#### MINUTES OF THE SENATE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Tim Owens at 9:35 a.m. on March 19, 2010, in Room 548-S of the Capitol.

The Chairman requested the Revisor provide the Committee with the various options available regarding <u>SCR</u> <u>1626 - Constitutional amendment to preserve right to choose health care services and health insurance plan</u>.

Mr. Thompson indicted there were three options:

- 1. Leave the bill as is
- 2. Convert the bill to a Senate Resolution
- 3. Convert it to statutory form and treat it as a bill

Senator Pilcher-Cook moved, Senator Bruce seconded, to strike the contents of **HB 2039** and insert the contents of **SCR 1626** rewritten in statutory form. Motion failed. Senators Donovan, Pilcher-Cook, Bruce, Lynn and Schmidt voted yes and requested their votes recorded.

The Chairman called for final action on <u>SB 468 - Amending petition requirements for summoning a grand jury</u>. Jason Thompson, staff revisor, reviewed the bill and distributed a proposed balloon requested by Senator Vratil. (Attachment 1)

Senator Vratil reviewed the proposed changes and distributed a comparison of signatures needed based on various percentages. (Attachment 2)

Senator Vratil moved, Senator Kelly secondoed, to amend **SB 468** as reflected in the balloon amendment. Motion carried.

Senator Vratil moved, Senator Kelly seconded, to recommend SB 468, as amended, favorably for passage.

Senator Pilcher-Cook made a substitute motion, Senator Schodorf seconded, to table the bill. Motion carried.

Senator Schmidt indicated the House did not have an opportunity to hear <u>SB 360 - Removing limitation on number of small claims that may be filed in a calendar year</u> which had passed the full Senate.

Senator Schmidt moved, Senator Bruce seconded, to delete the contents of **HB 2039** and insert the contents of **SB 360** including any technical corrections the revisor may need to make and recommend it favorably for passage. Motion carried.

This is the last scheduled meeting of the session.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:30 a.m.

#### SENATE BILL No. 468

AN ACT concerning grand juries; relating to summoning; amending K.S.A. 22-3001 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 22-3001 is hereby amended to read as follows: 22-3001. (1) (a) A majority of the district judges in any judicial district may order a grand jury to be summoned in any county in the district when it is determined to be in the public interest.

(2) A grand jury shall be summoned in any county within 60 days after a petition praying therefor is presented to the district court, bearing the signatures of a number of electors equal to 100 plus 2% of the total number of votes east for governor in the county in the last preceding election.

(b) The attorney general in any judicial district or the district or county attorney in such attorney's judicial district may petition the chief judge or the chief judge's designee in such district court to order a grand jury to be summoned in the designated county in the district to investigate alleged violations of an off-grid felony, a severity level 1, 2, 3 or 4, 4 or 5 felony or a drug severity level 1 or 2 felony. The judge or judges of chief judge or the chief judge's designee in the district court of the county shall then consider the petition and, if it is found that the petition is in proper form, as set forth in this subsection, shall order a grand jury to be summoned.


(c) A grand jury shall be summoned in any county within 60 days after a petition requesting a grand jury is presented to the district court, bearing the signatures of a number of electors equal to 100 plus 10% 5% of the active registered voters in the county, and found to be in compliance with this subsection.

(1) Before circulating any petition to summon a grand jury, the affidavit required by this subsection shall be submitted to the clerk of the district court where the grand jury is requested to be summoned.

(2) A committee of petitioners consisting of five registered voters may commence a proceeding to summon a grand jury, by filing an affidavit with the clerk of the district court that contains the following information:
