Reduction in local effort. The prior estimate was \$562.3 million and the revised November estimate is \$558.4 million.

Reduction in School District Finance Fund receipts.

Without the additional funding, the BSAPP would be reduced \$31 to \$3,807 for the 2012-2013 school year.

Since FY 2010, a flat appropriation of approximately \$339.0 million has been made for Supplemental General State Aid. This results in the amount to school districts being prorated. If the same amount is appropriated for FY 2013, it would result in a proration of 78.8 percent.
