
SUBJECT: Fiscal Note for HB 2692 by Representative Simmons, et al.

In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning HB 2692 is respectfully submitted to your committee.

HB 2692 would require U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agents to adhere to standards of conduct when enforcing federal immigration law within the boundaries of Kansas. The standards would ensure that the civil rights of citizens are not violated, noncitizens are treated with respect, and the least amount of force necessary would be the standard used when enforcing the federal immigration laws. ICE agents would be prohibited from wearing masks and facial coverings, be required to display identification on their uniforms, have clearly marked vehicles, and identify themselves when asked. They would be prohibited from surveillance using certain tools without a judicial warrant. They would be required to have minimum training matching state law enforcement training of 14 weeks. They would be prohibited from raiding places of worship, schools, daycare centers, hospitals, and courts without judicial warrants. They would also be prohibited from using door-to-door raids in neighborhoods, apartments, or any other residential dwelling.

The Office of Judicial Administration indicates that enactment of HB 2692 would not have a fiscal effect on the courts. According to the Office of the Attorney General, enactment of HB 2692 would not have any direct fiscal effect on the Office. The bill would likely face litigation if enacted, but the Office is unable to provide estimate of the cost of this litigation. Any fiscal effect associated with HB 2692 is not reflected in *The FY 2027 Governor's Budget Report*.
