Investment in the State


- More than \$825 million in network investment from 2010-2013



The Telecommunications Industry is Undergoing Rapid Change


AT&T Kansas Access Lines


KS Wireless Subscribers




Wireless Transformation: 2010 Coverage






Wireless Transformation: 2011 Coverage AT&T Owned and Operated Coverage Expanded with Acquisition #1






Wireless Transformation AT&T Owned and Operated Coverage Expanded with Acquisition #2

HB 2201 -2013

- Enacted meaningful and sustainable reductions to the Kansas Universal Service Fund

2015 Legislative Initiatives
