INTRODUCTION OF BILLS AND CONCURRENT RESOLUTIONS

The following bills were introduced and read by title:

HB 2767, AN ACT concerning veterans and military; relating to commissions; establishing the Kansas military affairs commission; prescribing the powers and duties thereof, by Committee on Federal and State Affairs.

HB 2768, AN ACT concerning the residential landlord and tenant act; requiring landlords to accept multiple payment amounts as long as rent is paid on time and in full

and to consider certain income of a tenant or prospective tenant when demonstrating income as a condition of qualifying for housing; providing penalties for violations of such requirements, by Committee on Federal and State Affairs.

HB 2769, AN ACT concerning property taxation; relating to budgets and expenditures for public services established by governing bodies of subordinate service taxing areas; requiring members appointed to governing bodies be residents of such taxing area, by Committee on Taxation.

HB 2770, AN ACT concerning the health care stabilization fund; relating to investments; permitting the director of investments of the health care stabilization fund to invest funds as authorized for insurance companies; amending K.S.A. 40-3406 and repealing the existing section, by Committee on Appropriations.

INTRODUCTION OF ORIGINAL MOTIONS AND HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

On emergency motion of Rep. A. Smith, **HR 6029**, as follows, was introduced and adopted:

HR 6029—A RESOLUTION recognizing February 6, 2026, as Ronald Reagan Day.

A RESOLUTION recognizing and proclaiming February 6, 2026, as Ronald Reagan Day.

WHEREAS, President Ronald Wilson Reagan, a man of humble beginnings, devoted his life to advancing freedom and serving the public good, having worked as a radio host, entertainer, union leader, corporate spokesman, Governor of California and President of the United States of America; and

WHEREAS, Ronald Reagan served with honor and distinction for two terms as the 40th President of the United States; and

WHEREAS, In his reelection campaign, President Reagan earned the confidence of an unprecedented $\frac{3}{5}$ of the American electorate and carried 49 of the 50 states—a record unsurpassed in presidential history; and

WHEREAS, Upon assuming office in 1981, President Reagan inherited a nation burdened by skyrocketing inflation, massive unemployment and widespread economic uncertainty; and

WHEREAS, During his presidency, Ronald Reagan worked in a bipartisan manner to cut taxes and restore accountability and common sense to government, resulting in a sustained period of economic expansion and increased opportunity for millions of Americans; and

WHEREAS, President Reagan championed policies that strengthened families, supported children and contributed to reductions in crime and drug use in communities across the nation; and

WHEREAS, President Reagan's vision of "peace through strength" played a decisive role in ending the Cold War and contributed to the peaceful collapse of the Soviet Union, expanding liberty and basic human rights for millions around the world; and

WHEREAS, Ronald Reagan was born on February 6, 1911, and his legacy continues to influence public policy, civic leadership and the cause of freedom in the United States and beyond: Now, therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Kansas: That February 6, 2026, is hereby recognized as "Ronald Reagan Day"; and

Be it further resolved: That the members of the House of Representatives of the State of Kansas shall encourage the citizens of this state to observe this day by reflecting upon the life, leadership and enduring legacy of President Ronald Reagan; and

Be it further resolved: That the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives shall send an enrolled copy of this resolution to Representative Adam Smith.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

There being no objection, the following remarks of Rep. Adam Smith are spread upon the Journal:

It is my honor to present **HR 6029** for your consideration today, designating Feb 6th 2026 as Ronald Reagan Day in Kansas.

President Reagan was the first national elected official I remember learning about in the news. I was five years old when he first took office. I remember seeing the stories on television of the assassination attempt in March of 1981. I also remember watching the news story in 1987 when President Reagan was delivering a speech in West Berlin and a balloon popped. He paused his speech for a second and said, "Missed me..." and then continued on with his speech after much applause and cheers for his humor and quick wit.

One of the things I admired the most about President Reagan was his sense of humor. I believe a well-timed wisecrack, in good nature, can go a long ways toward deescalating a tense situation. A good sense of humor improves civil discourse brings people together, and when people come together good solutions have a better chance of moving forward.

I would like to reflect on a few of the memorable moments President Reagan had related to Kansas.

In 1982, he visited Kansas State University and spoke at Ahearn Field House as part of the Alfred Landon Lecture Series. His speech focused on agricultural support, government restraint, and economic freedom.

In 1984, the second presidential debate against Walter Mondale was held in Kansas City, where he famously addressed a question about his advanced age by saying “I will not make age an issue of this campaign. I am not going to exploit, for political purposes, my opponent’s youth and inexperience.”

Lastly, an excerpt from President Reagan’s personal diary from September 6, 1987:

“Landed at Nat. Guard Field in Topeka Kansas—greeted by Gov. & Mayor and then on to Alf Landon’s home. He has some difficulty hearing but is sharp as a tack. He’ll be 100 yrs. old Wed.”

EXPLANATION OF VOTE

MR. SPEAKER: I empathize with Edwards County’s concerns about aquifer depletion and property disruption. The Kansas Supreme Court case must proceed without legislative interference. **HB 2433** undermines local authority by preempting county zoning, permits, and moratoriums, retroactively overriding local rules. This sets a dangerous precedent for state overreach, potentially impacting energy infrastructure like power lines, renewables, and data centers. Water is already state-owned, and the Chief Engineer holds authority – **HB 2433** doesn’t assert state rights but reduces community input on non-domestic transfers. Local land-use impacts require more community involvement, not less. For these reasons, I must vote No on **HB 2433**. – REBECCA SCHMOE, GARY WHITE

(c) the total aggregate amount of local sales tax revenue lost to all jurisdictions outside STAR bond districts as the result of such relocations; and";

Committee on **Transportation** recommends **HB 2220** be amended on page 2, in line 31, after "districts" by inserting "from 30 miles per hour";

On page 1, in the title, in line 3, after "limit" by inserting "from 30 miles per hour"; and the bill be passed as amended.

Committee on **Transportation** recommends **HB 2585** be amended on page 2, in line 17, after "thereto" by inserting ", except that payments from the delta waterfowl license plate royalty fund shall be made on a monthly basis to the delta waterfowl foundation"; and the bill be passed as amended.

HB 2772, AN ACT concerning consumer protection; enacting the Kansas age-appropriate design code act; requiring businesses to assess and mitigate risks of compulsive use of digital products in minors; mandating privacy settings for minors to be set at the highest level by default; detailing the right of each consumer to access and control such consumer's own personal data; authorizing the attorney general to enforce compliance and adopt necessary rules and regulations; creating a private right of action for violations; enacting the Kansas stopping digital likeness abuse by nonconsensual digital replicas act; creating a private right of action for the unauthorized digital replication and distribution of individuals' digital likenesses; enacting the Kansas saving human connection act; prohibiting deceptive practices and ensuring transparency in chatbot interactions; imposing liability on chatbot providers for injuries caused by such providers' products; creating a private right of action for violations; granting the attorney general authority to enforce compliance of this act and adopt necessary rules and regulations, by Committee on Federal and State Affairs.
