### **Introduction of Legislation**

### Update on FY 2009 Budget

J. G. Scott, Legislative Research Department, presented a comparison of the FY 2009 budget between the Governor's Budget Recommendations (GBR), actions adopted by the Senate in <u>Sub for SB 23</u> and recommendations of the House Appropriations Committee to <u>Sub for SB 23</u>, including adjustments on revenues, transfers and expenditures (<u>Attachment 1</u>). Mr. Scott also reviewed the GBR for FY 2010.

Responding to a question from the Committee regarding the possibility of a negative ending balance on June 30, 2009, Mr. Scott indicated that the Governor has the authority to make allotments without input from the State Finance Council to have a zero balance in the State General Fund. However, if the Governor chooses to bring the ending balance to \$100 million, it would need the approval of the State Finance Council. The Governor also has the authority to request that the State Finance Council approve issuance of certificates of indebtedness.

Alan Conroy, Legislative Research Department, presented tax information and a summary of the ending balances for the SGF for the period FY 2009 through FY 2011 as recommended in the GBR, Senate's recommendations as adopted in **Sub for SB 23** and House recommendations to **Sub for SB 23** (Attachment 2). Mr. Conroy noted that actual SGF receipts through December 31, 2008, were \$44.6 million below the November Consensus Revenue Estimate (CRE). Preliminary results for January 2009, indicate that tax collections are approximately \$21 million below the estimate, almost all in corporate income tax, with personal income tax and retail sales tax slightly below the CRE. Mr. Conroy noted that the GBR for FY 2010 proposes \$60 million in tax policy changes. Mr. Conroy indicated that legislation has been introduced to incorporate the Governor's tax policy changes.

Jill Wolters, Office of the Revisor of Statutes, provided an explanation of the Governor's Executive Order 09-01 as requested by the Committee (<u>Attachment 3</u>).

Chairman Emler reviewed Senate Subcommittee Instructions for FY 2010 and Senate Subcommittee Reminders (<u>Attachment 4</u>). A document, prepared by Legislative Research Department, on subcommittee fiscal analyst assignments and dates for final committee action was distributed to the Committee (<u>Attachment 5</u>).

The next meeting is scheduled for February 3, 2009.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:50 a.m.

#### **EXECUTIVE ORDER 09-01**

**WHEREAS**, in these unprecedented economic times the State of Kansas must examine all operations to determine if savings can be realized by suspending, merging or streamlining programs; and

**WHEREAS**, agencies were directed in 2003 to conduct a top to bottom review of the way state government does business. To date, these BEST efforts have eliminated \$1 billion in wasteful spending and inefficiencies by selling off hundreds of unneeded state vehicles, consolidating the purchasing power of different levels of government, and collecting millions in delinquent taxes; and

**WHEREAS**, closure of facilities and streamlining of programs have been recommended in the Governor's Budget Report that will affect the Juvenile Justice Authority, KTEC, Kansas, Inc., and the Department of Commerce, saving Kansas taxpayers over \$8 million in Fiscal Year 2010; and

**WHEREAS**, further examination of state owned and operated facilities is necessary to ensure Kansans receive quality services in an efficient manner, and without undue cost to the taxpayer.

**NOW, THEREFORE**, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby create the Facilities Closure and Realignment Commission ("Commission") with the following purposes and charges:

- 1. The Commission shall consist of 11 members appointed as follows: Five members shall be appointed by the Governor; two members shall be appointed by the president of the senate; one member shall be appointed by the minority leader of the senate; two members shall be appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives; and one member shall be appointed by the minority leader of the house of representatives.
- 2. The following Executive branch and state officials shall serve as ex-officio members of the Commission:
  - a. Secretary of Administration;
  - b. Secretary of Social and Rehabilitation Services;
  - c. Secretary of Labor;
  - d. Commissioner of the Juvenile Justice Authority; and
  - e. Commissioner of Education.
- 3. The Governor shall appoint a chairperson, and the Commission shall meet on call of the chairperson or on a request of the majority of the members of the Commission. The affirmative vote of six members of the Commission is required for any action of the Commission.
- 4. The Commission may meet at any time or place in the State of Kansas and may hold such public hearings as the Commission determines necessary to carry out the functions of the Commission.
- 5. The operating expenditures for the Commission shall be paid by the Department of Administration. The Department of Administration shall provide such staff and administrative support and assistance as may be necessary to carry out the functions of the Commission.

- 6. The Commission shall study and evaluate the closure and/or realignment of state facilities, and alternative uses of such facilities, including but not limited to:
  - a. Kansas School for the Deaf;
  - b. Kansas School for the Blind;
  - c. Beloit Juvenile Correctional Facility;
  - d. State Developmental Disability Hospitals; and
  - e. Rainbow Mental Health Facility.
- 7. On or before December 1, 2009, the Commission shall submit to the Governor and the legislature recommendations regarding facilities to be closed and/or realigned, recommended dates for those facilities identified to be closed and/or realigned, and recommendations of policies and procedures to facilitate the closures and/or realignments. Upon review and approval by the Governor, the Commission's recommendations will be submitted to the 2010 legislature as an Executive Reorganization Order.
- 8. In making it's recommendations, the Commission shall consider:
  - a. The savings that will accrue to the state from closure and/or realignment of a facility and the impact any closure would have on funding of services.
  - b. The impact of any closure and/or realignment on clients and their families, the availability of alternative services for clients and their families, and the impact of closure on the quality of services provided to clients.
  - c. The economic impact of closure and/or realignment on the community where the facility is located.
  - d. The feasibility of using a closed facility to house other state services or programs.
  - e. The impact of closure and/or realignment of a facility on employees and the ability of employees to find alternative employment.
  - f. Any other factors that the Commission determines relevant to it's decision.
  - g. The Commission shall work with stakeholders and service providers as the Commission develops it's recommendations.
- 9. Members of the Commission may claim subsistence, allowance, mileage or associated expenses as permitted by law.
- 10. All agencies under the control of the Governor are directed to render full assistance and cooperation to the Commission.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 09-01 and shall become effective immediately.

### Senate Subcommittee Instructions for FY '10

- (1) Keep in mind the agency budgets for FY '09 may be further adjusted by full committee after April's CRE. Subcommittee's recommendations will be for FY '10 only, though they may briefly review actions taken on FY '09.
- (2) Look at other revenue funds in your budgets. Also examine the programs and expenditures. Post Audit's report on low priority programs should be available in mid-February for subcommittees to utilize.
- (3) Remember that new discretionary spending is problematic, as is creating new programs.
- (4) Look for any overspending or opportunities for savings. Closely scrutinize population numbers, clients served, etc. In addition, examine the FTE count for each agency. Consider permanently cutting unfilled positions.
- (5) There will be global issues dealt with by full Committee, including but not limited to: state employee pay plan increase.
- (6) Bottom line–Build a budget within existing resources. The Governor makes \$800 million in adjustments to fill the gap in the FY 2010 recommendations. The adjustments to get to a 7.5 percent ending balance requires \$1.2 billion.

Remember, statutorily ending balance required for FY 2010 should be 7.5 percent of the State General Fund expenditures.
