Hearing on <u>HB2673</u> – an act repealing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 44-611, 44-621, and 44-425 concerning powers and duties of the secretary of the Department of Labor

Upon calling the meeting to order, Chairman Susan Wagle announced the Committee would be hearing testimony on <u>HB 2673</u> and called on Mr. Chuck Reimer, Office of the Revisor of Statutes, to explain the bill which was requested by the Office of Repealer and repeals 3 statutes that this Committee has already decided to repeal in <u>SB 355</u> including:

- 1.) KSA 2011 Sup. 44611, which provided the Secretary of Labor the power to issue summons and subpoenas, to compel the production of documents and make investigations.
- 2.) KSA 2011 Supp. 44-421, which provides that which is mutually agreed upon by parties that the Secretary may proceed with investigations and issue orders of matters involving controversies between employers and employees as to wages, hours of employment, and working or living conditions.
- 3.) KSA 2011 Supp. 44-624, which authorizes the Secretary, with the consent of the Governor, to investigate industrial conditions and relations.

The Chair thanked Mr. Reimer and asked him how many other statutes did the Committee repeal in <u>SB 355</u> besides these three? (All total, 22 with a lot of the statutes dealing with the authority and powers of the Secretary of Labor to deal with labor relations and investigations with regards to the private sector as opposed to the public sector.) Senator Holland asked if the senate bill was redundant? (Yes, it would be, but it has not yet run on the floor yet.)

Unless specifically noted, the individual remarks recorded herein have not been transcribed verbatim. Individual remarks as reported herein have not been submitted to the individuals appearing before the committee for editing or corrections.

He went on to say, in instances where Congress has enacted legislation on a subject matter, the federally enacted legislation shall be controlling over state laws in certain instances.
