Chair Siegfreid, members of the committee,

My name is Gary Glass, I am Director of the American Homebrewers Association (AHA), based in Boulder, CO, and I support House Bill 2223.

The AHA is a division of the Brewers Association, a not-for-profit trade association that represents America's small, independent brewers, including the nation's homebrewers. The AHA is a membership organization, made up of over 35,000 homebrewer members from around the country, including more than 350 members in Kansas.

I respectfully submit this testimony on behalf of HB 2223, which will allow Kansas homebrewers to participate in legitimate activities that homebrewers across the country currently engage in, and which, up until last year, Kansas homebrewers thought they could legally engage in.

The American Homebrewers Association estimates that there are more than 1,000,000 Americans that make beer and wine at home. Of those homebrewers, 10,000 or more are living here in Kansas. That number will continue to grow as the hobby grows across the country, but only if Kansas remains a place where homebrewers can freely practice their hobby. In 2011, US homebrew supply shops saw on average 24% growth in annual gross revenue, which followed 17% and 16% annual growth rates the previous two years. When we compile data for 2012, I anticipate we will have seen another year of double digit growth.

Homebrewers are a social group. They are passionate about crafting quality beer and love to share their beer and brewing knowledge with fellow homebrewers. Homebrewers also are constantly looking to learn more about beer and brewing, so that they can continue to improve their skills as brewers. Two ways in which homebrewers can improve their brewing skills are by getting feedback on their brews through homebrew competitions and by sharing with fellow homebrewers at homebrew club meetings. House Bill 2223 addresses both homebrew competitions and club meetings.

The AHA and the Beer Judge Certification Program (BJCP) jointly sanctioned more than 400 competitions per year in the United States, with more than 80,000 combined entries judged in those competitions. Homebrew competitions are rigorous affairs. Entries are judged by certified beer judges, who have taken a very challenging exam, requiring months of study to pass. Entries in competitions are evaluated in five different areas: aroma, appearance, flavor, mouth feel, and overall impression. Judges provide entrants with extensive notes on their beers, including comments on how the beers can be improved.

As for homebrew clubs, there are now 1425 homebrew clubs in the United States registered with the AHA, 15 of which are in Kansas. Sharing homebrew with fellow club members provides homebrewers with feedback that will help them improve upon their craft. Homebrew clubs also serve as a focal point for local beer communities, as homebrewers are the most knowledgeable of beer consumers. Many of the homebrew clubs across the country support their local communities through philanthropy.

Homebrewers support small businesses. Not only do homebrewers support the businesses that supply the ingredients and equipment to homebrew, but they are also the most ardent supporters of their local craft breweries. Kansas is home to 19 breweries, with at least another four breweries that are actively planning to open. We estimate that at least 90% of professional brewers in the United States got their start as homebrewers. In addition, homebrewers are responsible for launching the majority of new breweries being founded in the United States. Homebrewers also serve as the leading advocates for their local breweries within their communities. Thus, a vibrant homebrewing community directly serves to train new employees for existing and future small breweries, provides a pool of potential entrepreneurs to start new breweries, and helps market the breweries in their area. Passage of HB 2223 will help promote the vitality of Kansas' homebrew community.

In conclusion, I strongly urge you to pass HB 2223, not only is it the right thing to do for Kansas homebrewers, but passage of HB 2223 will prove beneficial to Kansas' business community.
