During the Senate Ways and Means Committee meeting on January 29, KPERS was asked to provide additional information regarding the number of nonvested members in KPERS.

KPERS members vest with five years of service. Vested members are guaranteed a monthly retirement benefit for the rest of their lives if they keep their contributions in their account. Often, if a member has a significant amount of service, the vested benefit is more valuable than the amount of the member's actual contributions. If the member keeps the employee contributions with the Retirement System after leaving covered employment, the member can apply for retirement benefits when he or she becomes eligible. The member's contributions continue to earn interest, and the member can withdraw them at any time if the member changes his or her mind. In that case, KPERS membership is forfeited.

Nonvested members, on the other hand, have accrued less than five years of service. Nonvested members are entitled only to a return of their contributions, plus interest, if they leave before vesting. Nonvested inactive members who do not withdraw their contributions continue accruing interest for up to five years after termination, and they retain their accrued service if they return to covered employment during that period. However, five years after leaving covered employment, the individual forfeits KPERS membership, including previously accrued service credit, and no further interest is applied to employee contributions.

Based on the December 31, 2011, valuation report, KPERS' nonvested membership represented the following proportion of total KPERS membership. These figures include both those who were employed on that date by a participating employer (active members), as well as those who had terminated employment but not withdrawn their employee contributions and interest (inactive members).
