Current Tuberculosis (TB) Outbreak in Wyandotte County

- The ongoing TB outbreak in Wyandotte County will exceed \$2 million in expenses, including staffing, supplies, and essential medications. This is from June 2024-June 2025
- Last year, the CDC provided \$750,000 in extra funding, but it had to be used before 2025 and was allocated specifically for this outbreak.
- The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) is preparing an additional budget request exceeding \$1 million for CDC approval, if permitted.
- Prices for routine TB medications have increased over 500% without notice, making patient recovery more costly and challenging.

Imminent Measles Threat

- A measles outbreak is a close threat to Kansas, bringing another large financial burden on public health resources.
- The **2018-2019 measles outbreak in Clark County, Washington**, which involved **72 cases**, cost **\$2.3 million** in public health response efforts.

Public Health Funding Challenges

- Disease outbreaks are unpredictable and impose significant financial burdens on both state and local health departments.
- Neither state nor local agencies have a designated emergency fund for outbreaks, making it difficult to respond efficiently.
- Supporting the increase funding for TB control efforts of \$96,000 would help ensure a rapid and effective response to future outbreaks.
