SUBJECT: Fiscal Note for HB 2474 by House Committee on Taxation

In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning HB 2474 is respectfully submitted to your committee.


Under existing law, public utilities are required to file annual returns with the Director of Property Valuation at the Department of Revenue by March 20, providing information necessary for appraising and apportioning the value of their property in Kansas. If a utility fails to comply, the Attorney General is authorized to take enforcement action. HB 2474 would add a new requirement for the Director to conduct a review or audit of the appraisal and apportionment of the value of any public utility property when the utility's total appraised value in Kansas decreases by more than 5.0 percent from the prior tax year. Upon completion of the review, the Director would post the findings on the Department of Revenue Division of Property Valuation's website and make the findings available for public inspection.

The Department of Revenue estimates that HB 2474 would have no fiscal effect on state and local property tax revenues. The Department indicates that the bill could require on-site property inspections that could increase staff time and travel-related costs to conduct a review or audit of public utility property. The administrative impact would depend on the scope of the review or audit. A full reappraisal of valuation methods, models, and underlying data would require substantially more staff time and technical resources to accomplish; however, any increased costs to conduct a review or audit of public utility property would likely be absorbed with existing resources.

The bill would have no fiscal effect on the Kansas Corporation Commission. Any fiscal effect associated with HB 2474 is not reflected in *The FY 2027 Governor's Budget Report*.

The Kansas Association of Counties and the League of Kansas Municipalities indicate that the bill would have an indeterminate fiscal effect on local governments. The bill could increase or decrease local property tax revenues collected from certain public utility property if the review or audit results in changes to the valuation of public utility property. The Association and the League indicate that since property tax collections are based on the approved budget, the potential change in an individual valuation would not impact local government finances. The bill has the potential to shift the tax burden to other property classifications and types; however, any shift is estimated to be negligible.
