INTRODUCTION OF BILLS AND CONCURRENT RESOLUTIONS

The following bills and concurrent resolution were introduced and read by title:

HB 2637, AN ACT concerning education; relating to school districts; requiring eligible boards of education to consider participation in the community eligibility program; providing a financial hardship exception to such participation; requiring the state department of education to assist school districts seeking such participation, by Representatives Essex, Bohi, Esau, Stiens and Williams, L..

HB 2638, AN ACT concerning children and minors; relating to the secretary for children and families; requiring that a child in the custody of the secretary be provided

notification of such child's rights; maintaining records of provision and the child's acknowledgement of the provision of notification of the child's rights; providing for written confirmation of comprehension by the child of such rights; amending K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 38-2201a and repealing the existing section, by Committee on Child Welfare and Foster Care.

HB 2639, AN ACT concerning children and minors; changing the name of juvenile crisis intervention centers to juvenile stabilization centers; modifying the intake criteria for such centers; prohibiting certain rules and regulations for such centers; modifying the treatment and services provided by such centers; transferring moneys from the evidence-based programs account of the state general fund to the department for children and families to provide juvenile stabilization services; amending K.S.A. 38-2232, 38-2242 and 75-7023 and K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 38-2202, 38-2231, 38-2243, 38-2302, 38-2330, 65-536, 72-6287 and 75-52,164 and repealing the existing sections, by Committee on Child Welfare and Foster Care.

HB 2640, AN ACT concerning the integrity of state voter registration systems by requiring periodic comparisons with the federal systematic alien verification for entitlements (SAVE) database by the secretary of state and annual reporting to the legislature on such comparison, by Committee on Elections.

HB 2641, AN ACT concerning real property; enacting the Kansas property rights protection act; establishing protections for property value diminution from actions of governmental entities; requiring just compensation be provided to landowners for actions that burden or diminish the value of private property, by Representative Rhiley.

HB 2642, AN ACT concerning income taxation; relating to addition and subtraction modifications; removing obsolete reference to global intangible low-taxed income provided for under the federal internal revenue code; amending K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 79-32,117 and repealing the existing section, by Committee on Taxation.

HB 2643, AN ACT concerning sales and compensating use tax; relating to city and countywide retailers' sales tax; providing countywide retailers' sales tax authority for Butler county for the purpose of providing property tax relief; amending K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 12-187, 12-189 and 12-192 and repealing the existing sections, by Committee on Taxation.

HB 2644, AN ACT concerning property taxation; relating to valuations; requiring a county appraiser to adjust the value of residential and commercial property upon a final determination of valuation appeal or obtain an independent fee simple appraisal if the appraised value exceeds a 5% increase each year for five years; amending K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 79-1460 and repealing the existing section, by Committee on Taxation.

HB 2645, AN ACT concerning income taxation; relating to credits; extending the tax credit for certain contributions to community colleges and technical colleges for capital improvements, deferred maintenance or the purchase of technology or equipment; amending K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 79-32,261 and repealing the existing section, by Committee on Taxation.

HB 2646, AN ACT concerning veterans and military; relating to veterans benefits; prohibiting certain conduct and improper collection of veterans benefit fees; requiring mandatory counseling concerning the benefit claims process; requiring that violations be considered under the Kansas consumer protection act, by Committee on Veterans and Military.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION No. **HCR 5027**—

By Committee on Elections

A PROPOSITION to amend section 1 of the constitution of the state of Kansas to add a new section establishing an electoral college system for electing the governor and the lieutenant governor whereby each senatorial district would have one vote in the selection.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Kansas, two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives and two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate concurring therein:

Section 1. The following proposition to amend the constitution of the state of Kansas shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for their approval or rejection: Article 1 of the constitution of the state of Kansas is hereby amended by adding a new section to read as follows:

"§ 17. Electoral college for governor and lieutenant governor. (a)

The governor and the lieutenant governor shall be elected by an electoral college consisting of one elector from each state senate district, for a total of 40 electors.

(b) In each state senate district, the candidate pair for governor and lieutenant governor receiving the highest number of votes shall receive such district's elector, who shall be pledged to vote for governor and lieutenant governor.

(c) The candidate pair receiving a majority of the electoral votes which shall be at least 21 votes shall be elected governor and lieutenant governor. If none of the pairs receives a majority, the legislature shall elect the governor and lieutenant governor in a joint session from among the two pairs receiving the highest number of electoral votes. Each member of the legislature having one vote and a majority shall be required to elect the governor and lieutenant governor.

(d) Electors shall be qualified voters of Kansas, residents of their respective senate districts and nominated in advance by political parties or independent candidate pairs in accordance with law. Electors shall meet and cast votes as prescribed by law. Any elector voting contrary to their pledge shall be subject to penalties as provided by law.

(e) The legislature shall enact laws to implement this section, including procedures for certification, meetings of electors, handling of ties or vacancies and enforcement."

Sec. 2. The following statement shall be printed on the ballot with the amendment as a whole:

"Explanatory statement. This amendment would establish an electoral college for the election of governor and lieutenant governor, with one elector allocated for each state senate district to ensure a balanced representation of urban and rural areas.

"A vote for this proposition would establish an electoral college system for electing the governor and lieutenant governor.

"A vote against this proposition would make no change in the current system of electing the governor and the lieutenant governor."

Sec. 3. This resolution, if approved by two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives and two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate, shall be entered on the journals, together with the yeas and nays. The secretary of state shall cause this resolution to be published as provided by law and shall cause the proposed amendment to be submitted to the electors of the state at the general election in November in the year 2028, unless a special election is called at a sooner date by concurrent resolution of the legislature, in which case, the proposed amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the state at the special election.

Also on page 2, in line 23, by striking all after "universally"; in line 24, by striking all before the period and inserting "to multiple students; or

(B) any intervention that is provided as a one-time emergency intervention or as an initial intervention to address an emergency mental health concern with a student"; and the bill be passed as amended.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS AND CONCURRENT RESOLUTIONS

The following bills were introduced and read by title:

HB 2647, AN ACT concerning communications services; relating to the Kansas department of transportation; authorizing the Kansas department of transportation to establish a statewide fiber optic system; establishing the Kansas broadband revolving fund for the receipt and disbursement of moneys related to such system; authorizing the issuance of revenue bonds by the Kansas development finance authority; requiring the secretary of transportation to prepare and submit a report to the legislature regarding such system, by Committee on Transportation.

HB 2648, AN ACT concerning consumer protection; relating to electronic communications; enacting the social media and telecommunications fraud accountability act; requiring social media platforms to exercise reasonable care in preventing the dissemination of fraudulent advertisements; prohibiting a person or business from falsely identifying such person's or business's name or telephone number on telephone caller identification systems; prohibiting the unauthorized use of a bank name in electronic advertisements or solicitations; making violations of the act an unconscionable act or practice under the Kansas consumer protection act; authorizing the attorney general to enforce violations of the act; providing for civil penalties and private civil actions against violators of the act, by Committee on Financial Institutions and Pensions.

HB 2649, AN ACT concerning retirement and pensions; enacting the Kansas empowerment savings program act; establishing the Kansas empowerment savings program board of trustees within the office of the state treasurer; providing powers, duties, functions and responsibilities of such board; authorizing certain eligible employees to contribute to individual retirement accounts through an automatic enrollment payroll deduction; prescribing requirements, limitations and responsibilities for eligible employees and employers; creating the Kansas empowerment savings program fund, by Committee on Financial Institutions and Pensions.

HB 2650, AN ACT concerning noncompete agreements; requiring that such agreements be reasonable; providing that such agreements are null and void upon the sale or change in ownership or control of an employer, by Representative Howe.

HB 2651, AN ACT concerning children and minors; relating to acknowledgment and claims of paternity; authorizing a challenge to a voluntary acknowledgment of paternity at any time after acknowledgment in cases of fraud, duress or mistake of fact; specifying that certain genetic testing results are considered a material mistake of fact; amending K.S.A. 23-2204 and repealing the existing section, by Committee on Judiciary.

HB 2652, AN ACT concerning courts; requiring the clerk of the appellate courts to publish monthly a list of cases of the supreme court and court of appeals in which a decision has not been entered and filed within six months of submission and a list of cases in which a petition for review has not been granted or denied within six months of submission; amending K.S.A. 20-3301 and repealing the existing section, by Committee on Judiciary.

HB 2653, AN ACT concerning the secretary of corrections; relating to release of offenders; requiring the secretary to assist inmates with obtaining identification and employment-related documentation prior to release from custody, by Committee on Corrections and Juvenile Justice.

HB 2654, AN ACT concerning traffic regulations; relating to failure to comply with a traffic citation; prohibiting past sanctions that are more than five years old from being considered by courts or the division of vehicles in determining suspended or restricted driving privileges; eliminating certain notice requirements for the division of vehicles related to suspended or restricted drivers' licenses; amending K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 8-2110 and repealing the existing section, by Committee on Corrections and Juvenile Justice.

HB 2655, AN ACT concerning municipal courts; providing for expungement of convictions and related arrest records when a person has completed the requirements of a specialty court program; authorizing the chief judge of each municipal court to establish a specialty court program in accordance with supreme court rules; amending K.S.A. 12-4516 and 20-173 and repealing the existing sections, by Committee on Corrections and Juvenile Justice.

HB 2656, AN ACT concerning education; relating to school districts; establishing the no kid hungry in schools program to be administered by the state board of education; reimbursing school districts that participate in such program for the cost of providing certain meals to students attending public school; amending K.S.A. 72-17,137 and 72-17,145 and repealing the existing sections, by Representatives Wikle, Boatman, Carr, Featherston, Haskins, Hoye, Martinez, Melton, Meyer, Ohaebosim, Oropeza, Osman, Poskin, Simmons, Vaughn, Woodard and Xu.

HB 2657, AN ACT concerning consumer protection; prohibiting social media platforms from allowing children under 16 year of age to create, maintain or access an account unless the platform has obtained verified parental consent; requiring social media platforms to implement age-verification measures and suspend access to current accounts until verified parental consent is obtained; allowing a parent or guardian to revoke consent at any time and request for the deletion of the minor's account; authorizing the attorney general to enforce the provisions of the section pursuant to the Kansas consumer protection act, by Committee on Legislative Modernization.

HB 2658, AN ACT concerning law enforcement; enacting the safe and transparent arrest act; requiring all law enforcement agencies operating in Kansas to adopt a written policy regarding the use of facial coverings; prohibiting law enforcement officers from wearing a facial covering that conceals or obscures their facial identity in the

performance of their duties except as expressly authorized by law; waiving any privilege or immunity against a claim of civil liability for certain tortious conduct committed while committing violations thereof; providing criminal penalties for violations thereof, by Representative Martinez.

HB 2659, AN ACT concerning elections; relating to audits and recounts; requiring that audits and recounts be conducted using a hand count of paper ballots; amending K.S.A. 25-4413 and K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 25-2912, 25-3009 and 25-3107 and repealing the existing sections, by Representative Poetter.

HB 2660, AN ACT concerning education; relating to the Kansas blueprint for literacy; making and concerning appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2027, for the state board of regents; expanding reporting requirements in the every child can read act; requiring members of the literacy advisory committee to have certain expertise; aligning literacy fluency goals with the state board of education's assessment cut scores; requiring school districts to employ reading specialists and develop individual student literacy plans for certain high-risk students; requiring the state board of education to designate best literacy practices and include a literacy practicum in the requirements for teacher licensure; requiring the development of a comprehensive literacy implementation plan; providing requirements for educator preparation programs; amending K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 72-3262, 74-32,290, 74-32,291, 74-32,292, 74-32,293, 74-32,294 and 74-32,295 and repealing the existing sections; also repealing K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 74-32,296, by Committee on Education.

HB 2661, AN ACT concerning postsecondary education; enacting the foreign adversaries out of higher education act; prohibiting the acceptance of gifts, grants and other moneys by postsecondary educational institutions from foreign adversaries and their affiliates; prohibiting certain foreign adversary affiliates from operating on campuses; providing training and education on such foreign adversaries and their affiliates; establishing the foreign adversaries out of higher education fund, by Committee on Education.

HB 2662, AN ACT concerning education; enacting the student safety and awareness act; requiring school districts to designate a month during the school year as student safety and awareness month; requiring the provision of educational programs on the dangers and effects of fentanyl, personal safety and awareness and social media literacy, safety and responsibility during such designated month, by Committee on Education.

HB 2663, AN ACT concerning education; relating to school district at-risk student accountability plans; modifying the requirements for student cohorts and achievement goals for such plans; amending K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 72-3574 and repealing the existing section, by Committee on Education.

HB 2664, AN ACT concerning energy; enacting the private energy campus and industrial host site generation act; authorizing the sales of electricity and the provision of ancillary services to private industrial and data center enterprises located on a private energy campus; exempting such sales and services from public utility regulation; authorizing an electric public utility to enter into interconnection and energy services agreements with a private energy campus; exempting a private energy campus from parallel generation and net metering requirements; defining a private energy campus; amending K.S.A. 66-1,170 and K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 66-104, 66-1,184 and 66-1264 and repealing the existing sections, by Representatives Neelly, Buchler, T. Johnson and Proctor.

HB 2665, AN ACT concerning the residential landlord and tenant act; relating to termination of a rental agreement; modifying how a rental agreement terminates in the case of material noncompliance by the landlord with a rental agreement; amending K.S.A. 58-2559 and repealing the existing section, by Representative Xu.

HB 2666, AN ACT concerning the residential landlord and tenant act; requiring certain disclosures be made to prospective tenants; providing restrictions on fees for the late payment of rent, by Representative Xu.

HB 2667, AN ACT concerning the residential landlord and tenant act; relating to the sale of dwelling units; requiring landlords to offer to sell certain dwelling units to tenants prior to offering such units for sale to the public, by Representative Xu.

HB 2668, AN ACT concerning insurance; relating to health insurance; mandating health insurers to provide coverage for pain management services, by Representative Simmons.

HB 2669, AN ACT concerning real property; relating to unit owners associations; prohibiting such associations from limiting or prohibiting the installation of rooftop solar energy conversion systems; authorizing such associations to adopt reasonable rules regarding the placement of such systems, by Committee on Local Government.

HB 2670, AN ACT concerning video programming; relating to advertisement volume; prohibiting certain video streaming services from transmitting commercial advertisements with the audio louder than that of the main video streaming content in which such advertisement is placed, by Representatives Roeser, Anderson, Barrett, Bergkamp, Bergquist, Blex, Bloom, Boatman, Bohi, Brunk, Bryce, Butler, Carlin, B. Carpenter, Chauncey, Esau, Essex, Featherston, Francis, Goddard, Goetz, Haskins, Helwig, Hoffman, Hoheisel, Howe, Howell, Howerton, Hoye, Huebert, James, T. HB 2671, AN ACT concerning consumer protection; establishing the Kansas community harmed by AI technology act; requiring covered entities to mandate user accounts for accessing companion AI chatbots and to verify user age using commercially available methods; classifying users as minors or adults based on age verification; mandating parental account affiliation and parental consent for minors; blocking minor users' access to interactions involving suicidal ideation or sexually explicit communications; protecting the confidentiality of age information and monitoring interactions for suicidal ideation; requiring popups to inform users that they are interacting with AI, not humans; requiring the attorney general to issue compliance guidance by December 31, 2026; outlining enforcement actions under the Kansas consumer protection act; providing a safe harbor for covered entities that rely on user-provided age information and comply with the attorney general's guidance, by Committee on K-12 Education Budget.

HB 2672, AN ACT concerning persons with intellectual disabilities; removing certain terminologies from statute; amending K.S.A. 76-17d01 and K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 76-6b04 and repealing the existing sections, by Committee on K-12 Education Budget.

HB 2673, AN ACT concerning education; relating to school districts; establishing the positive learning environment act; establishing certain rights for teachers; requiring the board of education of each school district to adopt a school management plan for each

school of the school district; requiring such plans to establish a tiered system of consequences and interventions for minor and major behavioral infractions, by Committee on K-12 Education Budget.

HB 2674, AN ACT concerning the environment; enacting the PFAS protection act; prohibiting certain products that contain intentionally added PFAS; authorizing the department of health and environment to adopt rules and regulations to prohibit certain products that contain intentionally added PFAS; requiring disclosure of information and the testing of products that contain intentionally added PFAS and are sold, offered for sale, distributed or distributed for sale in this state, by Representative Bohi.

HB 2675, AN ACT concerning economic development, relating to international trade; establishing the Kansas-Italy trade commission to advance, promote and encourage business and other mutually beneficial activities between Kansas and Italy; establishing the Kansas-Italy trade commission fund, by Representative Bohi.

HB 2676, AN ACT concerning pharmacists and pharmacy; relating to a pharmacist's scope of practice; permitting a pharmacist to initiate therapy for certain conditions consistent with the pharmacist's education, training and experience; amending K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 65-16,131 and repealing the existing section, by Committee on Health and Human Services.
