

# KANSAS ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS LEXIA PROGRESS REPORT

### **FALL/WINTER 2015-2016**

#### **Sample Description**

A total of 62,207 students in grades PreK–5 from all Kansas Elementary Schools have been using Lexia Reading since August 2015. This report limits the sample to the 54,524 students who have at least eight weeks of use and includes all usage and progress up until early March 2016. For new students, Lexia's Auto Placement determined the appropriate start level in the program. Students who used Lexia during the 2014-2015 school year continued where they left off in Spring 2015.

### **Program Description**

Lexia Reading provides explicit, systematic, personalized learning in the six areas of reading instruction, and delivers norm-referenced performance data and analysis without interrupting the flow of instruction to administer a test. Students advance through Lexia by completing activities (i.e., skills) such as initial/final consonants discrimination, silent-e word construction, categorizing, idioms, and reading comprehension. Skills are organized in Lexia by grade levels of material, and mastery of skills (90%-100% accuracy) within a level is required to advance to the next level. Lexia levels are organized into grade levels of material: Pre-K (Level 1), K (Levels 2–5), 1st grade (Levels 6–9), 2nd grade (Levels 10–12), 3rd grade (Levels 13–14), 4th grade (Levels 15–16), or 5th grade (Levels 17–18). Students' End-of-Year (EOY) Benchmark is to complete all of the material up to and including the levels that correspond to their grade level.

#### **Site Usage Description**

Program usage is described as students' minutes online from login to logout. Students have weekly usage targets based on their grade and risk level. Meeting usage is evaluated using two usage categories: Meeting Usage and Not Meeting Usage. Students who have reached EOY benchmark are considered Meeting Usage.

#### **Student Usage Evaluation**



### **Lexia Performance Based on Usage**

Performance in Lexia varies in accordance with how consistently students met their personalized recommended usage targets on the program. Each activity (i.e., skill) in Lexia is broken down into sub-skills that are taught in 8-20 units. Once students complete five skills, they earn a certificate celebrating their success and mastered knowledge. Students who are Meeting Usage complete substantially more skills on average than students who are Not Meeting Usage.

Average Number of Skills Completed by March 1, 2016



# Progress in Lexia During 2015-2016 School Year: Students Meeting Usage

While in Lexia, students may be working on a Lexia level below their grade level, in their grade level, or above their grade level (indicating that they Reached EOY Benchmark<sup>1</sup>). Students who have been meeting usage have shown meaningful progress in Lexia during Fall 2015. Compare the percent of students classified as working In Student's Grade and Below Grade from the start to March 2016. Review the results by grade to understand how progress differed within the grades.



### Two Years of Progress in Lexia for Moderate and High Risk Students

A portion of Meeting Usage students used Lexia during the 2014-2015 school year <u>and</u> started that year working on skills below grade level. These students have accelerated their reading skills and mastered dozens of skills during this time. Students who have already reached EOY benchmark during the 2015-2016 school year have closed the gap and ended the year working on skills above their grade level. For example, a second grader who started working on Kindergarten skills in Fall 2014 would be a third grader in Fall 2015 and to reach EOY benchmark would need to be working on 4<sup>th</sup> grade skills by March 2016 (Above Student Grade in graph below).
