SUBJECT: Fiscal Note for SB 376 by Senate Committee on Corrections and Juvenile Justice

In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning SB 376 is respectfully submitted to your committee.

Under current law, all law enforcement agencies are required to enter a report on any missing person incident into the Missing Person System of the National Crime Information Center and the Missing and Unidentified Person System of the Kansas Bureau of Investigation (KBI) "as soon as practical." SB 376 would require that the missing person reports be entered into both systems within two hours after the law enforcement agency receives the minimum data required to enter the report. The bill would take effect upon its publication in the *Kansas Register*.

The KBI states there would be no fiscal effect on agency operations resulting from the enactment of SB 376. The League of Kansas Municipalities indicates local police departments would have to complete the missing person report within a fixed time period instead of a discretionary time frame. However, the League is unable to estimate a fiscal effect.
