SENATE COMMITTEE ON WAYS & MEANS SB 336 FOLLOW-UP TO TESTIMONY BY THE KANSAS ADJUTANT GENERAL

Madam Chair & Members of the Committee:

The following is in response to questions about the cost and use of state disaster funds. The table called State Matching Funds shows the amount of expenditures in each fiscal year for each disaster, which is the top part of the table. The bottom part of the table shows if the funds were appropriated by the Legislature or the State Finance Council and amounts that were reappropriated. The table called Estimated Total Cost of Recent Disasters illustrates how much is estimated to be expended in total on each disaster by the State, Local, and Federal entities.

The following describes who is eligible for the Public Assistance Program and the different categories for public assistance, including some examples of activities and uses of disaster funds (not a complete list). State government agencies, local governments and special districts, certain private non-profit organizations or institutions, and federally recognized Native American Indian Tribes are eligible for public assistance.

The categories for the Public Assistance Program are: Category A - debris removal; Category B - emergency protective measures; Category C - roads and bridges; Category D - water control facilities; Category E - building and equipment; Category F - utilities; and Category G - parks, recreational facilities, and other items.

Category A - Debris removal is the clearance, removal, and/or disposal of items such as trees, woody debris, sand, mud, silt, gravel, building components, wreckage, vehicles, and personal property. There are criteria to make the activities eligible. A couple examples of eligible debris removal activities are debris removal from a street or highway to allow the safe passage of emergency vehicles and to eliminate health and safety hazards.

Category B - Emergency protective measures are actions taken to save lives, protect public health and safety, and prevent damage to improved public and private property. Examples of this would include warning devices (barricades, signs, and announcements), search and rescue, construction of temporary levees, and sandbagging.

Category C – Unless they are federal-aid roads, roads and bridges are eligible for permanent repair or replacement. Eligible work can include repair to surfaces, bases, shoulders, ditches, culverts, low water crossings, guardrails, girders, pavement, slope protection, and approaches. Damage to the road must be disaster related. Normal or pre-disaster deterioration is not eligible.

Senate Ways and Means

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Category D - Water control facilities include dams and reservoirs, levees, lined and unlined engineered drainage channels, shore protective devices, irrigation facilities, and pumping facilities.

Category E - Building and equipment including contents such as furnishings and interior systems such as electrical work, are eligible for repair or replacement.

Category F – Utilities include water treatment plants and delivery systems, power generation and distribution facilities, sewage collection systems and treatment plants, and telecommunications.

Category G - Parks, recreational facilities, and other items category include repair and restoration of parks, playgrounds, pools, and cemeteries. This category also is used for any work or facility that cannot be characterized adequately by Categories A-F.
