I have owned Horton's Retail Liquor in Pittsburg for over 25 years. I love the liquor business and plan to continue working for another 20 years. Out-of-state corporate interests would put an end to that dream. Family owned retail liquor stores absolutely cannot compete with national and international businesses and their virtually unlimited buying power.

They talk about not being able to sell wine and spirits. They say it's not fair. Is it fair for my wife and I to try to compete with Dillon's or WalMart selling the same products as our store but at a markup just over cost?

They say it would give retailers a chance to "expand" and be "entrepreneurs". Almost every store in Kansas has a limited amount of space to work with. Even if we can all get hundreds of thousands of dollars in loans to expand our buildings, add gas pumps, groceries, etc. Great. Another convenience store every town doesn't need.
