As an advocate for educational attainment, I stand before you today to express my unwavering support for safeguarding in-state tuition for immigrant students in Kansas. This topic is of paramount importance as it speaks volumes about our values as a society, our commitment to justice, and our belief in the power of education to transform lives.

Twenty years ago, through HB 2145, the Kansas legislature set an impressive example to the whole nation becoming the sixth state in the country to formalize the acknowledgement that higher education attainment of all students and residents in Kansas is inarguably good for individuals and good for the state.

According to various studies, people with a college degree increase their earning potential which leads to greater purchasing power, contributing to economic growth and spending and higher tax revenues.
