# Hearing on: HB2262 — Providing a compliance deadline and penalties for non-compliance with the student data privacy act.

Chairman Highland opened the hearing on <u>HB2262</u>. Nick Myers briefed the committee on the bill and answered questions from committee members.

Representative John Bradford gave support for <u>HB2262</u> indicating the intent of the bill is to clarify the seriousness of protecting student data privacy and expressing concern that some school districts have reported doing no tests on their data systems during the past year. Representative Bradford answered questions from the committee. (Attachment 1)

Chris Brown supported <u>HB2262</u> stating he does not believe it goes far enough and giving examples of breaches of security in area educational settings during the past year. Mr. Brown answered questions from committee members. (Attachment 2)

Lisa Huesers spoke in support of <u>HB2262</u> expressing her concern that security has not kept pace with the growth of data collection and referencing the relaxation in federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) policies regarding the requirement of parental approval before sharing a student's
