My name is Shirley Koehn. I reside in Wichita, Kansas I speak for myself, as a parent, grandmother, former middle school and high school teacher. I read completely the National Sex Education Curriculum. Starting in Section A.P.2.CC.1, with "by the end of 2nd grade, students should be able to use proper names to identify body parts, including male and female anatomy" the curriculum continues each year with more and more explicit information. I find it difficult to picture teachers covering this curriculum.

There are topics which may tread on parents values. The implication is the school is right & their parents just do not know the right information. More and more we see this happening. Parents have the right, to not only know, but to choose whether their child may participate. But these lessons are woven into the fabric of education, not given as an elective, where parents may opt in their child, and have opportunity to examine the curriculum.

There is no question teen pregnancy and sexually related diseases are a serious problem. I offer that our current culture encourages behavior that fosters self-destructive behavior. There is ample anecdotal evidence that Teen age pregnancy is rewarded and seen as a financial benefit.
