
Placement Analysis

Clients Placed in Wichita

There are currently 1,323 children placed in Wichita. This chart shows each area's percentage of children placed in Wichita in comparison to the number of clients each area serves.


64% of the catchment Area 7 children are placed in Wichita.


Placement Options

There are currently 444 children out of the catchment area placed in Wichita. This chart shows the percentages of those children based on placement type.

65% are placed in a foster home, and 16.7% are placed in congregate care.







Number of Placements Available

The Wichita Region (Areas 7 and 8) has 43 Congregate Care Facilities and 834 Foster Family Homes, the vast majority of which are in Wichita.

Statewide, the Wichita region has the largest concentration of placement options.

The *% of children in Wichita* is based on the 1,323 children placed in Wichita. For example, area 1 has 72 children in Wichita, of the 1,323 total children in Wichita so 5.4% of the children in Wichita are from area 1.

The % of children by area population is the total percentage of an area's population that is placed in Wichita. For example, area 1 serves 612 children, and 72 of them are in Wichita, so 12% of their clients are placed in Wichita.

23% (1323/5743) of all OOH clients are currently placed in Wichita. For comparison, Area 7 (EHC) serves 24% (1363/5743) of all OOH clients. 34% (444/1323) of clients placed in Wichita are out of the area.

There is a total of 444 out of area children. 65.5% of those are in FFH's and 16.7% are in residential placements. This shows that there are a high number of out-of-area clients in Wichita, and they are also utilizing primary placement options available in Area 7. This is straining resources in the area and could be contributing to the high number of placement failures.

Overall Analysis:

There are currently 5,743 children in out-of-home care across the state. There has been an issue with failure to place in the state for several years. Area 7 has not been excluded from this crisis and has had an issue with the failure to place for several years, even though it has the highest concentration of foster homes and congregate care homes. However, Wichita has also had an influx of out-of-area clients, with 34% of all clients placed in Wichita being children from other areas. There are many factors that could contribute to the lack of options in other areas including a child's history, level of of care and willingness to be in a placement. These same factors could contribute to the failure to place" the crisis we are witnessing. Area 7 has the highest number of congregate care placements and foster family homes, and these are the same types most utilized by out-of-area residents. The placement types and options are disproportionate across the state. It's imperative that an analysis will be conducted to investigate placement disparities in the state so that we can better serve children and families.
