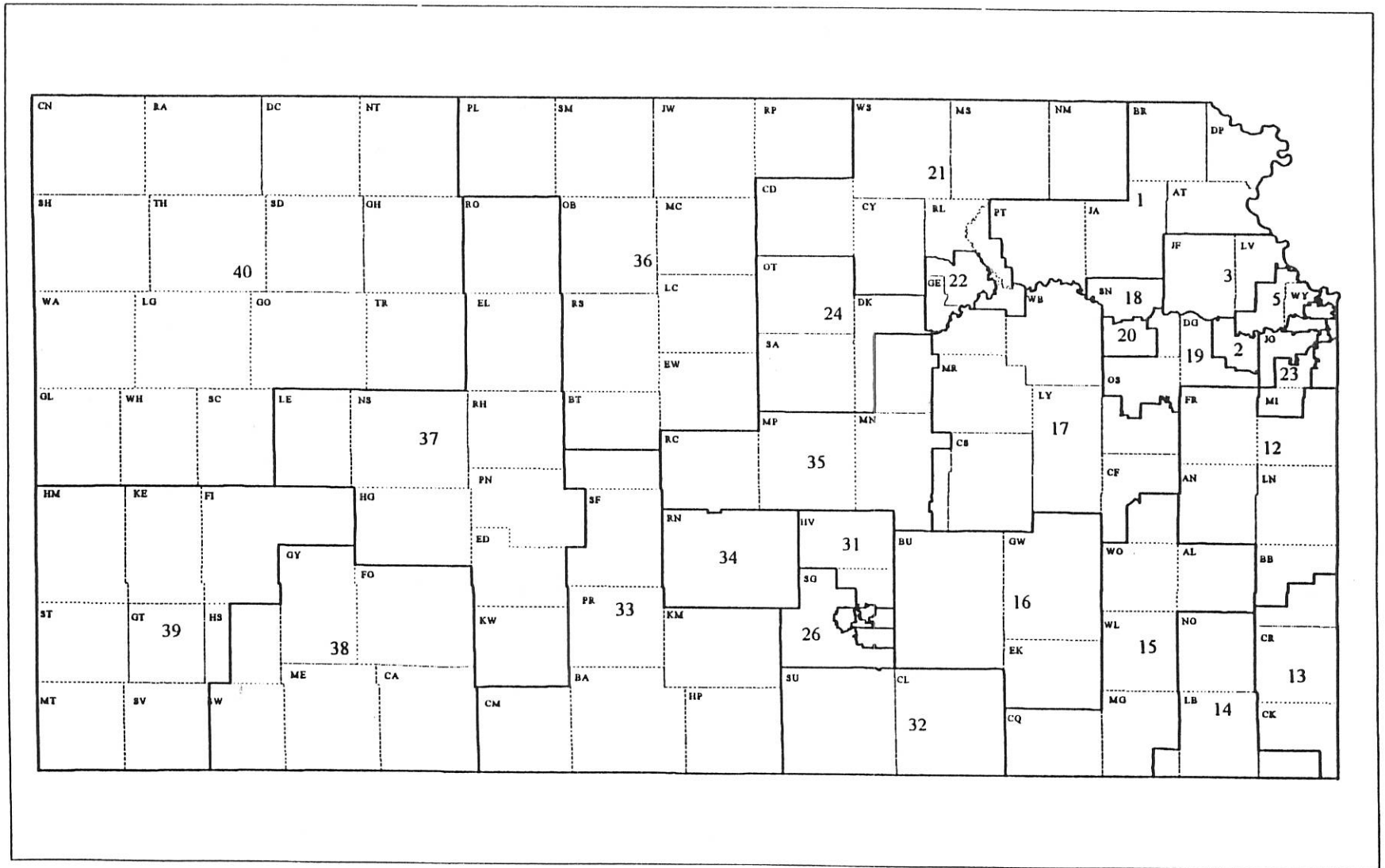

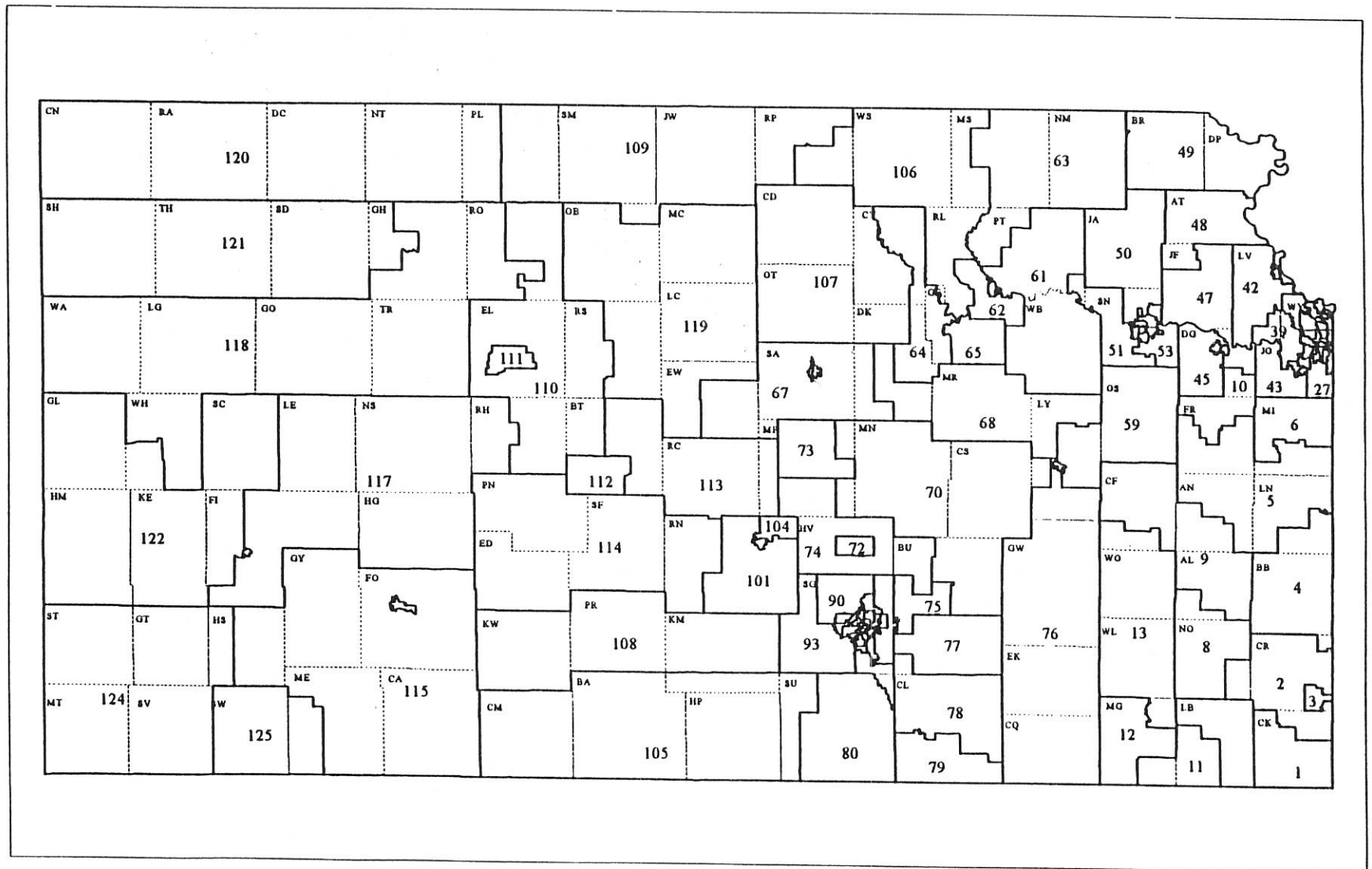

- a) A 1979 law provided for the increases shown in 1981. After the 1981 regular session, the \$40 base was continued; however, the law provided that whenever the rates of compensation of classified employees are increased, the rate of compensation for members of the Legislature for service at any regular or special session will be increased commensurately with the average step increase in the civil service pay plan. A 1985 amendment increased the statutory base rate of compensation from \$40 to \$49; and a 1987 amendment increased the rate to \$54. These amendments merely updated the law to reflect the rates then in effect. A 1992 amendment increased the rate to \$61.50, effective for FY 1993; and a 1995 amendment increased the rate from \$63 to \$65, effective for FY 1996. 1996 House Sub. for S.B. 757, an appropriations bill which did not change the substantive law, provided for an additional amount of per diem compensation of \$1.63, commencing on February 27, 1997, for the balance of the fiscal year -- through June 30, 1997. Similarly, 1997 Senate Sub. for H.B. 2576 provided for an additional amount of per diem compensation of \$3.29 for FY 1998. 1998 S.B. 501 increased the statutory base rate of compensation from \$65 to \$72.06, effective for FY 1999. Nonetheless, the basic policy of making annual adjustments based on average step increases in the civil service pay plan has not been altered.
- b) Effective at the beginning of the fiscal year.
- c) Effective at the beginning of the calendar year.
- d) A 1985 amendment provided that if the subsistence allowance allowable for the Kansas capital city (Topeka) under applicable federal law and regulations to employees of the executive branch of the federal government for per diem expenses is an amount greater than \$50, then the subsistence allowance for legislators for a regular or special session is increased to such amount. A 1987 amendment changed the minimum from \$50 to \$65; a 1992 amendment changed the minimum from \$65 to \$73; and a 1998 amendment changed the statutory minimum from \$73 to \$80.

- e) The federal subsistence allowance for Topeka (see (d) above) has been changed as follows: November 3, 1985, the increase was from \$50 to \$63; effective July 1, 1986, the increase was from \$63 to \$65; effective August 1, 1987, the increase was \$65 to \$66; effective October 9, 1988, the increase was \$66 to \$69; effective March 1, 1992, the increase was \$69 to \$73; effective March 12, 1993, the increase was \$73 to \$74; effective January 1, 1994, the decrease was \$74 to \$73; effective April 1, 1996, the increase was from \$73 to \$79; and effective January 1, 1997, the increase was from \$79 to \$80.
- f) A 1987 law provided for the reduction of compensation from \$54 per day to \$49.50 per day applicable only to the last six months of FY 1987.
- g) In 1985, the rate was 22 cents per mile until April 1 when it became 20.5 cents per mile. In 1988 the rate was 20.5 cents per mile until July 1 when it became 21 cents per mile; it became 22.5 cents per mile on October 1. The mileage rate remained at 22.5 cents per mile until March 1, 1990, when it increased to 24 cents per mile; it was increased to 26 cents per mile on December 1, 1990. On July 1, 1993, the mileage rate was changed to 28 cents per mile; on July 1, 1995, to 29 cents per mile, on July 1, 1996, to 30 cents per mile, and on July 1, 1997, to 31 cents per mile, and on July 1, 1998, to 32 cents per mile.
- h) Subject to change. Rate is linked to the amount allowable under federal law and regulations for federal executive branch employees while serving away from home and in Topeka (see (d) above).
- i) Subject to change by the Secretary of Administration.
- j) Effective October 1, 1994.
- k) 1996 House Sub. for S.B. 757, an appropriations bill which did not change the substantive law, provided for an additional amount of per diem compensation of \$1.63 (2.5 percent of the current per diem rate) commencing on February 27, 1997 through June 30, 1997. Similarly, 1997 Senate Sub. for H.B. 2576, provided for an additional amount of per diem compensation of \$3.29 for FY 1998.
- l) Effective for FY 1999, the legislative allowance is charged to a biweekly amount of \$270. This amount is paid for 20 consecutive two week periods commencing with the first biweekly pay period in April. This represents no change in the sum of the allowance legislators receive. It remains at \$5,400 per year. The change brings these payments within the framework of the main state payroll procedure.
