2013 House Bill No. 2338

HB 2338 directs all revenues received from docket fees to go to the state general fund after certain payments to the county general fund and other payments, including the county law library fund, prosecuting attorneys' training fund, indigents' defense services fund, law enforcement training center fund and judicial branch surcharge fund.

K.S.A. 20-367(b) which states the percentage distribution of the docket fees after July 1, 2013, would be repealed by this bill; therefore the following funds (administering agency) would receive no moneys from the docket fees under this section:

- (1) 4.37% to the access to justice fund; (Judicial Branch)
- (2) 2.42% to the juvenile detention facilities fund; (JJA)
- (3) 1.87% to the judicial branch education fund; (Judicial Branch)
- (4) .50% to the crime victims assistance fund; (AG)
- (5) 2.38% to the protection from abuse fund; (AG)
- (6) 3.78% to the judiciary technology fund; (Judicial Branch)
- (7) .30% to the dispute resolution fund; (Judicial Branch)
- (8) 1.10% to the Kansas juvenile delinquency prevention trust fund; (JJA)
- (9) .19% to the permanent families account in the family and children investment fund; (Office of Judicial Administrator)
- (10) 1.31% to the trauma fund; (KDHE)
- (11) .99% to the judicial council fund; (Judicial Branch)
- (12) .60% to the child exchange and visitation centers fund; (AG)
- (13) 16.03% to the judicial branch nonjudicial salary adjustment fund; (Judicial Branch)
- (14) 15.85% to the judicial branch nonjudicial salary initiative fund. (Judicial Branch)

All moneys which previously went to these funds would go to the state general fund. This act would take effect upon publication of the statute book.
