TESTIMONY OF STATE REPRESENTATIVE JOHN CARMICHAEL IN OPPOSITION TO SENATE BILL 56 KANSAS HOUSE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE, FEBRUARY 2, 2016

Chairman Barker and Members of the Committee:

I offer this testimony in opposition to Senate Bill 56. The bill removes the legal defense which allows public, private and parochial schools and teachers to teach the Classics in our schools. Imagine a class in Western Civilization, English Literature or Art History without any of the following:

John Steinbeck,

"In the West there was panic when the migrants multiplied on the highways. Men of property were terrified for their property. Men who had never been hungry saw the eyes of the hungry. Men who had never wanted anything very much saw the flare of want in the eyes of the migrants. Nurse: Out upon you! What a man are you!

Romeo and Juliet, William Shakespeare, Act II, Scene Three (emphasis added).

Not only does the bill remove the Classics from our public schools, The Senate amendments also prohibit display in public buildings of "harmful materials" to minors. Accordingly, do the proponents of the bill really propose to arrest and try the Clerk of the Kansas House of Representatives for public display of this mural in the House Chamber above my desk?



Even worse is the "chilling effect" of the bill. Under this legislation the only way Kansas teachers will know what they can and cannot teach is after being arrested for felony pornography charges, going through a trial, paying their lawyers, and hoping a jury agrees teaching the Classics is not displaying material harmful to minors. Worst of all, another teacher, teaching the same class from the same textbook, may well be convicted of the crime by a different jury on a different day.

Kansas suffers enough ridicule, whether it be for trickledown economics, committee rules prohibiting low necklines on women's clothing, or folks who want to prohibit the teaching of Darwin's Theory of Evolution in our public schools. This committee should not give those who denigrate our state another headline by "burning" books and removing the Classics from our classrooms.
