Bill introductions

There were no bill introductions.

<u>Hearing on: SB193 — Requiring a degree prospectus for postsecondary degree programs.</u> Chairperson Masterson opened the hearing on <u>SB193.</u>

David Wiese, Assistant Revisor, explained if **SB193** becomes law, it will require a degree prospectus for postsecondary degree programs (Attachment 1).

PROPONENTS:

Dave Trabert, President Kansas Policy Institute, spoke in favor of the bill. He said a prospectus would allow students and their parents to make informed decisions about the cost of the degree and their investment in higher education (Attachment 2).

Jeff Melcher, Kansas Senator, spoke in favor of the bill and distributed a sample prospectus template that showed the information that would be included in the prospectus. He said the information included in the sample provided is correct, however, it was only intended as a sample template. Senator Melcher did not provide written testimoney (Attachment 3).

Senator Francisco asked if the student continued on to graduate school rather than being employed, would the outcome numbers be skewed, i.e., percent employed and percent employed within field of study.

Senator Melcher said if a student did continue on to graduate school, they would be eliminated from the calculation since they are still attending a higher educational institution.

David Wiese said the bill allows the Board of Regents to adopt the rules and regulations.

Senator Francisco said she felt the calculations wouldn't be correct if some worked while going to school and many students don't borrow the full amount.

Senator Melcher said the prospectus was strictly to compare one institution against the other. The information would be identical for all universities so an accurate comparison can be made. He added that many students do borrow the full amount.

Senator Kelly said she was not sure most students do borrow the full amount because most students have a myriad of revenue sources to pay for their educational costs. She said the numbers on the sample were somewhat frightening.

Senator Powell asked if this bill would include a prospectus for community colleges. Senator Melcher said community colleges would be included for the various degrees offered.

OPPONENTS:

There were no opponents who came before the committee.

NEUTRAL:

Andy Tompkins, President and CEO of the Board of Regents, stated he was neutral on the bill. He said the scope of the bill will require a major investment of human capital at each of the 32 higher education institutions. He asked that the Board of Regents be allowed to work with the authors and legislative

staff to revise the bill so the information is accurately presented (Attachment 4).

Senator Tyson referred to the data that Mr Tompkins alluded to and asked him how they collect the student data after they graduate. Mr Tompkins replied that the data is collected through the Department of Labor. Senator Tyson requested to have the data provided to the committee (Attachment 4A).

The chairperson closed the hearing on **SB193**.

<u>Hearing on: SB249 — Purchasing; competitive bids; vehicle repairs.</u>

The Chairperson opened the hearing on **SB249**.

Daniel Yoza, Assistant Revisor, explained that <u>SB249</u> makes four changes to the statute that deals with the competitive bidding process for state agencies (<u>Attachment 5</u>).

PROPONENTS:

John Milburn, Director of Legislative and Public Affairs for the Department of Administration testified before the committee to support <u>SB249</u> (<u>Attachment 6</u>).

Senator Francisco asked if this bill just raises the limits for purchases, and if that is the case, she felt this should be more clearly stated in the bill.

Tracy Diel, Department of Administration Officer of Procurement and Contracts, said if an agency is going to procure something within the guidelines of this bill, they have to go through this procurement process. He said in some instances where they have adequate personnel to do the types of procurement under the dollar amount set out in this bill, then the Office of Procurement and Contracts would become involved

Senator Melcher asked when the present limits were initiated. Mr Diel said as far as they could ascertain, it was in the late 1990s.

Senator Tyson asked who actually monitors the checks that are written and paid. Mr Diel said for a purchase under \$5,000 a purchasing card is used and the audits at year-end should catch illegal purchases.

Subcommittee reports on:

Senator Kerschen, Chairperson of the General Government, Legislative, and Elected Officials, gave the Subcommittee for the Department of Commerce (Attachment 8).

After Senator Kerschen gave the Subcommittee Report, he made a motion to include the proportionate share of the total of \$4 million for the Garden City Airport. The motion was seconded by Senator Powell.

Jill Wolters, First Assistant Revisor, was called upon to explain a proviso that was inserted for FY2014 and FY2015 that proportionally divided the grant for the Affordable Airfare Act in the same amount that was granted in FY2013. She said this was an effort to protect the smaller airports; however, this language was taken out of this year's budget. She said to reinsert it, a sentence would be added with the amount changed from \$5 million to \$4 million, noting that the Garden City airport would get their proportional share.

Senator Powell made a substitute motion to increase the amount to \$5 million with \$250,000 being designated for the Garden City Airport and \$4.75 million to the Wichita Airport for FY2016. The motion was seconded by Senator Tyson.

Senator Kerschen asked if this would be for one year and the program would end. Powell said that is correct.

Senator Melcher said in light of the budgetary issues we dealing with, he would be reluctant to support the substitute motion.

Senator Fitzgerald asked if there contractual obligations associated with this provision. Senator Powell said he didn't know if there was a written contract with American at Garden City and Southwest at Wichita.

Senator Masterson added there seems to be some items that need to be investigated and he said to note this is a Subcommittee Report recommendation and as long as the Senate differs from the House, this item in the budget can be handled through a conference committee.

The substitute motion was recalled and the substitute motion failed.
