SUBJECT: Fiscal Note for HB 2552 by House Committee on Appropriations


In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning HB 2552 is respectfully submitted to your committee.

Under current law a presentence report and journal entry is completed for an offender on forms approved by the Kansas Sentencing Commission. HB 2552 would require that presentence investigation reports and journal entries be completed and submitted in the form and manner prescribed by the Commission. All documents required to be forwarded to the Commission would be completed and submitted in a form and manner prescribed by the Commission. A court would be prohibited from receiving or recognizing documents as valid if completed and submitted in any other form or manner. The bill would be effective after publication in the *Kansas Register*.

The Kansas Sentencing Commission indicates HB 2552 would not have a fiscal effect. The Office of Judicial Administration states that the bill would have a negligible fiscal effect on expenditures that would be absorbed within its existing budget. Any fiscal effect associated with HB 2552 is not reflected in *The FY 2027 Governor's Budget Report*.

The Kansas Association of Counties indicates HB 2552 could have a fiscal effect on counties as a result of increased filing fees for the filing and documentation requirement listed in the bill, increased costs to create a system as a result of the courts being required to only recognize forms listed in the bill as valid, and enforcement and verification costs to ensure compliance. The Association is unable to estimate a precise fiscal effect.
