The Governmental Ethics Commission was established in 1974. The 1974 Legislature enacted the Campaign Finance Act and the Governmental Ethics Laws. In the past 41 years, contribution limitations in the state have changed five times. The following table illustrates those changes:

^{***}There are four recognized party committees. Two committees exist in the Senate and two committees exist in the House of Representatives. The state political parties established one such committee in each chainber.
